Rotaractors promote diversity, equity, and inclusion

Let's play a game. I'm American. What assumptions have you just made about me? My parents are Filipino immigrants. How have those assumptions now changed?

Without realizing it, we make assumptions of people on the little we actually know about them. Everyone has some prejudicial beliefs. It's how society taught us to think. After all, how did societies like mine define lighter skin as the universal truth for "beautiful"? But we CAN change it. We CAN confront these beliefs if we are intentional about it, but we can't get defensive. We have to accept that our understanding of the world is changing and to do better with our new knowledge.

My personal journey with Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) began a few years ago as mandatory work training (before this, I didn't think I needed any training). I learned about "unconscious bias" and became uncomfortable with the idea that I could unknowingly and unintentionally hurt someone else's experience.

I started to learn as much as I could about DEI and how to be an ally – using my privileges which include, but are not limited to, being born in the country I live in and claiming "American" as my nationality, identifying with the same gender written on my birth certificate, and receiving a private high school and college education – to help others that may be oppressed or marginalized. But my progress was slow and completely internal.

Then, the video of George Floyd's murder in Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, made headlines around the world. With it, came a much louder call for racial justice and for everyone to do better. At Big West Rotaract MDIO (BWR), we spent hours creating our own Black Lives Matter statement because we wanted to create actionable and lasting change within our own organization, making commitments that we intend to keep.

Our statement was just the beginning of the work we plan to do. We have hosted monthly open forums where Rotarians and Rotaractors can talk about addressing systemic racism in our communities and clubs, added a Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) forum to our big events for our BIPOC community to talk about their experiences, included a DEI session as part of our leadership training, and created a committee tasked with creating resources for Rotaractors to address DEI in their clubs and districts.

We knew this critical topic was bigger than just Big West Rotaract, but how could we reach Rotaractors all over the world? In late 2019, Alia Ali, member of the Rotaract Club of Surrey-Newton, Canada, and I had already applied to co-host a training at the Rotaract Preconvention about how to be an ally and by early June 2020 as tensions grew around the world, we realized that training was more important than we could ever have imagined. As the world went virtual, including the first-ever virtual Rotaract Postconvention, we knew we had a unique opportunity to share our message about addressing DEI within Rotary for anyone to watch on-demand.

We still have a lot of work to do – in our clubs, in our communities, and in ourselves. In reality, the work will never be done and we should embrace the opportunity for continual growth. Although we train on DEI specifically and intentionally, DEI in

practice should be part of everything we do including our conversations when we conduct any kind of business within or outside of Rotary. Additionally, the people who attend DEI trainings are typically the individuals who have already begun their own DEI journeys. How do we get the person who doesn't think there's a problem to care about DEI? How do we keep working towards change long after the hashtags stop trending on social media?

We do the work that needs to be done and never stop. We commit to practicing this work, day in and day out, within ourselves and through our external commitments, behind the scenes and out in public.

Rotary alumni join members to clean up river

Reconnect Week 5-11 October reminds us to keep the many participants and beneficiaries of Rotary programs close to us so we can all enjoy the benefits of this extended Rotary family! Our alumni association, like others, strives to build these bridges all year long.

Last November, our past district governor Dele Balogun, Basirat Giwa, and I were all actively involved in a variety of service activities in Ibeshe in Ikorodu, Lagos, Nigeria, geared towards disease prevention and healthy living. We were supported by Rotarians of Ikorodu Golden and Ikorodu Metropolitan clubs. Together with other volunteers from the local Primary Healthcare Centres and members of the densely populated community along the river, we cleared debris and garbage that built up over a long period of time along the shoreline.

With further help from officials of the Lagos State Waste Management Authority, the garbage was hygienically and safely collected for evacuation to a dump site. Our main objective was to clean up our environment and prevent malaria – by eliminating the stagnant water that mosquitoes breed in – and other water-borne diseases.

It is an annual initiative of our association to support the government's efforts to improve the health of our citizens, especially in the face of our growing population.

We also took part in a medical outreach, where patients had their vision screened, were prescribed medicines, and given long lasting Insecticide treated nets to prevent malaria. We also gave out reading glasses to the over 600 beneficiaries.

It was indeed a fulfilling and impactful outing, and one way we endeavor to reach out to alumni and keep them engaged.

Engage alumni through service, fun

In the spirit of Reconnect Week, I am proud to share how our alumni association is engaging with Rotary alumni and area Rotary clubs through service projects and social outings.

Chartered in 2016, our alumni association has approximately 100 members. Their connection to Rotary ranges from participation in a Rotary Youth Leadership Awards event, a Rotary Youth Exchange, to just about any Rotary program. We also have ambassadorial scholars and Rotary Peace Fellows. Since our members' ages range from in their teens to over, we make an effort to create events and projects that appeal to people, no matter where they might be on their Rotary journey.

For instance, we are currently leading a project in Jacksonville, Florida, USA, to unite people in action around the two main issues of this year: the COVID-19 pandemic and social justice movement. Known as "Rotary Feeding Heroes," the project is engaging alumni and area Rotarians to support both frontline health care workers and local, Black-owned businesses.

Project funds are specifically being used to buy meals from Black-owned restaurants that will in turn be donated to health care workers treating COVID-19 patients at a local hospital. We are projecting to buy 75-100 meals from two different food trucks. The trucks are planning to park at the hospital, where they will have the opportunity to interact with the health care workers, and vice versa. The intention is to connect the dots between these two issues and show the community the power and ability of Rotary to advance peace and goodwill.

On a similar note, we partnered with other alumni, local Rotarians, and Rise Against Hunger earlier this year to package over 17,000 meals for those in need. The event took place in February, just a few weeks before the pandemic and ensuing social distancing practices began to seriously impact the United States.

Rise Against Hunger is an international hunger relief organization that coordinates the distribution of food and other assistance around the world. Each year, we work side by side with Rotarians to pack thousands of meals for the organization. It's a humbling event and a great way to integrate alumni with Rotarians around the very essence of "Service Above Self."

In addition to service projects, we work to connect our members with local clubs through various social functions. In September, for example, we hosted "Boatary Day," which was an opportunity for local alumni and members of Rotary, Rotaract, and Rotex to enjoy fellowship and fun at the beach. It was an enjoyable way to connect these various people through Rotary.

Reshaping Rotary's future with online learning

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented a challenge to the way Rotarians meet and provide training. But it has also provided an opportunity for Rotary to adapt and innovate.

We've seen that district and club leaders have turned to the Learning Center for resources and materials to help convert in-person training events to virtual learning sessions. Between April and June 2020, the number of people using the Learning Center rose from 2,800 per month to 10,000.

Some highlights of how the Learning Center has grown from its August 2018 relaunch to June 2020 include:

- □ Members took more than five times as many courses in June 2020 as they did in August 2018.
- □ The zones with the highest course completion rates are in Asia, Africa, and South America.
- Our most popular courses are Getting Started With the Learning Center, Rotary Club Central Resources, and Protecting Personal Data.
- □ In districts that receive Learning Center reports, an average of 9.3% of members use the Learning Center four percentage points higher than districts that don't receive reports. If you're a governor, district trainer, district membership chair, or district Rotary Foundation committee chair, take the Access to Learning Center Reports course to get access to reports.

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
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
