#### **SPEAKER**

ur speaker was Ron Kagan, Executive Director of the Detroit Zoo. He came to discuss with us a ballot initiative that will be decided by voters in Macomb, Oakland and Wayne Counties on August 5. In order to close the public subsidy funding gap which was created in 2006 when the City of Detroit turned over full responsibility of the Detroit Zoo to the Detroit Zoological Society (DZS), the voters in these three counties will be asked to approve a millage which would levy 0.10 mill on all taxable property for a period of 10 years. If the millage passes, it would provide the community with a world-class zoo for generations to come. Executive Director Kagan asked us to consider the fact that this will cost the average family with a \$200,000 home \$10 per year.

Mr. Kagan pointed out that all zoos in Ohio and most zoos nationally have this kind of funding through their local government, or through a special tax. Funds provided by our zoo millage would be a fraction of the public funding received by other major zoos. For example, the Toledo Zoo receives public funding of 1.85 mill. The funding which voters are being asked to approve for the Detroit Zoo is for operations and infrastructure.

Mr. Kagan noted that 1.1 million visitors visit the Detroit Zoo per year. It is the number one tourist attraction in the State of Michigan. The Zoo consists of 125 acres of land and 3,000 animals made up of 270 different species. The Zoo has 200 employees and 1,000 volunteers. 20% of its workforce comes from Macomb County.

The Zoo's budget, which is approximately \$26,000,000, comes from revenue at the gates, donations and public subsidies. For 70 years, up to 2006, the City of Detroit subsidized the Zoo. In 2006 there was a transition when the DZS assumed responsibility for this subsidy. Our State

approved legislation to allow counties to create zoo authorities to fund the DZS, and all three counties, with Macomb leading the way, have created such authorities.



Mr. Kagan noted that 98% of the visitors to the Zoo say in surveys that their expectations of the Zoo were met after they visited it. 92% of the people surveyed believe that it is important that the Zoo be available for future generations. Mr. Kagan expressed his hope that the community will support this millage. We will begin seeing advertisements and billboards in the near future as the August 5 election approaches.

The DZS is a 501(C)(3) nonprofit institution. It is governed by a board of directors selected from its 55,000 members.

Mr. Kagan hopes that all three counties will pass this millage request as each county decides separately whether to approve this funding. Mr. Kagan presented as an intelligent, well-spoken advocate on behalf of the DZS.

#### Guest Speaker

**Frank Cunningham** of the Leader Dogs for the Blind provided the club with an overview of his organization's activities. He was accompanied by his Leader Dog named Bowman, a beautiful three-year-old black Lab that stayed at his side during the presentation.

Headquartered in Rochester, Michigan, the Leader Dogs for the Blind was founded in 1939 and has provided more than 14,000 dogs to recipients. The organization annually provides 240 dog guides. The dogs are provided free of charge, despite the fact that it costs thousands of dollars to raise and train each pup.

Each pup is raised by families for a year prior to undergoing a 16-week training program that consists of handling procedures over 3-5 miles daily on the streets of Rochester, Royal Oak and Birmingham. Frank said it usually takes another year for the dog to become a fullyseasoned guide dog. Most dog



guides are chocolate, black or golden Labs, but Standard Poodles are now becoming very popular. Frank likes to describe a Standard Poodle as a Lab having a very bad hair day.

The presentation so moved **Bill Furest** that he donated \$50 to the Leader Dogs for the Blind.

**rt Mullen** then introduced our speakers, **Don Green**, Cindy Sue Donahue and **Joe Peruzzi** who were the creative team behind the DVD we then saw entitled "Mount Clemens: The Bath City of America."



Don Green said he got the idea to produce the DVD when he was asked a question why Mount Clemens was called the Bath City. He realized that many new people had come to Mount Clemens, totally unaware of the city's past history and that here was a story worth telling.

Through the use of old photographs, postcards and interviews with residents who remembered the bath era, the story unfolded of a failed attempt to find oil in the 1880s resulting in the discovery of waters containing more mineral content than any in the world. An industry was born that brought 50,000 people each summer to Mount Clemens,



coming from all over the world. Our Bath City hotels were comparable to other famous spas, e.g., Saratoga Springs, Baden Baden. At its heyday there were 70 hotels and boarding houses in Mount Clemens, some as luxurious as the Grand Hotel on Mackinac Island. People spent a maximum of 30 minutes in a mineral bath a day and then were massaged by bath attendants known locally as "rubbers." Their treatments lasted 21 days. Many came on crutches and left dancing their way to the train. For entertainment they would sit on the front porches of the hotels, wearing their bathrobes and watching the traffic. For the more adventuresome, gambling and prostitution houses sprang up, including the Crocker House that offered gambling.

Don pointed out the rotten egg smell of the mineral waters was not due to the minerals themselves, but the sulfur dioxide gas that was released when the wells were opened. There are operating wells today and people can still take the mineral baths at two locations.





Copies of the DVD are available for \$15. Cindy Donahue, dressed in 19<sup>th</sup> century attire, then invited people to see her display of Bath City memorabilia displayed on a table.



uzanne Pixly, chair of the Macomb County Historical Commission, came to the podium to announce the winner of the 2008 Alexander Macomb Award. This year there are two winners: Pat Holdman and the Belleview School in Eastpointe.

**ris Miele** introduced speaker Jeff White from the Richmond Rotary Club. He is the EMS chief in Richmond and Lenox Township. Jeff talked about the tragedy of home fires and how pets frequently are unnecessary victims. With an estimated 60 million households having pets in the United States, an estimated 40,000 die each year in house fires.

Although pets have the instinct to flee danger the result is that many end up going into the basement and other areas of homes where they are not found until it is too late. In any fire the first priority is to get any people out, then to put the fire out. Jeff said that in many cases the family watches from a distance as all of their possessions go up in flames. It is a terrible feeling as a responder to then have to carry out the dead pet and find a respectful place to put it.



Recently Jeff read about a fire department that had partnered with a local vet to obtain special oxygen masks that could be carried on the fire trucks to treat pets. Animals have a remarkable ability to endure hardship and they found that with minimal training and the pet-sized masks many pets could be saved.

Jeff's department even had a chance to use the masks about three weeks after they obtained them. Two of three cats were saved after a house fire. Jeff said that the family's grief at losing their home changed significantly to safely receive their "babies" back. As so many people observe, homes and belongings can generally be easily replaced; people and pets cannot. The masks cost \$150 for a kit of three and can be reused two to three times.

B Selwa then introduced today's speaker and presentation ... Heroes of



the Great Depression – Our World Champion Detroit Tigers with Bernie Ostrowski and Bob Selwa.

Bob and Bernie provided a very entertaining program today with Bob asking questions regarding the Great Depression and the 1935 Tigers and Mr. Ostrowski providing answers.

Bernie Ostrowski of Armada, a retired truck driver, a U.S. Army Rangers veteran of World War II and a great family man. Bernie was born in 1926 and grew up on the east side of Detroit, his family tremendously impacted by the Great Depression. Bernie grew up in an avid baseball family as his Dad was a semi pro ball player in Detroit.

Bob asked Bernie about 1935 and his family experiencing the Great Depression? Bernie's answer was very simple ... unless you lived through it you truly do not understand what is like for everyone to have next to nothing. The people of today do not understand the hardships people went through. Bernie stated that everyone loved the Tigers and that Detroit was a very friendly city. He fondly remembers everyone having a great time and he



enjoyed watching everyone celebrate. Which players were your favorites and why? Mickey Cochrane, because he

was a manager and player and most likely the best catcher that ever played. Hank Greenberg because he was just so good at playing the game, Tommy Bridges because he had the best curve ball in baseball at the time, Charlie Gehringer and Billy Rogell for being the double play combination and Marv Owen for not only being a good player but he had huge hands and could hold eight or nine baseballs in one hand. How do you feel about Hank Greenberg's contributions to baseball and Detroit?

He was a clutch hitter and great fielder, an all-star first basemen that eventually became a very good outfielder later in his career. He was an excellent baseball guy and gentlemen. He also gave up five years in the prime of his career to serve in the military.

Many Rotarians also had questions for Bernie concerning the 1935 Tigers and the way the City of Detroit was many years ago.

Thank you Bernie and Bob for sharing an excellent program with us today.

ur program was about the Macomb County Rotary Foundation, and the Mount **Clemens Rotary Foundation. This** program was given by **Ted** DeVantier, and past president Bob Morris. First up was Ted. The Macomb County Rotary Foundation goes back to the 1920s when the Mount Clemens Rotary Club bought in northern Macomb County for Camp Rotary. Camp Rotary was sold to Huron Clinton in 1996, and the proceeds from that sale established the Macomb County Rotary Foundation. The sub goals are to



continue projects with the camp, with matching grants from Macomb County. Christine LaTour is also with the Macomb County Rotary Foundation. Since '97, the foundation has distributed \$220,000 to various Macomb County Rotary clubs, with \$100,000 coming back to the Mount Clemens Rotary. There is \$450,000 in the fund now.

The Clawson and Madison Heights Rotary Clubs are also involved with the Macomb County Rotary Foundation. The Wolcott Mill is also a part park facility, and is adjacent.

Bob Morris was our next speaker, describing the Mount Clemens Rotary Foundation. The Mount Clemens Rotary Foundation is a 501(c)(3), filed with the state of Michigan in 1990. Its charitable purpose according to bylaws is to "Receive, administer and disburse funds for charitable, educational and scientific purposes, all for the public welfare." The means to raise funds most commonly are through club fund-raisers. It is designated noncommercial, nonsectarian, nonpartisan. The foundation consists of seven members, who are: president Nancy Dedenbach, first vice president Jeff Furest, Bob Morris, **Ron Reed, and Don Torline**. Two directors-at-large are **Sue Diener** and **Don Carnaghi**. The immediate past president of the club is the foundation president, and the current club president is the foundation vice president. The secretary and treasurer are as elected by the board. The foundation meets the last Thursday of the month of the start of each new quarter at the Zion Church library.

Recent activity focused on two things; began last fiscal year reviewing and possibly reallocating investments of assets of \$250,00 and familiarizing the parameters that control that investment. Also establishing a mission statement -- investment philosophy use of funds. Don Carnaghi was asked to form a committee of financial advisors from the club that includes Don, Jeff Furest, **John Walendowski, Julie Huttenlocher and Kris Miele.** The committee developed a mission statement, with a major contribution from **Jeff Furest**. Jeff put together an investment policy statement, which includes balanced growth, to be re-balanced as necessary after quarterly review, to be reviewed by financial subcommittee.

All donations to the fund are tax-deductible. The seven standing categories for donation are:

#### <u>Program</u>



Use speaker of the day was Chuck Pottenger, executive director of the Lupus Alliance of Michigan and Indiana. He was here to educate us and dispel some myths surrounding the condition of lupus. Lupus is a common disease that affects one to 1.5 million people nationwide. It is an autoimmune disease, which means that it is a condition of which the body is attacking itself. It has been called the opposite of AIDS because instead of depleting the body of defenses like AIDS does, its defenses become overactive and start attacking many parts of the body and its systems. The cause of lupus is not known. Its



pathomechanics are idiopathic. Even though both men and women get the disease, 90 percent of all patients are women. It is a disease that can attack any part of the body. Most patients will have no outward manifestations of the disease, and are not outwardly apparently ill. Symptoms, however, can be wide and varied. Manifestations most commonly occur at the end stages of the disease. Treatments can include stem cell transplant, and or chemo therapy. The Lupus Alliance has a goal of reaching 50,000 people through a campaign of handing out bookmarks for a donation. Some of you may have taken an envelope with bookmarks. The idea is for you to keep the laminated one, and hand out the rest for a donation. Funds can then be sent in the self-addressed envelope included in the packet. Also there is a Walk for Lupus, Saturday, September 27. The walk begins at 11 a.m. at Metro Beach Metro Park, in Harrison Township. If you hurry, the first 500 to preregister gets a free gift.

#### Speaker

A ssistant Governor, Sandy Pradk introduced District Governor, Stan Sherman. Stan is a member of the Rotary Club of Royal Oak. He served as club president 1971-72 and currently is on the Scholarship/STRIVE Programs mentoring two high school students. He



has served many years on the club's auction committee, the



principal fund raising event. Stan also served the district as the co-chair for Polio Eradication and Coordinator of the jaguar ticket sales with District 6400 for the 2002 Woodward Dream Cruise which netted R.I.'s Polio Eradication \$375,000 after a matching grant from the Gates Foundation and the World Bank.

Stan was employed for more than 30 years at *The Daily Tribune* in Oakland County, many as its business manager and assistant treasurer. After leaving the newspaper, he was the sole owner and president of a sheet metal fabrication shop in Livonia. After



selling his shop, Stan joined Berridge & Morrison Commercial Real Estate as a sales associate where he is currently employed. Stan served more than 20 years as a member of the Board of Directors of the National Bank of Royal Oak, which is now Citizens Bank of Flint.



He was awarded the City of Royal Oak's 2005 Distinguished Citizen of the Year, which is given to a person who has contributed to the well-being of fellow residents by giving tirelessly of their time and energy without the desire of recognition, remuneration or

personal gain. In 2003 he was awarded The Royal Oak Historical Society's Dr. Joseph S. Morrison Award named for a person helping to preserve Royal Oak's past and shaping its future. Stan and his wife Serena Sherman have been married since 1971. They have no children but their six year-old Lab requires a great deal of their time. Stan's hobbies are hunting, fishing, golfing, walking and history. Stan shared Rotary International's President, D.K. Lee's mission. He wants to *Make Dreams Real for the Children of the World*. He reports that 30,000 children under the age of five die every day of preventable diseases. More people like

pediatricians Linda and Jay Eastman from the Rochester Club are needed. They went to Guatemala and saw children dying of lockjaw because of poor sanitation practices. Instruments used to cut umbilical cords after birth were not sterile. The Eastmans taught midwives about sanitation so that babies would have a better survival rate.



Stan emphasized the important work that Rotary does eradicating polio, promoting literacy, providing wheelchairs, and improving water quality. However, he says that it is important to make it fun. He joked that when he was asked to become president of the Royal Oak club, he was told that a bachelor has never been president, so he would have to get married. A lawyer in the club told him that if it didn't work out that he would get him an annulment for free. He married his wife of over 30 years in 1971 before he became president, and he has never taken the lawyer up on his offer. Rotary is a serious business, but we have fun doing it. It is important to support your president and your board. Membership in many clubs is declining. Over the past year we have lost two former District Governors and one assistant governor. Ask someone who wants to give back to the community to join Rotary. Stan has been in sales all of his life, and he says that it is important



to "Get Your Ask in Gear." Let people know that you need help. At the end of his talk he donated a banner to the club with the Rotary International mission: *Make Dreams Real.*

ur program was given by Carl D. Harlow, senior project manager with Testing Engineers and Consultants, Inc. He was introduced by **Kris Miele**. His program was "Survival in a Dynamic

Energy Environment – Meeting Challenges in 2008." Carl took us through some of the energy and economic trends that dominated the few decades, starting in the '70s. He cited our involvement in Vietnam, with the concurrent Arab oil embargo in '73. Also, Japanese automobile import encroachment. Also included were the controversies with nuclear power, such as the Three Mile Island incident in spring 1979. Gas in the '70s hovered around 50 cents a gallon, on average. The eighties saw a recession. There was further encroachment on the American auto industry by the Japanese. Congress imposed importation limits in foreign cars. Lee Iacocca went to Congress in '82 and got a bailout for Chrysler, and no new nuclear plants were built. Gas was about \$1.20 a gallon. The '90s saw a good economy, with foreign auto makers now building cars on U.S. soil. Detroit is shifting its focus to truck and SUV manufacturing.

The Korean automakers are emerging in the U.S.

market. No new nuclear plants were being built, still. Suburban sprawl hits the outer edges of urban areas. And gas is still about \$1.20 a gallon. Energy is still relatively cheap.

The start of the 21<sup>st</sup> century saw changes on the horizon. 2001 brought the attack on our nation, September 11, 2001. Half the country was blacked out in a massive power outage in August 2003, due to failures in the power grid in the eastern half of this continent. Energy is starting to emerge once again as a "hot topic." The Japanese automakers are doing well, however, the U.S. economy is starting to sputter.

Energy consumption in China is starting to go up. It's become apparent that an energy plan is needed. We need to reduce our dependence on foreign oil, and enhance awareness of energy concerns. We should also look at alternative energy resources such as wind, solar, and geothermal energy. So what's the connection to Rotary? Carl feels that Rotary should spearhead energy initiatives, and possibly get other Rotary clubs on board to help face some of these challenges. He feels that through these efforts, we may be also be able to attract new members, and change some of the ways that we do things in Rotary. These are some very compelling issues and ideas.
