The Role and Impact of Rotary in my Pursuit of the Jamaican Dream

The 2020 Charter Lecture of the Rotary Club of St. Andrew was presented on October 20, 2020 by Past President Lance Hylton under the theme *The Role and Impact of Rotary in my Pursuit of the Jamaican Dream*.

This was the third in the series with the first having been given by PP Donovan under the theme *The People and The Projects*, the second by PP Lloyd had focused on *The Concept of Voluntarism and Rotary*, and now the third was styled to show how Rotary can have a third party impact on club members and their families and external colleagues and thus generate a culture of service outside of the club itself.

PP Lance set the background to the impact of Rotary on his Jamaican dream of raising a well-rounded family with a social conscience, by giving us a tour of his life before Rotary.

He had what he described as "Happy but humble beginnings", his mother, a teacher, <u>hailed</u> from a district called Cambridge in St. James while his father, also a civil servant in the 1960's was from Springfield in the same parish.

Mom died in 1965 when Lance was five and he and his three brothers and cousin were raised by his dad and grandmother before being joined by two more siblings in the 1970s when his Dad remarried.

He mostly went to primary schools where his aunts taught such as Shortwood Practising, Elletson Road All Age and then Mico Practising, before going on to Jamaica College, the University of the West Indies and Law School.

PP Lance shared that it was in Rotary that he first had the personal experience with service and volunteerism and learned the joy and fulfillment of giving back.

He became president of the Rotary Club of Road Town in the BVI in 2000 and credits Rotary with enhancing his leadership abilities, public speaking and organizational skills which assisted him in his vocation as an Attorney.

There was an even more obvious and profound impact on **his family** noting that his Rotary life and family life became merged and indistinguishable and their home has always and constantly been the venue of Rotary meetings, parties, home hospitalities, club assemblies and other Rotary events over the last 20 years.

As president he inducted his **wife Judy** in 2000 and she became so immersed in the movement that she went on to serve in almost every conceivable position including director of service projects, foundation director, sergeant at arms, vice president, president, and as the first Assistant Governor the Rotary Club of St. Andrew has had in decades and its first female AG ever.

His **daughter Jessica** was the local school winner of the Rotary Sponsored Spelling Bee and a national finalist, and became a fixture at the Rotary Club of St. Andrew for many years, playing the piano at the club on a number of occasions and attending various projects. She served as our Social Media officer for two years and was our Guest Speaker on occasion.

The Role and Impact of Rotary in my Pursuit of the Jamaican Dream cont'd.

Jessica played forward the service culture she assimilated from Rotary in a wide range of local and internal projects including *Tutor at Chambers' Lane Champions Homework Program; * Teacher at The Music House Program for Autistic Students; *Counsellor at Moorlands Christian Camp; *Volunteer at Campion Big Brother/Big Sister Program; * Volunteer at Citizens' Action for Free and Fair Elections; * Volunteer at the Hope Institute Jamaica;* Volunteer at Relay For Life Jamaica Cancer Society; * monthly donor to Yemen via UNICEF; * Sponsor of two Jamaican student through STEAM House whose goal is to teach 1,000 rural and inner city students at the primary level to code; * Donating to End Period Poverty and adjoining sister campaigns to empower young women; *Donating to The Angelic Ladies Society (ALS) Girls Home Tour; * Donor to Hurricane Dorian Relief Fund and Australian Fire Relief; *Donor to Partnership Against Domestic Violence and* Donor to Feeding America.

Lance's son Konrad's indoctrination began at an even earlier age than Jessica's did, and he too became a fixture at club events and projects, also playing the piano at Christmas and being a guest speaker at the club meeting and church service. Lance credits these activities with helping Konrad with some of his early speech development impediments.

Konrad has also gone on to give back in a life of service as a result of the influence of Rotary. As a student of the Normal Manley law school he was a member of the NMLS Men at Work initiative where along with other male colleagues, he visited young men at their high schools to provide guidance and mentorship. Making a special effort to connect with boys who were having disciplinary problems and providing positive male influences.

He was also part of The Children's Outreach Club whose mission is to help minors throughout the nation.

The Council of Legal Education recognized Konrad's efforts by conferring him with the Norman Manley Law School Prize for Community Service, an award granted to the student most involved in community outreach programs.

And Rotary has also played a role in the molding of Lance's youngest child, Benjamin who came of age when the family was in full Rotary Kool Aid mode, and has been a part of Rotary service and fellowship all his life ... regularly helping with seniors treat and other events. Seemingly one of the most impactful events came when he participated in the donation of various video game learning systems he had outgrown to needy children at Somerset School in Rural St Andrew in 2013.

That experience as a 10 year old, led to him as a 17 year old high school senior deciding to conceive, design, fund and execute a Major Charitable Project involving donating six "LeapStart" educational gaming systems and accessories, with learning and development centred games, to three needy institutions, two basic schools in underprivileged areas and a home for orphaned HIV Aids afflicted children.

He taught the teachers and students how to use the systems and created an instructional video for them. For these and other service oriented efforts and work Benjamin was rewarded by his high school, the American International School of Kingston, with the prestigious Empowerment Award and recognized for Service Leadership.

My escapades during the pandemic lockdown

In April, I learned that the Baby House in Westville, South Africa, a safe house for abandoned babies, desperately needed basic supplies. Due to the country-wide lockdown, donations had all but dried up, and the two house mothers and 10 babies (aged 1 week to 23 months) needed help.

"Not all super heroes wear capes," I thought to myself, "some wear Rotary badges!" So I contacted our club treasurer to see if I could spend some of my PR budget to assist and they agreed.

I managed to shop (masked and sanitized) successfully for all of the items on their list in varying quantities. As the mom of a youngster, I added a few treats at my discretion – some biscuits, custard, marked down marshmallow Easter eggs that I clearly remember my son smearing all over his face (ok, sorry house moms – I perhaps shouldn't have done that!) and the obligatory bag of Flings (a South African puffed maize snack).

Super hero mindset firmly in place, I made the drive across Westville, determined to deliver. This despite sensationalist media reports about people being locked up for being out of their homes, for daring to place a toe on beach sand, for not having permits to travel (unless it was for essentials or medical reasons), etc.

I didn't consider the consequences of not having a travel permit. So imagine my absolute horror as I crested the hill 200 meters from my destination, to find the street lined with police vans and other official looking vehicles. "That's it, they're going to lock me up" I thought as my super hero bubble got thoroughly pricked and my very real South African fear of authorities kicked in.

My heart was thumping as I slowly continued down the hill, imagining the worst and expecting any minute to be stopped and interrogated. I gingerly turned into the driveway of the Baby House, masked up, got out of my car and rang the bell. I consoled myself with the fact that although I may have to sit in the Westville Police Station for a few hours, at least the babies would have their goods!

A very weary looking House Mom came to the gate in her slippers. I explained who I was and what I had brought. She was jubilant and my heart warmed even as I cringed at the prospect of being noticed by the authorities. I asked the second House Mom to take a quick photo with my phone – not anticipating her eagerness to be in the picture. "Hey," she shouted to the nearby policewoman, "Come and take a picture!"

A policewoman and another female official came toward us. After a quick conversation in Zulu, that I didn't understand, we were shooed together by the amateur photographer (as far as social distancing norms would allow) and voila! – a photo was taken. Another swift exchange in Zulu and the official and policewoman wandered away.

As the weary House Moms started picking up the parcels, I asked "What was that about?" It turns out the officials and police were on the street to screen and test residents for COVID-19 and had no interest in me or my lack of permit at all! What incredible relief!

It may have shaved a few years off my life, and caused a couple more grey hairs for my hairdresser to hide when he is finally able to see me again. But this wanna-be super hero in a Rotary "cloak" was and still is exceptionally glad to have been of service to such a worthy cause!
