#### **PROGRAM**

Carol Hosford introduced her husband, Charlie, the founder of Project Harmony, which has been an exciting entity.

Charles told us that in 1985, 3 people from the Mad River Valley shared the idea that personal contact between people of the US and USSR could help ease the tensions of the

Cold War. They were committed to finding a way for young people from both nations to meet.

Project Harmony began in 1985 with the exchange of a delegation of U.S. teenagers from Harwood H.S. traveling to Leningrad, Russia. This was arranged after considerable effort on the part of the Americans and the Soviet Attache. After a few years, the Soviets sent over a group of young singers with their chaperons, (inc. 2 members of the KGB) hosted by American families. These host families were the first person-to-person contacts. This exchange proved so successful that people from all over the US were calling Charlie asking how to go about arranging for exchanging groups of students to go to the USSR.

By 1990, the original trio in Vermont had grown into a full-time staff of 6 with offices in Waitsfield and Leningrad. They expanded their scope to study pollution in both countries. Another program researched folk traditions and genealogy and explored each other's culture while doing so.

As the network of U.S. and overseas partners grew, they worked with small business leaders, educators and environmentalists to participate in the civil life and future development of one's community. Programs were started such as Business for Russia, Law Enforcement Exchange and the Domestic Violence Community Partnership.

To reflect the growth and diversity of their work, Project Harmony took on a new name: PH International. Created new program models, and incorporated PH's unique grassroots approach in different geographical regions.

Their Mission is still to build a strong global community by fostering civic leadership, harnessing Internet technology, and facilitating cross-cultural experiential learning.

In 2002, the PH staff grew to 140 members working in 6 countries, currently there are 10 US staff and 62 National staff working in all 6 offices.

Programs in these core program areas have reached close to half a million people via face-to-face exchanges, Internet connectivity and training programs and professional development programs.

Grant funding amounting to over \$75 million dollars since 1995 has been awarded to PH from the US Government (i.e. DOS/USAID) Foundations (SOROS) and Corporations (Microsoft, Intel) etc.

DOTCOM is the newest PH program, designed to inspire civic action thru social media. They are asking us to help them make this program a success.
