On International Day of the Girl Child; start your Empowering Girls project

October 11 is International Day of the Girl Child. Along with the United Nations, today is a day for Rotary members to support and celebrate the girls of our world by participating in Rotary International's Empowering Girls initiative.

As the leader of a Vocational Training Team for a Rotary Foundation grant project, my team and I worked alongside teachers in Malawi to develop and deliver an after-school program in village primary schools. The program empowers children, especially girls, to stay in school.

During that grant project, a girl who was an AIDS orphan asked me what my profession was. I told her I was a businesswoman. Her beautiful smile demonstrated why Malawi is called "the warm heart of Africa." She softly said, "That's what I want to be. A businesswoman." Her response inspired and humbled me.

Why Empower Girls?

Girls face many challenges across the world, including lack of education attainment and lack of sanitary facilities in schools. Barriers such as child marriage, pregnancy, domestic violence and abuse prevent smart, determined girls from staying in school. Educating and supporting the girls of our world can help lift families, communities, and entire countries out of poverty.

Rotary's Empowering Girls Initiative

Rotary's Empowering Girls initiative is a club-level service opportunity for Rotary year 2021-2022. The initiative encourages Rotary and Rotaract club members to participate in service projects that focus on the health, education, safety, well-being and economic development of girls worldwide. The project you choose can be a new project for your club, or an existing project that is implemented with a focus on girls.

For example, your club may choose to offer scholarships, financial literacy training or other skills development through a school or not-for-profit organization in your community. Clubs can also choose to partner with other clubs across the world to implement a project, such as providing schools in rural areas with bathroom facilities for girls, or providing books, supplies or technology.

How Can Your Club Participate?

Encourage your club to identify and implement a project that empowers girls. Promote your project in your community, and in the Empowering Girls Campaign on Rotary Showcase. You can also contact your district to connect with the Empowering Girls Ambassadors in your region. The Ambassadors can help you with project ideas, resources, support and promotion for your project.

Together, we can empower girls to create positive and lasting change across the globe, in their communities, and in themselves. The girls of the world are waiting for us, and International Day of the Girl Child is an ideal day to begin.

Kiwanis, Lions, Optimist, Rotary, join for week of service to Celebrate Community

Celebrate Community, a joint initiative of the four major volunteer service organizations, will launch this year with a focus on local community service during the week of October 10 to 16.

The organizations – Kiwanis International, Lions Clubs International, Optimist International, and Rotary International – have collaborated during the past 18 months to share ideas on future collaborations. This first public effort encourages clubs to reach out to one another to work together on projects that improve and benefit local communities.

"All of our organizations serve our communities to change lives. We must ensure that our various clubs identify a local need and work together to provide the service to fulfill that need," said Shekhar Mehta, President, Rotary International.

"We have so many common goals and objectives," said Peter Mancuso, 2021-22 Kiwanis International president. "The Celebrate Community initiative is one way to join together to work on a project that will have a measurable impact on communities around the world."

"We can help the world recover in this time of need when many are still struggling," said Douglas X. Alexander, International President for Lions Clubs International. "If we let our passion for service shine through, there is absolutely nothing we can't accomplish together."

Patsy Garner, 2021-2022 Optimist International President, supports the effort to encourage all service clubs working together to help their communities. "Now, more than ever, collaboration is needed. Resources can be scarce and a joint effort could make a far greater impact in our communities than a single act."

Clubs are encouraged to work together on projects such as health and wellness, food insecurity and hunger, education and literacy and environmental projects. Efforts could include community cleanups, food donations and distributions, walks or runs to raise money for specific causes and collecting books to help children build personal libraries. Clubs should follow all local guidelines for meetings and gatherings. Clubs that involve youth participants should follow organizational youth protection guidelines. All four of the leaders said this initial effort is a springboard to the future — they envision an annual project in which all the clubs around the world collaborate and bring their youth clubs along, too. The joint project also allows community members who are serving in different clubs to learn more about each other, their organizations and their combined efforts to help children and adults who are challenged by environmental or financial difficulties.

Using Raise for Rotary to support polio eradication is a breeze

The eradication of polio is personal to me. My sister and my husband's father both were victims of this dreaded disease when they were only 5 years old. I joined Rotary because of our fight against polio.

Last year, when I learned that Rotary had created the fundraiser site, Raise for Rotary, I immediately knew I wanted to use it. I am always looking for ways to make it as easy as possible for people to donate to The Rotary Foundation. As part of District 5150's PolioPlus fundraising campaign we set up our first Raise for Rotary website. It was a huge success.

The set-up of the Raise for Rotary site was especially easy – something I am always looking for. Shortly after I established the site, one of the Raise for Rotary staff got in touch with me to be sure things were going well. I was really impressed!

Useful features

One of the neat things about the Raise for Rotary site is that I am notified immediately when a donation is made. Then I drop a special note of thanks to the individual. Remember, The Foundation sends the official thank you donation notification. It's great being notified of "surprise" donations.

Another great feature is that other donations can be added to the Raise for Rotary site. These donations are typically major gifts that I know about. I check with the donor to be sure we can use their name and donation amount on the Raise for Rotary website. This is a fantastic way to inspire others to donate.

We have now set up this year's Raise for Rotary polio fundraiser. Kirsten at the Raise for Rotary staff was terrific assisting me in re-naming this year's fundraising campaign. It's actually easier for a donor to go to our Raise for Rotary page instead of logging in through My Rotary. We have added flyers for two of our upcoming events: Truffle Shuffle to End Polio on 3 October and the Rotary Race to End Polio to coincide with World Polio Day, 24 October.

Easy updates

The site can easily be updated with thank you notes, flyers, photos and videos, or just about any information you'd like to include. It's so easy to keep the site updated with new information. Adding those major gifts is a breeze.

We use the Raise for Rotary web link on a variety of announcements, emails, etc. This is a great way to market events as well as to fundraise for PolioPlus. We have a Rotary
