Foundation News – The Rotary Foundation Humanitarian Grant Programs

Effective July 1, 2013 – District 6330 clubs will have three types of Humanitarian grants available. To participate in TRF Grants clubs must be qualified each year by completing and filing with the District a Memorandum of Understanding.

DISTRICT GRANTS replace District Simplified Grants.

GLOBAL GRANTS replace the previously named Matching Grants. For a full description and applications please go to the District web site or www.rotary.org
PACKAGED GRANTS a completely new type of grant format. For a full description and applications please go to the District web site or www.rotary.org

DISTRICT GRANTS: One important difference to the previous DSG is that the application is now a two-stage process. Clubs must submit an outline proposal before applying for the actual grant. The District in turn uses these proposals to determine the amount of District grant money available for the ensuing Rotary year. The proposal deadline is April 30. The only club projects eligible to apply for District Grant funds are those for which a proposal was submitted prior to April 30. DISTRICT GRANTS: District Grants fund short-term projects and activities, either local or international which support TRF's mission. Clubs submit their funding requests directly to the District which has the responsibility of administering and distributing the funds. Before applying for a District Grant, clubs must complete and file with the District a Memorandum of Understanding for each Rotary year. The maximum District Grant available to any club in one Rotary year is \$ 2,000. The application is a two-stage process beginning with an outline proposal that briefly states if the planned project is Local or International, a start/finish date, sources of funding and estimated budget – with fully detailed budget required in stage two of the process.

Proposals must be submitted to the District between January 1 and April 30 of the Rotary year preceding the grant implementation. Following approval a full application must be submitted within six months.

In designating World Understanding Month, the Rotary International board asks all Rotary clubs to plan programs for their weekly meetings and undertake special activities to emphasize "understanding and goodwill as essential for world peace."

To observe this designated month, many clubs arrange international speakers, invite Youth Exchange students and international scholars from schools and universities to club meetings, plan programs featuring former Group Study Exchange team members, arrange discussions on global issues, present entertainment with an international cultural or artistic theme, and schedule other programs with an international emphasis.

Many clubs take the opportunity to launch an international community service activity or make contact with a Rotary club in another country. It is a good month to initiate a Rotary Friendship Exchange, a 3-H project or encourage support for Polio and other Rotary Foundation programs.

World Understanding Month is a chance for every club to pause, plan and promote the Fourth Avenue of Service - Rotary's continued quest for goodwill, peace and understanding among people of the world.

Retaining Members is Critical – Keep Club Members Motivated

Retaining members is in fact just as difficult as attracting new members. This no longer an option, it is a necessity.

- 1) Set a good example If your club fosters an ambitious, positive and supporting atmosphere (NOT negativity and reluctance), the rest of the club members will feel encouraged to participate, bring forth their ideas, make a difference, and remain committed members for a long time to come.
- <u>2) Focus on happiness</u> Ask them to suggest changes that they would like to see in the club. This shows you care about their satisfaction. Ensure you implement some of those suggestions.
- 3) Make sure members share in the club's success. A successful club shares a 'we're in this together' attitude. Thank those who bring forth ideas; support and encourage those who go beyond what is requested. Celebrate your achievements with the entire club and get everyone involved.
- <u>4) Take on fun assignments</u> Do more than routine meetings and regular activities. Brainstorm activities and events the members would like to organize; collaboration creates meaningful and enjoyable experience.
- <u>5) Keep fresh ideas going</u> Schedule regular brainstorming sessions where everything and anything is up for evaluation, evolve together!

ENGAGE ROTARY, CHANGE LIVES IS 2013-14 THEME—By Daniela Garcia

RI President-elect Ron Burton will ask Rotarians to *Engage Rotary, Change Lives* in 2013-14. He unveiled the RI theme during the opening plenary session of the 2013 International Assembly in San Diego, California. "If we really want to take Rotary service forward, then we must make sure that every single Rotarian has the same feeling about Rotary that each one of us here has today." Burton said. "We need to make sure that every Rotarian has a meaningful role to play, that they're all making a contribution, and that their contribution is valued."

Burton said the July launch of <u>The Rotary Foundation's new grant model</u>, *Future Vision*, makes it an exciting time to be a Rotarian. He said the new grant model, which has been used by about 100 pilot districts since 2010, represents a new era for the Foundation, and will help Rotarians get excited about Rotary's ability to change lives. "It takes everything that is wonderful about Rotary and raises it to a new level — by encouraging bigger, more sustainable projects while providing increased flexibility for local projects, both of which address the needs of the community being served," he said.

REMEMBERING PAUL P. HARRIS

January 27th marked the anniversary of the death of Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary.

Paul Percy Harris was born on April 19, 1868, in Racine, Wisconsin. He practiced law in Chicago, and it was there that he organized and founded a club for professionals and businessmen, the Rotary Club of Chicago, in 1905. He served as its president in 1907 and in 1910 he served as the first president of what is now known as Rotary International.

Upon Paul's death in 1947, Rotarians the world over honored this remarkable man by creating a "living memorial." With a \$1,000 donation to The Rotary Foundation, one is designated a Paul Harris Fellow.


