Editor's note-to Stan Needleman -Sometimes the note takers can't see or hear clearly the person making the Happy Buck remarks. For accurate reporting, we need the person to stand up, speak slowly and distinctly and have the room quiet, otherwise we may even miss you altogether.

PROGRAM

Wini explained that when she failed the Vt. driving exam the first time, she had a good driver's discount from her insurance and she felt the exam was not about driving as much as following Vt. rules to the letter. Yielding on left turns to oncoming traffic, and the 3 procedures: Parallel parking, a Vt. U-turn and stopping on a hill, list 4 - 7 possible errors each. An error scores a minimum of 2 demerits. Thus you can fail on even one bad procedure.

To pass you are allowed 21 demerits. It is so easy to acquire demerits on any of the procedures, that she decided the only way she could pass was to take lessons in Montpelier with an instructor. She contacted the John Lynch Driving School and John turned out to be her savior.

John explained that he usually teaches teenagers accompanied by their parents. He distributed plastic steering wheels, with numbers arranged like a clock. The proper way to hold a steering wheel is to place your hands on the 3 & 9 positions, thus if an airbag goes off, it won't hit your hands.

He said there is a transportation bill coming up in the legislature related to using cell phones while driving. He demonstrated that a cell phone blocks your vision and its difficult to signal while holding a cell phone. He feels there is too much multi-tasking going on when people drive.

He called his grandmother and was shocked to learn that she was talking to him on her cell phone while driving. If an accident occurs while the driver is using a cell phone, the penalty is doubled.

He wants people to use "yoga" technique - i.e. looking around while driving. He showed a chart on how to use the mirrors a lot to check blind spots when turning. He noted that www.seniors.org. (AARP) has driving tips and he recommended that people read their owner's manual when buying a new car to learn how to use all the new gadgets.

As we age, things change, such as flexibility, night vision, reaction time; we may have to change driving habits, do more car pooling, cut down on long trips at night for example.

For everybody, keep windshields clean, check tire pressure (low pressure causes increased gas consumption as well as increased risk of accidents). In summary, pay more attention to your driving to avoid accidents.
