PROGRAM

Billy introduced his wife, Wendy from the Green Mountain Cultural Center. He did not know how many of us have seen the opera. This is a world class production. Our area is becoming well known for these productions and they had many applicants from both the US and Europe. We can watch rehearsals for free. He did not know much about opera, but now he loves it.

Wendy used Billy's painting of Mimi holding a candle in her attic - as a prop for her talk. This painting has been copied for use as a poster to advertise the opera. Wendy is a 6th generation Vermonter.

When she first got involved with the Green Mountain Cultural Center they did not put on operas in the Valley but were dedicated o bring the arts to the valley. They sponsor 3 events per year:

- 1) Annual Photography Show
- 2) Art in the Round Barn
- 3) G.M. Opera Festival.

They pay for all the expenses themselves, therefore they need a lot of financial support. Over the last 7 years they have grown tremendously, their last year's budget was \$208,000 and brought in world class artists.

Since they cannot pay the singers a lot, the group puts up the singers in private homes. The singers put on their own productions, mingle with other artists and educate people about the arts.

They put out a guide for high school students and the students can watch the dress rehearsals. It is a great opportunity for kids, the artists will be here from May 27 to June 25. Performances include 6 free rehearsals at Sugarbush. They offer 4 master classes where professionals get training.

The Website has a list of all the activities starting with the Flynn Theater in Burlington and ending with the production of La Boheme at the Barre Opera House.

The drawings for the sets have been submitted. They will probably need support to do the construction and the painting. It will be a world class production with a an orchestra. It is really impressive what can be achieved by the small state of Vermont.

The tryouts attracted over 450 applicants last year from as far away as Europe. The support from the locals is phenomenal. Billy provides a free painting (worth \$10,000) every year. They sell lottery tickets @\$15 for the painting. Billy said he painted what it feels like to be a starving artist. Jim Leyton promptly bought a ticket.

The organization is composed of all volunteers, they pay a few part time for special jobs. Volunteers bring food and provide taxi service – comparable to a \$400,000 cost in other cities.

Our valley is a beautiful place, which helps bring singers here.

Joe Klimek said the construction of the sets will require 4 - 5 people. Painting will also require 4 - 5 people, then the sets must be transported to the Opera House in Barre. It takes 2 days to reconstruct the sets. Finally they must be returned to the Round Barn. Lots of help will be needed.

Wendy thanked us all for past help and contributions and hopes we will be there again this year.
