Claudia Becker (of the Big Picture) was selected for this honor for all her contributions to our Valley.

Program

Henri introduced Deb van Dyke, a Nurse Practitioner with the M.R. Medical Center. Deb told us she has a master's degree in Public Health and has spend several years working with the Doctors without Borders Organization. This organization was formed by French doctors in 1971 and now exists in 60 different countries.

Their 27,000 workers include international staff workers and locals. They provide mobile medical care in war zones, refugee camps in areas of devastation.

She showed slides from: Thailand, Afghanistan, several war zones in Africa, famine zones in India, epidemic areas of cholera, AIDs, HIV, meningitis in So. Africa. Her organization has provided care in all the worst places, in spite of bombings. Security can be a big problem.

Also they have provided food for thousands of children suffering with malnutrition.

In the Sudan (an area 1/3 the size of the US) people are walking everywhere. There are no roads, they live in mud huts in an area terrorized by the Arab government. Two million

people have been killed. Her organization has established a Health Care Center. Their 3 main treatments are for malaria, pneumonia and diarrhea in addition to war wounds and childhood complications. They are the only medical facility for hundreds of miles. In order to treat 250 people per day, they must train local workers. Only 10% of their staff are international workers, the rest are locals. The locals have been trained to vaccinate the tribes.

Debbie said her reason for doing this work is that she has always felt compelled to help the homeless as well as native Americans, thus Doctors without Borders naturally followed - to help people with little resources and to train people with little education. She feels the rewards are great and goes on a mission for 4 or 5 months.
