PROGRAM

Karen Winchell introduced Martin Hahn, new Executive Director of Community Capital of Vermont.

Martin has served as ED of the Central Vermont Land Trust (owners of Wheeler Brook, VerdMont Mobile Home Park, Mad Meadows, and Evergreen Place). He was also director at the Library in Montpelier and organized and directed a major fund raising campaign for them, and spent time in southern India as development director of a school. Most recently he was interim director of a housing group in the Springfield, VT area.

Community Capital started in 1991 to manage revolving loan funds for 15 towns. It became a stand-alone non-profit charitable corporation with members from all towns in Washington County. Chuck Allen served for many years as Fayston's rep

and Peter Laskowski served for Waitsfield. In 2004, Community Capital expanded to a state-wide organization.

Community Capital is a Community Development Finance Institution that lends money (up to \$50,000) to start-ups and micro businesses seeking to expand. It focuses on lower income entrepreneurs. The two major goals are to create wealth and to create jobs. There are many folks with great ideas for new businesses--but translating the ideas to a successful business is always a challenge especially then the entrepreneur has little experience with business planning and financial management. Securing reasonable capital for start-up is also a challenge. CCVT often works with banks to provide "gap" financing. CCVT has helped several businesses in the Valley.

It has loans out to agricultural and food products businesses, a web designer, professional service providers like bookkeepers, forest products, restaurants, a new company in the NEK that is making a maple flavored vodka and an indoor children's recreation park in Rutland. CCVT has capital of about \$3 million of which \$2 million is currently out in loans.

Martin asked that anyone who knows of an emergency entrepreneur that might benefit from CCVT's programs to get in touch. He also stressed that CCVT offers many opportunities for rewarding volunteer work. Some include membership on the Central Vermont Loan Committee (we have one member already from the Valley), or participation in one of the board's committee's like fundraising.
