Guest Speaker's Topic: Wanted -A Jamaica Fit For Fifty and Beyond - Key Issues, Roles & Responsibilities

Ms. Narcisse gave an interesting and thought-provoking speech.

She stated that everyone has a role and a responsibility in creating the Jamaica fit for fifty and beyond.

Among the key issues she suggested are:

- •Loving ourselves and our people
- •Good governance with the people & for the people of Jamaica
- •Citizen participation based on information & education
- •A national resolve for unity & for prosperity
- •Justice for one and all
- •Respect -making everyone count
- •Protection of the environment for future generations.

Ms. Narcisse stated that we need to redefine our roles and responsibilities. She stated that:

- The people are the ultimate national leaders, and are accountable.
- Beliefs, values, attitudes and actions have transformative power.
- There is a need to focus on excellence.
- New job descriptions are needed for political representatives.
- There is a need to share power and decision-making with communities.
- People know their needs and can be trusted to identify priorities
- The time has come for a bi-partisan and multi-stakeholder approach to the priority issues confronting the country, and to finding the solutions.
- Civil society representatives should be represented in the Senate.
- The economic and social wellbeing of the nation depend on deepening citizen participation and social equity.
- Jamaica cannot afford the communities and groups that are on the margins.
- Ensuring women's equitable participation in decision-making will be key.

There were several questions and comments, necessitating an extension of time to continue the debate.


