### PROGRAM

Doug introduced Tara Walluck, who is here today to tell us about her experience in Denmark as an exchange student. She put on her Rotary jacket with all the buttons she acquired while in Europe.

Tara was really enthusiastic about her experience abroad, she positively glowed when describing the 3 components of being an exchange student - Rotary, families and school. She said all 3 were wonderful .

There were 250 members of the Rotary group. They had monthly meetings, including a Costume Halloween party. Since Halloween is an American celebration, the US kids had the most creative costumes. The European teenagers are allowed to drink alcoholic drinks, therefore her counselor told her to act drunk at parties and she would blend in.

Rotary took the students on a European bus tour. Rotary meetings were on Wednesdays, which included dinner + boat trip.

At the last party, the students dressed up like Vikings and paraded thru the streets to the amazement of the Danes.

Families - It was rough at first before she understood Danish, but they all made her feel at home. One mother insisted Tara eat breakfast as that is considered important. She stayed with 3 families - each one taught her something different, all treated her as a member of their family.

School - Kids allowed to bring their computers and use them for class and exams. Difficulty of learning Danish was a barrier in the beginning

Differences - Even the small things are different. You buy food in kilos - not pounds, liquids in liters (even gasoline is sold by the liter, it makes it seem cheaper since a liter is a large quart). Unit of money is a krone (worth about 15¢).

Distances are measured in kilometers. There are no inches or feet - only centimeters, decameters, meters. Temperature is in Centigrade not Fahrenheit  $0^{\circ}C = 32^{\circ}F$ .  $20^{\circ}C = 68^{\circ}F$ ,  $100^{\circ}C = 212^{\circ}F$  At least they drive on the right side of the road

You can see how confusing this is at first. Teachers are called by their first names. Children learn to ride bikes at 2 years old (without training wheels). Bicycles are a major means of transportation in Europe and cars are small because the price of gas is so high. Smoking is allowed at school - in fact they have 10 minute smoking "breaks" at school.

Health & dental services are free. They do not have "finger food". The fork is held in the left hand and the knife in the right hand to push the food on to the fork or to cut meat. Only Americans put down the knife and change the fork to the right hand. Hamburgers are eaten by using a knife and fork. They bring packed lunches to school. In restaurants, nothing is free. You pay for water and bread, but Europeans usually do not have bread with dinner. Tara enjoyed living in Denmark, after she got home she saved her money and flew to Denmark to celebrate a friend's birthday.

She thanked our club for giving her this awesome experience.
