Value of Rotary volunteering

A special report prepared for Rotary International by the Johns Hopkins Center for Civil Society Studies estimated the value of Rotary member volunteer hours at \$850 million a year.

A report by Johns Hopkins University prepared for Rotary International estimated that Rotary members provide about 47 million hours of volunteer effort a year at an estimated value of \$850 million.

That Rotary members log a lot of volunteer hours should come as no surprise to anyone familiar with the organization. But a new report just released by Johns Hopkins University provides a powerful look at the impact of all those volunteer hours.

The special report prepared for Rotary International by the Johns Hopkins Center for Civil Society Studies found that Rotary members had volunteered a total of 5.8 million hours within a four-week survey period. Extrapolating those results over an entire year, the report gave a conservative estimate of nearly 47 million hours of volunteer effort generated by Rotary members in a typical year.

The report then analyzed the economic impact of all those hours and estimated the value conservatively at \$850 million a year, if communities had to pay for the services that Rotary volunteers provide.

Rotary, with the help of Johns Hopkins University, is the first global service organization to conduct an empirical analysis of its volunteer's impact using an internationally sanctioned definition of volunteer work. The authors of the report noted in their conclusion that at each stop, the analysis had chosen the most conservative estimates.

"The lesson from this report is clear: volunteer service is not only a feel-good calling – it may provide one of the more powerful, and one of the more fulfilling, avenues through which to reach the ambitious United Nations Sustainable Development Goals," said Lester M. Salamon, director of the Johns Hopkins University Center for Civil Studies.

Rotary CEO and General Secretary John Hewko said "this is just the beginning of using the most innovative tools of measurement to capture and enhance our impact. As we better understand the vast contributions of volunteer work, we can mobilize this remarkable, but often undervalued, resource to better the world and thrive in the years to come."

Discovering a new partnership

Ihad heard of Toastmasters, but never got involved with the organization until last year, when Rotary members from our area and I attended the 2019 Rotary International Convention in Hamburg, Germany. There we heard about Rotary's collaboration with Toastmasters.

The two organizations truly complement each other. Toastmasters is a great way for Rotarians to learn and develop enhanced speaking skills. As professionals, communication is our gateway to reaching customers and clients, and promoting our service projects.

When we returned from Hamburg, our International Service director Floyd Lancia invited leaders from the Toastmasters district that covers Indiana to participate in our Zone Institute in October. Scott Brown, a divisional leader from Fort Wayne, and Jean Wolf, a program quality director, answered questions we had about Toastmasters and led a public speaking workshop for district leaders. The workshop took a championship level speech and reverse engineered it to demonstrate how to develop a remarkable presentation. I was impressed by the depth of the programs and the number of Toastmasters clubs in our local area.

Scott invited me to speak at a local training session in Fort Wayne. I received a warm welcome and provided an overview of Rotary, our district and our clubs. I brought members of one of our Rotary clubs who were also Toastmasters members. It was fascinating to hear an engaging and energetic speech by Pres Vasilev, Toastmasters 2013 World Champion of Public Speaking, who is both accomplished and world renowned.

I began using our district newsletter to send information and encouragement to clubs in our district to reach out and invite Toastmasters to speak to their clubs. We are hopeful that Scott can join us during a virtual meeting this year.

While the alliance is still new, clubs are already experiencing the benefits of working with their local Toastmasters club. They are making new connections, which is opening the door to more professional growth opportunities. Members are expanding their networks in new ways. This increased interaction between Toastmasters and Rotary clubs has even lead to an increase in Toastmasters members inquiring about joining Rotary. Our district is setting the stage for a great partnership.

RCSA Celebrating 54 years on September 08, 2020

The Rotary Club of St Andrew was chartered on September 8, 1966. The club was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Kingston and is the third Rotary Club in Jamaica. The charter president was Rt Rev. Bishop Tommy Clarke, who was then rector of the St Andrew Parish Church. The club currently has one living charter member Jim Monteith. RCSA was the first Jamaican club to admit females into Rotary in 1993. This female Rotarian is Grace Ashley who is still a member of the club.

Celebrating 54 years of Service Projects

Between 1981-94 the club was awarded a total of 13 Ambassadorial Scholarships by Rotary International, the construction of the Cardiac Diagnostic Unit at UWI which serves people from the Caribbean area and laying the foundation for the National Sports Hall of Fame. The Wheelchair Project has donated thousands of wheelchairs to persons in need and continues to do so in 2020.

The club has also pioneered projects such as the building and furnishing of a hostel for street boys, the construction of a Peace Garden at the Hope Botanical Gardens. The renovation of the Trench Town Reading Centre was a significant highlight for the club as it also involved the children of Trench Town telling their stories through animation. The club has also constructed a new building that house the Traffic Unit at the Constant Spring Police Station. In 2020 RCSA made a significant donation of computers to the Jamaica Cancer Society and did major infrastructural updates to the Curlin Johnson Basic School.


ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT


