4. Attendance below 60% average for each 6-month period, January 1 to June 30, and July 1 to December 31, unless excused by the Board of Directors for good and sufficient reason.

POLIO: BEYOND THE TALKING POINTS

On 27 March 2020, the World Health Organization's South-East Asia Region recognizes six years of polio-free certification.

To be sure, this is an important benchmark as we progress toward a polio-free world, but as I look back on my first National Immunization Day trip to India, the country in the region once considered the most difficult to bring to zero cases, this date has now taken on a new personal significance.

Prior to the January NID trip—in which I accompanied members of the press—I felt I had a solid grasp on Rotary's polio efforts and its leading role in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI). As part of Rotary International's public relations team, I've put together many, many reference documents highlighting key dates, strategies and figures that underscore our members' commitment to the cause and prove that our collective efforts pay off.

But all of this information fell to the background when we reached Ghaziabad in Uttar Pradesh on 19 January and the polio program—and its tactics—suddenly sprang to life. As we stepped out of our van and walked to the vaccination site where local program workers were organizing a massive group of young children and parents, the process of administering the oral polio vaccine (OPV) and the future impact of that vaccine on these kids suddenly became quite real.

All of us were eager to experience delivering the two drops of vaccine, and when my turn came, adrenaline rushed through me as I approached a little boy—what if I made a mistake and dispensed too little vaccine? Or, too much? Fortunately, it turned out to be simple, and there was no need to worry. That made perfect sense, as I was following in the footsteps of the many Rotary members who had come to India to take part in this very activity. Volunteers are encouraged to administer the OPV, a testament to the fact that you don't have to be a global health expert to support efforts to end polio.

In the end, the little boy swallowed the drops, closed his mouth, and the line of children progressed. Before I knew it, I was delivering drops to a little girl, the next in line.

As our group wrapped up our work in Ghaziabad, and we made our way back to the van, we tried to process what we had just experienced. The kids rushed to our van, waving and smiling as they saw us off. After it was over, I grasped the importance of each and every person and organization in the global effort to end polio in a new way. Beyond comprehending data points on paper, I acutely felt the global effort, and the tremendous efforts of Rotarians, to eradicate polio and the unwavering determination it took to bring India and the region to a polio-free status.

The experience crystallized the program in a way I hadn't anticipated possible, and I'm grateful I had the opportunity to learn about it firsthand and play the tiniest of roles in supporting India's efforts to remain polio-free. Visit endpolio.org to find out how you can help end polio for good.

ROTARY E-CLUB SERVES AS THINK TANK ON INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Creating new clubs is one of the best ways to grow Rotary. It's also a great way to give the gift of Rotary to new members who may not have access to existing clubs where they live or work. Today, Rotary International gives us ample freedom to be creative when launching new clubs. This has led a group of us – professionals working in international development – to charter a new club – the Rotary Club of Washington Global, that will aim to serve as a small “think tank” for Rotarians on international development issues.

Our charter members are mostly based in Washington, D.C. and working for organizations such as the World Bank, the Organization of American States, the Inter-American Development Bank, USAID, international nongovernmental organizations, and other groups involved in international development. Apart from a core group based in Washington, we will welcome members from all over the world, and especially developing countries, as a hybrid in-person and online club. Members based in the city will attend meetings in person, but we will also enable participation online through WebEx or similar platforms. This will also make it easier for our local members to participate when travelling on mission abroad.

Why are we creating this new club?

While we have a few staff from international development organizations as members in existing clubs in the Washington D.C. area, we don't have many. Our new club will solve the issue of members not being able to attend meetings in person due to long missions overseas. It will provide our members with a great opportunity to establish contact in the countries where they work by visiting other Rotary clubs. And we hope members in other locations will appreciate the ability to remotely join a dynamic group of professionals working in international development. We plan to have great speakers in all of Rotary's areas of focus (our program of online seminars through the end of December 2020 is already available). And we plan to practice Service Above Self by using our skills in support of other clubs, Rotarian Action Groups, and nongovernmental organizations.

We are working hard to keep our dues to a minimum, so that professionals based in developing countries as well as young professionals based in D.C. working on short term consultant contracts can join. We will be thrifty with our membership dues, and we have a great website.

In terms of service projects, while we will fund initiatives at some point, we hope to give back in large part by using our professional expertise and volunteering our time. We hope to support NGOs with their projects, for example, by advising them on the design and evaluation of interventions. We will conduct analytical work to help inform Rotarians worldwide about best practices in various areas. And we will aim to support existing Rotary clubs with their own projects.

Essentially, we will engage in pro bono consulting work to support projects that reach some of the most vulnerable groups. In addition, several of us are involved with Rotarian Action Groups and as members of the Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers – we will encourage new members to do that as well. Quite a few of our charter members are former Rotary Peace Fellows.

We are starting our club with just under 40 members, but we are actively looking for additional members. If you are interested in joining us, contact me at rotarianeconomist@gmail.com.

EMBRACING VIRTUAL MEETINGS FOR YOUR CLUB

For many of us, our Rotary family is an important part of our lives. These friendships connect us to our communities and the world and provide avenues of soul-enriching service.

These uncertain times caused by the coronavirus pandemic challenge us to be innovative and adaptable. In District 6440 (Illinois), all our clubs have canceled in-person meetings, following the advice of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the World Health Organization (WHO) and the need for social distancing. But that does not mean we have to give up on regular fellowship opportunities. Several of our clubs have already met this week virtually using Zoom.

To make it easier for more of our clubs to meet online, District 6440 is underwriting the first-year cost of a Zoom Pro license (applying the 20 percent off through Rotary Global Rewards) for our clubs. We are holding two Introduction to Zoom sessions to help members become familiar with the online meeting platform. And we are encouraging every club to create a Virtual Meeting Coordinator, someone with good technical skills, who can be enthused about virtual meetings and have a desire to help members of the club become proficient at it. (Clubs will be required to appoint this position to take advantage of our offer to underwrite a Zoom account).

The Virtual Meeting Coordinator will serve these functions:

- Establish their club's Zoom Pro account
- Coordinate Zoom training for their club
- Coordinate scheduling their Zoom license for use by club committees and other needs
- Serve as the club meeting technical host to manage aspects like connectivity and screen sharing
- Interface with the district's Virtual Meeting Team to learn about best practices and receive advance training

Finally, we are holding optional Zoom meetings for our presidents and presidents-elect to give them an opportunity to ask questions, seek advice, and share action plans.

Rotarians are resourceful people who use their talents to lead in their communities. We hope that our example will give guidance to other districts in maintaining Rotary fellowship and service in these trying times. Indeed, many districts have already adopted guidelines for their clubs.

Our best wishes are with Rotarians everywhere as we collectively rise to this challenge and show why we are People of Action.
