Editor's note: I forgot to ask for help with Happy Bucks today, so the quotes may be a little off the wall. When I can't see the person, I have to guess who is speaking.

PROGRAM

Joe Koch introduced Jay Kearns of the MRV Interfaith Council, the "guy in the bucket" these days. It is a quiet organization. The reason for being quiet is that they give emergency help to needy people in the Valley and don't want to advertise what they do.

History - There was a clergyman who discovered that some people in the Valley needed food and he collected food in his office to help them out.

This organization tries to restrict their aid to people in the Valley as their resources are very limited. There are many organizations outside of our Valley.

Topics to discuss:

- 1) Emergency help
- 2) Food Shelf
- 3) Joys of the season
- 4) Thanksgiving Program

Emergency help - is the quietest item for reasons of privacy. A committee of 7 runs it, most referrals - people who need immediate help, come from the clergy or other organizations.

- 1) Lack of fuel, we give immediate help for a small amount of money other programs may take days or even months to set up.
- 2) Car broke down and person needs to get to work every day, the council responds rapidly thru calls or e-mails. The person will be asked "Have you contacted any other organizations?"

They are not talking about large amounts of money - limit is \$750/year. It is less now as funds are short - limit \$300

This year was not a lot greater than previous years. They can only give an amount that will not break the fund. If a person needs help every month, they have to go elsewhere.

They do not pay money to individuals; they pay the organization supplying the service.

The Community Fund helps with larger things - such as a new roof

For an emergency (help within 24 hours), only 3 members are required to say yes and may even hand deliver to supplier. Beyond emergencies, they refer the person to the Community Fund.

The Food Shelf Program is an independent organization - grew out of the office of a clergyman and has grown over time. It's located downstairs at Evergreen Place and is well stocked with food now. Hours are mornings on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. A sandwich board is set up in front of Evergreen Place when the shelf is open.

Food comes from many different sources - Vt. Food Bank (some food purchased, some free), churches who give food/money, local farms, Mehurons and Shaws. The stores donate or sell at low rates and finally, schools have food drops. Last year, 772 households were served- 1,311 people. Some come regularly, others only a few times.

If you wish to donate, the most popular items are tuna fish, coffee fresh eggs, milk, ground beef, beans, juice, and cereal. DO NOT BRING OPENED PACKAGES. In summer, veggies from your garden are welcome. Cleaning supplies are also welcome.

Joys of the season - Voucher program for children. Money is used to buy vouchers. Businesses in town accept vouchers from parents as payment for toys, etc., and then redeem the vouchers from the Council.

Thanksgiving Day baskets. Food is collected by the Council and made into baskets for needy families. Schools, churches and others supply the names of the families to receive the baskets, thus privacy is kept for the families. Last year 65 baskets were distributed.

All help is voluntary. Some members are repaid for mileage and telephone expenses, others do it for free. Thus expenses are low, less than \$1,000/year. It is an extremely efficient organization.
