New Member Responsibilities

Attendance	Attending club meetings allows members to enjoy fellowship, enrich their professional and personal knowledge, and meet other business leaders in our community. Service	By participating in local and international service projects, club members can volunteer their time and talents where they are most needed.
Finding and keeping members	To keep clubs strong, every Rotarian shares the responsibility of bringing new people into Rotary. All members can bring guests to club meetings or invite them to participate in a service project. Keeping Rotarians involved is another responsibility. Fostering strong fellowship and encouraging early participation in service projects are two of the best ways to sustain a club's membership.
Dues	Club members are required to pay annual dues to their club. These dues include club dues as well as dues to the district and Rotary International, as well as the subscription fee to the Rotary magazine. Dues are payable to the Rotary Club of Pontiac as follows: \$200 annual dues invoiced in January Meals at 15.00 per meal
