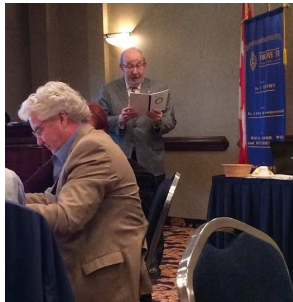


Flowers

SUNSHINE REPORTS

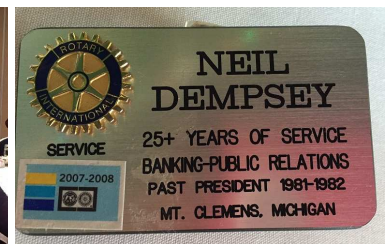

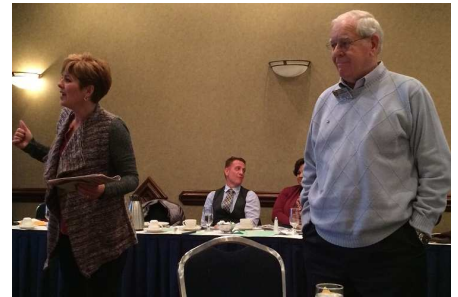
Jackie Johnston was then recognized for her appearance in *The Macomb Daily* with regard to the upcoming non homestead millage.

SPEAKER PRESENTATION

Today we had the pleasure of having one of our own present to us. That being **Mike O'Connor**. For those who don't know, Mike is a dentist. His presentation was on Oral Systemic Connection which turned out to be not nearly as boring as the title would suggest.

Mike started out by explaining what this means which was a big relief to this scribe who was concerned about remaining awake. Oral Systemic Connection is the study of how things going on in your mouth affect other things in your body or vice versa. Per Mike, the mouth is the window to your body.



Periodontal disease is very common and can lead to bacterial infections. 80% of people have gingival infections caused by the large amount of bacteria that is in the mouth. This same bacteria can and often does lead to respiratory diseases. When gums bleed, this invites that same bacteria into the blood stream which can lead to cardio vascular problems. MDs often ignore the possibility of this root cause of either of these problems. People who have diabetes often have gum problems and new studies have shown that this bacteria can also have adverse effects on insulin regulation. Mike makes it clear that dentistry is often overlooked by MDs who never seem to send their patients to their dentist or even inquire whether the patient has or sees a dentist at all; furthermore, most MDs would not even think of asking if their patients going into surgery have any infections in their mouths although similar infections elsewhere in the body would mean postponing the surgery.

Mike also talked of how rheumatoid arthritis, dementia and Alzheimer's Disease may have some connection to oral hygiene. One area in particular where dentists are usually the first to diagnose something is with cancer, as many times cancers manifest themselves with lesions in the mouth. This is not limited to oral cancers, but all cancers. Usually when the dentist is the first to see these things, the outcome is not good as the cancer has usually bedded itself in pretty good by the time it is noticed.

In addition to these things dentists also help sleep apnea patients by making appliances and those who have salivation problems.

Following a productive fundraising committee meeting, President **Kristine Howell** moved into the banquet center room at the Italian American Cultural Center and called the meeting to order promptly at 12:15. **Melissa Gladieux-Jackson** led the Pledge of Allegiance and **Mark Zuccaro** gave the prayer.



Since the lunch was still in preparation for the servers, President Kris moved up her weekly report. She announced that the board had officially voted to make the Italian American Center our permanent home with only a few more meetings at the ConCorde Inn, including the Dec. 17 meeting featuring the Fraser High singers. The date of the move will be announced sometime in January.

Perry Como (it was the sweater). **Tom Isett** lost \$3 for using his cell phone.

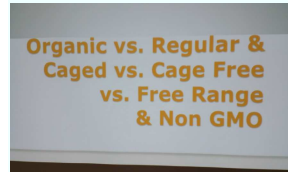
In what has to be the most unusual event for a fine, **Meghan Kindsvater** is getting in her 19-foot van and traveling the country alone for 4 ½ months. That's quite an adventure and is sure to result in some fantastic photos. Tom fined her \$5.

All MSU grads paid \$5. Bill Furest contributed \$3 for not having any signatures on his arm cast, but Jeff offered to pay. **Sarah Lee** paid \$3 for being featured in a recent newspaper column and Tom said he wanted her to make sure brother **Bob** paid \$5 for the same column.

The speaker was our own Bill (Colonel Sanders) Patterson who gave us the low-down on the differences between chickens: organic vs. regular, caged vs. cage free, caged free vs. free range.



The bottom line is, as Dr. Patterson noted, the bottom line. And unless you want to pay \$8 to \$10 a dozen for eggs from "pasture raised" chickens, you are

buying eggs from chickens that are raised in somewhat crowded conditions. The doctor, who has a poultry science degree from Michigan State and a veterinarian degree from Ross University, also noted there are little differences in the gradings listed on egg cartons. And the color of the eggs have nothing to do with quality.

The goal of chicken farmers is to have each chicken lay an egg a day but in most cases each chicken totals about 200 a year.

Still, we buy 7.5 billion eggs each month. And Doc Patterson didn't answer – probably because he wasn't asked – what comes first, the chicken or the egg?

The 50-50, worth \$47, was won again by Val Miller.

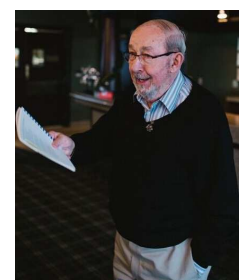
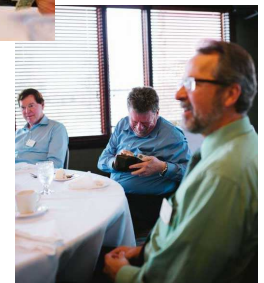
