Sadly, Otto passed away before the first Duck Race at Westlake Lake, but this was his event benefitting Many Mansions, and continues to be held each year.

This year's recipient of the Otto Stoll Award is presented to Larry Baker. Larry, Executive Treasurer of our Club, has been a member for 20 years. He was a banker and accountant, and has worked tirelessly on the Street Fair each year, handling all vendor applications and assignments. He is quiet, humble and hard-working. Larry has been a Boy Scout Leader for many years, with Troop 787 being in existence for 14 years. It started with 12 boys, and has had 178 total Scouts. There are 51 Eagle Scouts in his troop. 2 boys, brothers, have earned 135 badges, all Boy Scouts has to offer, and one of the boys has been accepted into the Air Force Academy, based on his history in Boy Scouts. Larry said that Boy Scouts is the number one youth program in the world. He graciously and humbly accepted the Otto Stoll Award, with his wife, Skogi by his side. Congratulations Larry!

Todd Road Jail plans for this visit down to the last detail, cancelling other programs and classes for the day so that as many staff as are needed are available to assure our safety. The inmates are selected based on their best behavior, and involvement in other programs. Many of the inmates get quite emotional as they are recording books for their children, and for some it has changed their lives. Pete Turpel edits the recordings, and the books and recordings are sent to the children of the inmates, ages 2-8. For some, this is the only time these children would have ever heard their parent's voice reading them a story.

Maria Prescott offered her testimonial regarding her experiences with the Storybook Project. She said that she had received backpacks for the backpack project sewn by inmates at Todd Road Jail. She had been trying to communicate with inmates involved in the sewing class, but had not been able to up until the last time she volunteered for the Storybook Project. Coincidentally, the male inmate she helped record his book, turned out to also be in the sewing class. She said how wonderful it is that he is now

able to give back to the community, helping under-privileged children.

Nate Harimoto also spoke about the impact participating in the project has had on him. He hesitates to sign up every time, since he wants to give others the opportunity to experience the Storybook Project for themselves. He said, "Don't miss it if you haven't gone".

Judy Lazar said she was selling beer booth tickets at the Chili Cookoff and a gentleman bought several tickets. He asked if Rotary put on the event, and when she responded yes, he said that 4 years ago he was fortunate enough to have been one of the inmates who was permitted to participate in the Storybook Project. It made such an impact on him, he vowed never to go back to jail. He just kept repeating "Thank you, thank you."
