PROGRAM

Doug informed us that our speaker, Debi, started Martial Arts when she was 10 years old. She was a 3rd degree black belt at age 15. She taught Karate and especially women's defense for many years, that is how she put herself thru college.

When she was in her last semester at college, she was recruited by the Police academy in Sacramento, Calif. This was total serendipity as she was an English Major

After 18 years on the streets of Sacramento, she did a lot of defense tactics.

Now she hopes she can be successful helping those of us in our golden years to live them out in safety.

The center of the room was cleared for Debi to perform her demonstration of self preservation of seniors. Even though Vermont is a relatively safe place, she says we should not get too comfortable but keep up our awareness, like rebooting a computer.

Her husband, Sal, was a good sport and played the role of attacker.

Crimes against women are not just at night, many are in the daytime. Using martial arts, the victim uses the strength of her opponent against him. Thus when Sal attempted to attack Debi, either from the front or from behind, he wound up on the floor. Sometimes he was kicked in the process or hit with her handbag. Thus giving her time to get away from her attacker.

One way to give you an edge, is to carry your car keys in your fist, so that one is sticking out thru your fingers. This works better than brass knuckles as the point of the key against someone's face is very painful.

Always have a whistle attached to your key ring. Never call for help, as many people are afraid to get involved, but a whistle draws the attention of everyone, just what the attacker does not want.
