- 4. Attendance below 60% average for each 6-month period, January 1 to June 30, and July 1 to December 31, unless excused by the Board of Directors for good and sufficient reason.

PREVENT GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

During the lockdown enforced due to COVID-19, I have been reaching out to all my friends to see how they are doing. The other day I happened to call one of my girl friends who I know has been in an abusive relationship to find out if she was fine. She answered my call and we exchanged pleasantries. In the midst of the conversation she suddenly went quiet and then started to talk in riddles. I immediately sensed that all was not right and asked her if her partner was around. She could not even answer with a "yes" or "no" and so I quickly reassured her that I understood her situation and we could communicate further on WhatsApp.

This is not an unusual incident. Many women and girls are experiencing domestic violence – physical, mental, emotional, financial, and sexual abuse by an intimate partner. Due to the extended circumstances of forced lockdown with no other form of access to the outside world and in quite a few cases a phone or internet, the number of cases are spiking all over the world.

Christophe Castaner, France's Interior Minister has reported that the number of cases of domestic violence has gone up by 36 percent since the country went into lockdown on 17 March. While the National Domestic Abuse helpline in the United Kingdom has recorded an increase of 25 percent in calls and online requests for help. In India too, there has been a surge in complaints forcing the National Commission for Women to start a WhatsApp helpline.

Unfortunately, it has taken a pandemic like the coronavirus to expose another pandemic – gender based violence. Global institutions including The United Nations, The World Bank and even the World Health Organization have labeled it as a pandemic since at least one in three women around the world experience some form of violence in their lifetime.

In fact recently, the United Nations Secretary General Antonio Guterres has appealed for "peace at home." He said, "For many women and girls, the threat looms largest where they should be safest: in their own homes."

My organization Red Dot Foundation has been working on sexual violence prevention for the last seven years. Through our crowd mapping platform we have been encouraging people to document their experiences in public spaces. With this surge in domestic violence, we have launched a new campaign to collect data on this particular form of violence. We have learned that the lack of data makes the issue invisible and in a way, neglected by city authorities.

COVID-19 is forcing local and national governments to think of remedial measures to find survivors the help they need. Imagine in a lockdown scenario, with no public transport available to you or travel passes for leaving your home or your abuser watching every move or call you make, the options are few. Just like my girlfriend was not able to communicate her situation to me, many women and girls are staying silent, locked up with their abusers. So we need to find new ways to deal with this violence and think out of the box to find solutions.

It is essential that everyone understands the issue as we all can be active interveners to prevent this violence. The lockdown is meant to be a proactive measure to help flatten the curve of the transmission of COVID-19, it is definitely not meant to be an enabler of violence. So let's do our part to be better first-level responders by understanding the nuances of domestic violence and how we as individuals and communities can prevent it.

We want to be thoughtful, kind and caring particularly in these trying times. Additionally, we want to ensure that once there is a semblance of normalcy that all our members will be right there with us.

Congratulations Rotarians and Rotaractors for demonstrating agility and resilience during this difficult time. While numerous planned projects had to be abandoned or post-poned, and conventions and conferences had to be cancelled, I am extremely pleased to hear about how Clubs around the District are responding to the current urgent needs in our communities. This include providing protective gear for first responders, hospitals, and vulnerable communities, establishing handwashing stations, providing soap, volunteering to make food deliveries to the vulnerable and providing food for those in need. Fellow Rotarians and Rotaractors our clubs' responses to COVID-19 deserve to be catalogued. Moreover, clubs that have been very flexible and innovative in their response need to be recognized. Hence, our District will launch the DG COVID-19 Response Award early in the week of 3rd May. This will make us one of about 8 Districts in Zone 34 to launch this award. Information will be collected by way of survey monkey and you are asked to respond within the requested time frame.

In responding to COVID 19 some lessons can be learnt from our young people, and as we celebrate them this month let us be mindful that they give us hope for a bright future. They continue to impress with fresh, innovative, and bold ideas. District 7020 is one of the leading districts for Rotaract Clubs and with relatively strong Rotary/Rotaract relations. Even so, I wish to challenge each club to review your relationship not just with Rotaractors but also with Interactors and EarlyActors and fill all existing gaps to make sure that they feel the love and support of their sponsor Clubs. How does Interact affect Positive Peace?

That is the question we had to ask ourselves when we were selected to represent Interact at Rotary Peace Day on 21 September 2019. This annual event is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Tsawwassen, British Columbia, Canada, and attended by community leaders, elders of Tsawwassen First Nations, Rotarians, members of Tsawwassen, and the greater Delta community.

When we thought about how we as Interact Club members could bring about Positive Peace, we thought about our desire to give back to the community, our drive to work with organizations that also promote peace, and our efforts to run our club in a way that builds harmony. We realized that there were many similarities between what is important to us and the eight pillars of Positive Peace.

Through Rotary, Interact clubs have the opportunity to contribute to Positive Peace beyond the borders of our local communities. The help we receive from our Rotary club makes this possible. Each year we look for an international cause to support. For the second year, we have chosen the Innocence Lost Foundation, a volunteer-operated organization that strives to create rehabilitation and resource centers for former child soldiers in Africa. Innocence Lost is empowering the youth to get jobs and support themselves as adults, thereby making them less vulnerable to the military factions that enlist them, through a new community center being built in Sierra Leone. The center will provide sports therapy, counselling, and education. Our Interact club is planning on using some of the money we make in our fundraisers to support the Innocence Lost Foundation, a small contribution to creating peace across the world.

Building community is one of the main contributors to Positive Peace. As Interactors, we take this head-on by doing what we can to give back to our community. Rotary has offered us many opportunities to achieve this. Our Interact club meetings and events strive to achieve harmony every day. We welcome anyone who wishes to join our club, with no exclusion, and will never turn anyone away. The two large events we do within the school promote friendship and build harmonious relationships. Every year we spread joy around Christmas and Valentine's Day with candy grams that students send to their friends, teachers and other school staff.

Rotary and Interact contributes to positive peace in more ways than we could count. We as Interactors believe that such peace is important because it promotes harmony throughout communities such as our own, it encourages us to work with organizations to achieve mutual goals. We see the benefit of promoting Positive Peace and want to spread as much serenity as possible.

One of my greatest disappointments in this COVID-19 era was the cancellation of the historic Joint 7020 and 7030 Rotaract District Conference. Perhaps we will still get the opportunity to experience this in 2021. We are one Caribbean sharing much in common, and the more activities and projects we can do together the greater the impact.

Before I conclude let me share the good news that:

- PETS will take place during the month of May and Club officers who are expected to attend are encouraged to do so.
- The Virtual Rotary International Convention will be held 20th -26th June 2020. Please mark your calendars and plan to be in attendance.
- Our District Conference Committee and I have always maintained that we will have a Virtual District Conference, and this is being planed for the week of 8th June.
 Details will be available shortly.

To conclude, I encourage our Rotary family to continue to be courageous during this difficult time. As people of action continue to meet regularly and to look for ways that you can respond to the needs in your community. Today we might not have got it right, but be assured that we have certainly learnt something from the experience.

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
ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

- 4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary and other Rotarians.

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
