

Rotary International President's June Message

In January 2020, when I announced my presidential theme, Rotary Opens Opportunities, and spoke of the changes that Rotary needed to embrace, none of us had any idea how quickly change would arrive. But I am a longtime believer in seeing challenges as opportunities. This year, we seized new opportunities to reimagine what Rotary could be. For years, we had discussed ways to make Rotary flexible and adaptable, and we had tried a few experiments. This year, we all experimented — and succeeded! Online meetings are a regular fixture now as clubs invite guests from across the globe.

Susanne and I love to meet members of the family of Rotary around the world, and we've missed seeing you in person over the past year. But for me, it was a new way of experiencing Rotary. We traveled the world virtually. I definitely met thousands more of you than I would have otherwise. I never set foot in my office in Evanston as president, yet we found new ways to get the job done while cutting travel costs.

This is the Rotary we experienced in 2020-21: nimble, adaptable, and creative. The next step is not to go back to the way things were before the pandemic. We must move forward. Let's apply what we have learned in order to offer new experiences and opportunities for our members, such as online attendance as a regular option.

We need a younger, more diverse Rotary at every level to keep our clubs strong. What diversity means is different from region to region, but I encourage you to welcome people from all backgrounds. Another step we can all take is to increase the number of women and amplify their role everywhere.

I am glad that many now see Rotary and Rotaract clubs as equals. Let's keep going in this direction by inviting Rotaract clubs to be a part of everything we do. Let's not squander any opportunity to reach young leaders, but partner with Rotaract and invest in our many new approaches.

I am very proud of the work Rotary is doing to fight COVID-19 by supporting vaccination campaigns through advocating for fair distribution and combating misinformation. But we must also continue to do everything we can to end polio. And we now have opportunities to work in a new area of focus: the environment.



Vaccination education for all our neighborhoods

From my town of Plano, a suburb of Dallas, Texas, we see the virus devastating lives in India. Last year, COVID-19 affected people overseas, and then took hold in America. We can counter the threat and stay safe by getting people vaccinated.

Most people have access to information on COVID-19 vaccines. But we discovered many minority residents do not. Motivated by a wish to help our fellow citizens, we partnered with our city government to inform this group.

As of late April, 61% of Plano residents 16 years and older had received a COVID-19 vaccine. Of that population, 42% are fully vaccinated, with the rest waiting to receive their second dose.

We hand-out door hangers in apartments and neighborhoods. We're helping people with language issues. Those with limited internet. Others who don't have time. Our flyers have Spanish and English vaccine information. We want people to make informed decisions.

Our volunteers go out Saturdays with thousands of door hangers. We've had up to 25 people help on a weekend. The city of Plano has measured a 7% increase in vaccinations among the Hispanic population since our project.

Our club is a member of the COVID-19 Community Corps run by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Other clubs can join to receive constant up-to-date information and build vaccine confidence in your community.

Our project is being led by Bruce Mang and Antonio Harris, both college freshmen. In addition to college students, 34% of our members are under 40 years of age. We've achieved gender parity with our 64 members and 52% of the Rotary Club of Plano West is nonwhite. According to Rotary International, we're the fastest growing of the 7,485 clubs in the U.S. We've completed over 5 service projects a month with a total impact over 1,600 services hours and more than \$265,000 in donated goods this Rotary year. Our membership growth comes from our service. With an array of voices from different backgrounds and age groups, our passion empowers us to serve relentlessly.

From the Desk of the DG

This month is a bittersweet time. I am excited to celebrate with our leadership team and our clubs on the progress throughout this year, but I am also nearing the moments where my time as Governor will cease. This month we have a number of important things we must accomplish.

PREPARE: This is a transition month. The incoming boards have been trained and are now planning in order to be able to execute on day one. Each Rotarian must confirm how they will participate in elevating the activity of the club in the next Rotary year. Ideas and inspiration are required for the needed innovation.

GIVE: The need is great, and we are inviting you to continue to give to The Rotary Foundation and to our quest to eradicate Polio. I am particularly pleased with our

newest initiative being championed by District Treasurer, PAG Lindsey Cancino – The Polio Plus Society (Annual Donation of \$100.00 until Polio is eradicated). We have a goal of 200 members by June 30th, 2021 and we are only half-way there. Please sign up and be counted.

PROTECT: – This is a time where clubs purge membership. I want clubs to place a hedge of protection around the club. Engage members and seek to assist as best you can to navigate any membership challenges. This has been a difficult year, and I appreciate that members may be battling through many issues. Although we have been tried and tested, we rose to the occasion.

COMPLETE: We have 30 more days in this Rotary year to maximize on opportunities and continue to be visible and relevant in our communities.

CELEBRATE: Recognize and acknowledge the efforts of the members and the clubs this year. Recalibrate for the year ahead. Enjoy the fellowship with other clubs and join in the many opportunities of fellowship around the District. In particular, we look forward to seeing you all at the District Conference and Awards Ceremony. It is my intention to host a District Governor's Soiree on June 29th, 2021. This is hoped t o be a hybrid event at which I will present my final presentation to the District.


