PROGRAM

Debbie Boyer engages in Micro financing all over the World. Anyplace that is dangerous, she has been there (especially the Middle East and Asia).

She says after talking to many people around the state, that have knowledge about micro financing, it involves women particularly as they are the caregivers and deal with household finances.

Some loans are as small as \$100. This amount would go far in Cambodia for example, but not in Palestine where everything is expensive.

It helps the poor - people who can't get loans from a bank to start a small business, have to pay exorbitant interest to a Pawn Broker or loan shark. Even borrowing from families can cost 25%.

MFI combines social and financial aid. Credit Unions offer larger amounts.

Types of finance are individual loans also solidarity groups of 10 to 30 women who offer training, self-help and guarantee small loans. They evaluate each other.

In Afghanistan, women are not allowed out of the house without a man accompanying them. This makes marketing difficult.

MFI teaches groups how to evaluate a business that has no collateral. Examine its records. Talk to neighbors about their characters - are they trustworthy etc. The client's ability to repay the loan is vital.

Micro loans move people out of poverty; it does make a difference.

Banks can't do micro financing as it is too costly - they are not socially minded organizations, and require a higher profit margins.

To be successful, the Micro Financing groups must be sustainable after 5 years, otherwise they run out of capital.
