Planting seeds of motivation to support the environment

My Rotaract club established a project, Treety of Generations, to motivate clubs around the world to plant trees in cleared areas. In doing so, we show the power of working with Rotary.

We began by finding two partner clubs on different continents who were as passionate about the environment as we were: The Rotaract Club Cumbayá, Ecuador, and Club MOP Vaishnav, India. With this strong alliance, we launched a pilot project. Then we assembled a larger team of volunteers, including members in each of the time zones, who possessed a solid base of knowledge and could promote the project on social media. We met virtually weekly and progressed well.

Our next task was convincing as many Rotaract clubs as possible from all over the world to join. We made weekly appeals using our tagline, "Think globally, plant locally." We called upon members of Rotaract to help us advance Rotary's newest cause, protecting the environment.

Even with the pandemic, we were able to motivate volunteers to plant over 1,500 trees. We had two planting seasons spring and autumn this year. After our spring pilot project, we were able to have friends in other countries join us by the end of the year. Not everyone was able to take part in their country due to COVID-19 restrictions. But clubs like the Rotaract Club of Ouatre Bornes, Mauritius, and Interact Club of Annie Walsch Memorial School, Sierra Leone, have planted trees and we have a lot more in the works. A district leader in Africa was so inspired by our initiative, he organized a fundraiser where people donated 30 coconut trees. That's the Rotaract spirit.

We shared everything we were doing on WhatsApp and a LinkedIn page. We published the results of our weekly calls and town hall meetings. On Instagram, we posted pictures and gained 500 followers in three weeks.

We plan on nominating our project for various awards within the Rotary and Rotaract world, which we hope will bring even more exposure, allowing us to expand our number of volunteers and financial support.

On behalf of my entire club, I would also like to thank the staff at Rotary International's world headquarters, including Molly Friend and her team, Erika Emerick and Zuhal Sharp, who advised us on how to build our platforms. 3 ways to create a harassment-free zone at Rotary

We have no place for harassment in Rotary. People won't join or stay if they are exposed to harassment.

Rotary's policy on maintaining a harassment-free environment at meetings, events, and activities makes it clear that harassment will not be tolerated. It even stipulates that all Rotary leaders, including club presidents, shall be provided with annual training on Rotary International's policies on the topic.

But is it just up to leaders to ensure that Rotary is a harassment-free zone? Of course not. It takes each one of us to create and maintain a culture that does not condone, ignore, or excuse harassment.

1. Educate yourself

Harassment is broadly defined as any conduct, verbal or physical, that denigrates, insults, or offends a person or group based on any characteristic (age, ethnicity, race, colour, abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, culture, sex, sexual orientations, or gender identity). (Rotary Code of Policies 26.120)

There is nothing in this definition about intention. None of us are immune to unwittingly engaging in behaviour which could be viewed as harassment. The fact that it might have been 'just a joke' is no excuse.

It is not the job of victims of harassment to educate us, we must educate ourselves. The more aware we are about the diversity of the communities we serve, the less likely we are to inadvertently offend someone.

And if we do get called out, we must not get defensive, but reflect, learn and change our behaviour.

2. Educate others

When we hear or see something that is not OK, we must have the courage to do something about it. There are many ways to be an active bystander, but the key is to do something. Here are some ideas:

- Interrupt the inappropriate conversation by changing the subject. •
- Call out offensive comments by drawing attention to it not being OK. Provide support to someone who feels they have experienced harassment. Make sure they know they aren't alone or overreacting.
- Challenge the behaviour of the person/group responsible but be sure to challenge the behaviour and not the person. ("you're a creep" vs "that joke you told was creepy" will prompt very different responses)
- Seek advice from someone you trust about what to do.
- Report the behaviour through the appropriate channels.

3. Educate your club

Use your Rotary club meetings to foster meaningful discussion about diversity and inclusion on one of the topics outlined in this blog post. This could include approaching a large business or organisation to share their experiences of creating harassment-free workplaces.

This kind of conversation is common in workplaces recognising not only the risks associated with failing to adequately address harassment, but the benefits of creating safe, respectful, and inclusive work environments.

Ultimately, creating a harassment-free zone at Rotary is about creating a culture of respect and inclusivity. While culture change can take time, it's worth it if we want to ensure the sustainability of our clubs by ensuring they attract and retain a diverse range of members.

Pursuing our mentoring moments

When I speak with Rotary members about the importance of mentoring future leaders, I often hear, "I would love to be a mentor, but I don't have the time."

My response is a question and this story.

When was the last time you created a mentoring moment?

Last year, I participated in a networking event for students at a local university. The goal was for them to practice introducing themselves to business professionals, engage in conversation for a few minutes, and transition politely into another conversation.

One of the students I met was studying fashion merchandising. I asked how she became interested in merchandising, and she told me, "It started with a mistake I made at work."

She worked part-time in an upscale department store, selling women's apparel. One day, a customer bought the outfit that a mannequin was wearing. Rather than leave an undressed mannequin on the sales floor, the student selected and dressed the mannequin in a new outfit.

Creating a mentoring moment

When she reported to work the following week, she was summoned to a meeting with the regional buyer for women's clothing. "I thought I was in trouble, that I was going to lose my job," the student told me. Instead, the buyer turned the meeting into a mentoring moment. The buyer explained that clothing selections for store mannequins were a corporate decision – and also, that the clothing she selected was selling well.

The buyer told the student that she had talent, informed her about the fashion merchandising program at the university, and encouraged her to apply. The buyer continues to take brief moments to mentor and encourage the student. "She wants to hire me when I complete my degree," she told me proudly.

Mentoring moments are memorable and empowering

Her story was the most memorable introduction I heard that day – but what impressed me even more was the forward-thinking buyer. She not only recognized the student's talent, but also had the courage and confidence in her own abilities to take the intentional step to be a mentor and role model. She set an example for the student, who hopefully will see herself as a mentor and role model for other young women as she progresses in her own career.

This mentoring moment is relevant to Rotary.

We are all potential role models and mentors for young Rotary and Rotaract members. It takes our intention, not our time, to recognize and encourage their talents in our in-person and virtual interactions.

Young leaders are watching and learning from the things we think, say, and do. Mentoring moments are an empowering step in opening opportunities for this next generation of talented Rotary leaders.
