Doug is a member of the Bethesda Christian Church and participated in a Service International program to assist with those in need in New Orleans. Doug was greatly touched by the extent of the damage still evident and the struggles of daily life even a year and a half after the terrible wrought brought on the state by hurricane Katrina. He shared a photo show of homes in terrible disrepair next to those that had been restored. Debris is still everywhere with random boats in front yards, houses miles from their original locations and beaches that may not be used because of glass and rubble. The work was exhausting working in heat and humidity, yet the human spirit perseveres. An 80-year-old lady was working one day at a time to restore her home, while living in a FEMA trailer. A volunteer from the team was able to get funding to replace all of the doors in her home to make it livable. Doug said that the stench from the mold and mildew of homes not being repaired was hard to stand even just walking by, yet people are moving back into homes next door. He indicated that he hasn't seen such devastation since he was in Vietnam during the war and that it is a tragedy that we hear so little in the news about the plight of those who still live in New Orleans or hope to return.

J amie talked about the mission of the Turning Point organization which is to offer a safe haven to victims of domestic violence, to help victims gain control of their lives, and to work for the prevention of domestic violence. Turning Point currently operates a 41-bed residential facility. The average length of stay is 30-45 days. Expansion is planned and badly needed. Annually more than 2,000 women and children must look elsewhere for safe



housing. Prevention efforts are aimed at middle and high school students through programs conducted in local schools. Turning Point operates Second Hand Rose, a store in town which provides fundraising for the organization, low-cost goods for the community and free goods for Turning Point clients. Donations of used items, especially furniture are welcome. This is the only program of its kind in Macomb County. Twenty five percent or more of their support comes from community organizations and individuals. **Julie Huttenlocher** introduced Ms. Colette Kelly, the Executive Director of the Furniture Bank of Southeastern Michigan. She is a fellow Rotarian from Pontiac. She began her presentation with history about the

Furniture Bank, which was started in Oakland County in 1968, in reaction to the 1967 riots. The need for decent household furniture was identified, and there were no organizations filling this need. They accept furniture without rips, tears, or excessive soiling.





They also accept large functioning appliances. Their recipients are referred to them from over 200 different social service agencies in Oakland and Macomb Counties (the Macomb branch is relatively new). They have a long wait-list of 800 families in Oakland Co. and 180 families in Macomb Co. They also distribute new cribs, which they have found is a great need. They only receive 60 cribs/year while they can distribute up to 400/year. Suffocating in cribs is a major epidemic, and often it is mis-identified as SIDS. They are having their major fundraiser the weekend of April 11. Ms. Kelly fielded several questions from the membership.

#### Speaker

**Reed** gave an overview of the Mount Clemens Rotary Foundation. It is a separate 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization, so it has a separate Board of Directors including the club's president, vice president, three past presidents, and two members-at-large (Sue Diener and Don Carnaghi).

The Foundation has separate bylaws that include the mission statement of the organization. There are two reasons for its existence: 1) It is a legitimate charity for tax purposes, and 2) Money in the fund can be managed tax-free. The Board of the Foundation has created a committee comprising all of the financial planners in the club. As of Feb. 29, 2008, it held an investment account of approximately \$258,000.

The money is disbursed according to the following formula: 80% of investment income and 100% of money raised in fundraising events are given out to charities each year. The president has the honor of choosing which charities will receive donations and how much they will receive.

Anyone can ask for donations. The remaining 20% of investment income remains in the fund to ensure growth. It can also be used for large projects such as the Play Scape that was donated several years ago. Club members can make individual donations to the Foundation, which are tax-deductible.

Habitat for Humanity was started in 1976 in Americus, GA, by Millard Fuller. Mr. Fuller said, "What the poor need is not charity but capital, not caseworkers but co-workers. And what the rich need is a wise, honorable and just way of divesting themselves of their overabundance."

Habitat has grown and has now built a quarter of a million homes and housed more than one million people around the globe.

In Macomb County, more than 100 families apply for homes two times a year. Only four to six families are chosen due to limitations in funding. The selection criteria are the level of need, the family's willingness to become partners in the program and contribute 250 hours (per adult) of sweat equity, and their ability to repay the loan. The Colchester Farms Community in Clinton Township is a Habitat subdivision.

Elle Wilson introduced herself as the head of the family that will purchase the Lee Family Build home. She is a single mom of two boys, she runs a daycare out of her home, and she is attending Baker College for her associate's degree. Her family is currently living in a trailer that has broken pipes every winter, intermittent electricity, a bad furnace, leaky windows and mold problems. She hopes that her new home will help her childcare business pick up, improve the health of her children, and help her children do better in school because they will be out of a stressful environment. She was very thankful to **Bill Lee** for his sponsorship of the new home which gives her family an opportunity to better themselves.

All of the speakers thanked the club members for their continued support of Macomb County Habitat for Humanity. The speakers presented **Bill Lee** with a special Habitat pin, shirt and a personalized hard hat in appreciation for all of his support for Habitat. All club members were invited to come out and help with the Lee Family Home build on Wednesday, June 11 and/or Saturday, June 14, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

#### <u>Speaker</u>

**B** ob Selwa introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Fred Pearson, to speak about the impact of the Rotary International World Peace Summit and opportunities for world peace today. Bob started by saying, "The news of events is exciting. The news of people is fascinating. The news of ideas is often the news of most lasting significance."



Dr. Fred Pearson is a professor of international relations at Wayne State University and is the director of the university's Center for Peace and Conflict Studies. He is a member of the Detroit Rotary Club.

Fred informed the club that the WSU Center for Peace and Conflict Studies is proud to present the Ralph Bunche Summer Institute for youth. This summer institute is one of six sites designated by the State Department to host 18 Middle Eastern students this summer. The students will be exposed to civic engagement in the United States. They will spend four weeks in Detroit, and then spend a week in Chicago and a week in New Orleans to learn about good government and pluralism and bargaining among ethnic communities. The students will also visit Rotary Clubs and shadow Rotarians to see civic engagement in action in the community.

The Rotary International World Peace Summit in Windsor, Ontario, in April 2008 was very successful. Over 1,000 people attended the summit, representing 24 countries. One of the results of the summit is that district 6400 passed a resolution to petition Rotary International to have all Rotary Clubs in the world ask that their town be a designated "peace zone."

Fred said that there are three ways to promote peace:

- Peace Keeping keeping a cease fire or peace agreement going.
- Peace Making negotiating peace agreements, mediation.
- Peace Building village level improvement of human conditions. This is the staple that keeps things stable in the world.

of the homeless people are very grateful for clean bottled water. He asked **Rolf Schroeter** to name the African apparel he (John) was wearing. Rolf offered dashiki, but that wasn't the correct name. John clued the table that it is also the word for a child's contusion or abrasion . . . Boo Boo. The table contributed \$1 each.



#### Speaker

**B c b s e l w a** introduced the guest speaker. Before he introduced him, he reminded the club of next week's program: Roger Cram of Hiram College in Ohio will be here to discuss the common qualities of successful world peacemakers.

The speaker this week was our own **Bob Baker**. Bob has been a member of our club since 1972, with eighteen years of perfect attendance, and a term as president. Bob was the Rotary International District 6380 Governor from 2004-2005. He and his wife, Margo, have hosted eight Rotary exchange students from around the world.



Bob spoke on the topic of The Emerging Role of Rotary Around the World Today. He said there are 1.2 million Rotary members around the world, in 33,000 clubs, in over 200 countries/geographic areas. He spoke about three main focuses of Rotary International: polio eradication, clean water, and literacy.

#### **Polio Eradication**

The polio eradication effort started in 1985 with a club in California. In 1988, Rotary International set the goal to eradicate polio around the world by 2005. While we are not there yet, significant progress has been made. In 1990, there were 300,000 cases of polio around the world; by 2007, there were only 1,320!

As of May 15, 2008, there are only 420 cases of polio around the world. Only four regions still have polio endemic to them: Afghanistan, Pakistan, Northern India and Nigeria.

Rotarians have contributed \$600 million to the effort to eradicate polio. Rotary partners with the World Health Organization (WHO), the United Nations, the U.S. Center for Disease Control, and other government entities around the world. The WHO has determined that the world must wait three years after the last case of polio is reported in order to consider polio eradicated.

#### Clean Water

1.5 billion people in the world do not have access to clean water. Three billion people (almost half the world's population) do not have access to proper sanitation. Rotary is working to mitigate and eliminate these issues.

#### Literacy

Our club works with the Macomb Literacy Partners for this effort. Other clubs in Metro Detroit do dictionary projects, distributing dictionaries to elementary school children. Another Rotarian has equipped 12 libraries in Guatemala with basic textbooks.

Bob also discussed projects that are funded by our club and the Macomb Rotary Foundation: Group Study Exchange, Ambassadorial Scholarships, the six World Peace Centers, and matching grants programs. He reminded everyone that *all* of these efforts are funded by Rotarians. He also mentioned the Every Rotarian Every Year fundraising campaign. This encourages every Rotarian to donate \$100 to Rotary each year.

#### <u>Speaker</u>

**B** ob Selwa introduced our speaker, Roger Cram, a professor who has been studying what attributes great leaders share. He was a speaker at Rotary International's fourth and final Peace Summit this year, which was held on April 25 in Windsor, Ontario. At the summit, a motion from the floor passed unanimously that Rotary International should strive to bring about world peace like it is working on polio through a challenge to its membership.





Roger gave a stirring description of how several of his identified 100 World Heroes faced incredibly difficult challenges. I was moved nearly to tears from a couple of the descriptions.

Roger identified 16 Attributes that World Heroes of Peace use to accomplish amazing feats against utmost adversity. Examples include: when engaging your adversaries, always maintain their dignity; always maintain a working relationship with people who you don't like or respect; encourage change; embrace problem solving; and use obstacles as opportunities for growth.

He summed it up with this phrase – World Heroes are magnificent people performing magnificently at their finest hour.

ur speakers were our guests from Macomb County Drug Court. Keith was the first to speak, giving us a brief history of Drug Court. Keith was inspired by the Kalamazoo Drug Court, and their success, and decided to try it in Macomb County. Although Judge Druzinski and Judge Biernat were initially skeptical of the concept, they decided to try it here and have since realized tremendous success. Drug Court is a unique program that helps repeat convicted drug abusers get back on their feet, utilizing different programs.



One of the unique things is that it has law enforcement, and drug abusers working together to

find solutions toward recovery and reconciliation. One success story is Joann Horrigan, a 45-year-old woman from West Bloomfield. Joann was a successful swimmer in high school. She had Olympics goals and aspirations that were cut short when she was cut from the team because of drinking, and getting drunk. (Part of the "jock" culture) From that she quickly spiraled down into heroin abuse, and began an odyssey of drug and alcohol abuse that spanned over

20 years. After total alienation of her family and all of her friends, and three stints in prison, she was able to get into the Drug Court program.

With much hard work and perseverance and cooperation with law enforcement, Joann has been able to get back on her feet, get a job, secure long term housing, and get a brand new car, something that she has never had before. She is now over 18 months clean, and is now in process of reconciling with family and friends. Joann says that the most amazing thing is that she is able to now sit and have lunch with judges, whereas before when she was in the presence of judges, she was usually in handcuffs, leg-irons, and led in through the back door into court rooms. Drug Court is truly a most remarkable program. Thank you Joann for sharing your story with us.

Jeff also said that 2/3 of the world's plant species are located in South Africa. Land is being bought up at an alarming rate in South Africa, often times by celebrities, and these land owners have quite a tax burden to help support the local indigenous people. Jeff also said that some of the world's best wine and cheese comes from South Africa. This was a most interesting program. Thank you very much for sharing it with us Jeff!
