PROGRAM

Karen introduced Hal Cohen who comes from the Bronx and has been here since 1996. He has worked for many nonprofit organizations and spent 10 years in Israel, where he worked for nonviolent ways to solve problems.

Karen heard about his work with the CVCAC organization who help people to escape from poverty. The Vermont Council has a wide range of activities.

Hal expected to use his PC to show slides, but we did not have a screen, so he walked around the room with his computer screen photo of Jerusalem at night displaying the YMCA building where he ate and attended an English speaking Rotary Club meetings. The club members were Arabs, Christians and Jews. Their attire was formal and they were required to wear their pins or get fined.

Their current organization in Vermont is a 501(3c) nonprofit. Their mission is three fold 1) Alleviate suffering from poverty, 2) Advocate equal opportunity and 3) help move people out of poverty.

First they stabilize families with help from the Food Shelf. Then they connect to the Economic development program, helping small businesses and individual development accounts - matching savings a/cs to assist in buying a home or start a business.

They help with transportation by getting loans to buy a car and establish credit and get a job.

They have an early head start program for kids 0 - 3 years old. They get grants from the federal government for micro businesses operated from people's homes. They also help people get insurance at rates they can afford.

At present over 10% of Vermonters live in poverty and over 50% are not really making a living wage (\$80,000 for a family of 4). The Food Shelf is not just for emergency use any more, many families go to several Food Shelves to survive.

At present they have grants of \$5 million to be used for "Green" Technology and expect to train 300 employees. About 80% of their funds come from the federal government.

The organization has grown, now all the managers are under one roof in their new headquarters in a blighted area in Barre, Vt., with a staff of over 100 people.
