Adam Antoniskis introduced the speaker, David Maron, Vice Chair of the Ventura County Civic Alliance, The Alliance is comprised of Civic leaders from around the county. It is a unique regional collaborative representing a balanced mix of Economic, Environmental, and Social Equity perspectives. Its mission is to work together to promote a healthy and sustainable future for Ventura County.

The speaker presented the 2019 State of the Region report. Highlights included the following:

- Ventura County residents are getting older. People are moving away, can afford to live here, people are having less children.
- Stawberries is still the #1 agriculture in the County 2 billion annual 5% of Total GDP.
- Republicans are less, Democrats the same, and "No Party preference" is growing.
- Unemployment down to 3.8% lowest in ages.
- Education=Earnings. The more educated a person is, the more they make.
- Apartment rent average for 2 bedroom is over \$2k per month.
