PROGRAM

Brian Crandell was finally in the Valley long enough to do his classification speech. His main residence is still in N.J. and his second home is in Waitsfield.

He was born in a small town near Rochester, N.Y. with a population about 1,500. That is probably why he likes small towns even though he lives in a residential area in N.J. at present. He learned to work hard in the fields, weeding etc. at the age of 10.

In old Vermont there were lots of bandstands. In his town the local band had 150 members, (he played trumpet) and they won the state championship for marching bands and gave concerts at the bandstands.

He was big in math, science and sports and still enjoys sports. He went to Union College, basically an engineering school, but also heavy on liberal arts

and learned to communicate well. Since his school was all male, he hitchhiked to meet girls

He is a civil engineer - designs bridges and highway. His first job was in N.J. supervising bridge construction. He was put on a construction team and within 3 years ran the whole job.

Met wife, Christine (had to give up motorcycle). They moved around a lot to various jobs doing underground work inc. N.Y.C. Then he bought a system from Germany which changed the way underground work was performed (less labor intensive). It can do deep trenching safely. Did pipelines without digging holes - the system was very innovative.

Most construction has been done the same way for 50 years - these people don't like change. Also international firms had cheap labor – didn't have to buy expensive machinery.

He was in Egypt when a manual system failed and they got the job to put in 90,000 feet of pipes in the pyramids. Then the contracts came pouring in and the new systems saved the customers money. In 1999 they got second Egyptian project using their own system on the ASWAN dam and made a name for themselves.

Now they have a guidance system to direct drilling accurately. His middle son is working with him to eventually take over the business. They have become dealers for a German company and are experts in their field.

Vermont history - He used his van to take his family on ski trips to every place in Vermont until they settled in So. Village at Sugarbush. They decided to live here and bought a house on Sherman Rd. in Waitsfield (his primary residence is still N.J.). He met a lot of people thru Rotary and feels the valley is a great place to live - lots of caring people.
