Habitat for Humanity

Darcy Taylor, CEO

Michelle Nash introduced our speakers from Habitat for Humanity: Chris Untiet, President of the Ventura County Chapter; Darcy Taylor, CEO; and Katie Portere. Chris and Darcy spoke about Habitat, its founding and its many projects here in Ventura County.

Habitat was established in 1976. Jimmy Carter (95) and wife Roslyn (93) still spend one week a year serving with Habitat. It is now in seven countries, and all 50 states.

The Ventura County chapter is the oldest one in California, founded in 1983. In those years they have had more than 70 new-build projects across the county. About 160 home repair projects. They are currently in Camarillo on a 2-house build, and will soon start a 5-house build as part of a veterans project. A test project that is coming up is to build a 30-home tiny-home project in the Oxnard area.

It is not a give-away. You have to earn it. You have to put in sweat equity hours to complete your home. You pay a portion of the mortgage back to Habitat. A typical home is 1200-1600 sq. ft, 3 bedrooms. Finally, the programs include new-house builds, home repairs, financing initiatives. In addition to the housing crisis, there have been wildfires and other natural disasters.

The Rotary Foundation and clubs invest in our future leaders by funding scholarships for undergraduate and graduate study.

350,000 have been given out so far \$7.5 Million awarded every year

Want to offer a scholarship?

Rotary clubs can apply to The Rotary Foundation for district and global grants to support scholarships.

Global grants are for graduate students studying abroad in one of **Rotary's** six causes:

- Promoting peace
- Fighting disease
- Providing clean water, sanitation, and hygiene
- Saving mothers and children
- Supporting education
- Growing local economies
- Scholarships last from one to four years and can include an entire degree program. Global grant scholarships are funded using cash or District Funds matched by the World Fund.
- District grants can be used to sponsor secondary school, undergraduate, or graduate students studying any subject, either locally or abroad. The scholarship may cover any length of time, from a six-week language training program to a year or more of university study.
