The SHINING STARS were out this past weekend, with the 2013 District 6330 Conference taking place in Sarnia, Ontario. Rotary International President's Representative, Dr. Frederick Hahn, Jr. opened the session with recollections of his year as RI Director and some thought- provoking poetry.



Ambassadorial Scholar Francisco Reinoso told of the culture, food, sports and dancing in his homeland of Argentina. He told of his work as Air Liaison Officer in Haiti, studying for his Master's degree in Environment and Sustainability at Western University, and his Summer Internship at Cambridge. He also gave us the inside story of how the name Francisco was selected for use by the new Pope!

Especially poignant was the talk by Dr. Bob Scott, concerning our Polio Plus Initiative around the world, and how it created a Peace Paradox. When vaccinators in remote places face local violence, does it mean we should discontinue our efforts?

By changing the dynamics of health care in war-torn areas, are we helping people to find their voice, or bringing outside influences to small villages? It is truly a paradox that we didn't know existed when the polio program was initiated. (Continued on page 4)

Rotary Fellowships informally began in 1928 when a group of Rotarians with an interest in Esperanto joined together. In 1947, Rotarians organized a group of boating enthusiasts, which became the Yachting Fellowship.

These activities gained more attention and operated over the years as World Fellowship Activities, International Vocational Contact Groups, Rotary Recreational and Vocational Fellowships, and finally, **Rotary Fellowships**.

Rotarians in Pakistan resourceful in supporting endgame plan

Even before the launch of the <u>Polio Eradication and Endgame Strategic Plan 2013-18</u>, Rotarians in Pakistan were hard at work in support of the plan's objectives. They've helped establish five polio resource centers, 10 permanent immunization sites, and two immunization posts on public roads in high-risk areas. These facilities are reinforcing routine immunization against polio, in part by reaching children who would otherwise be missed and changing the minds of parents who initially refuse to let their children be vaccinated.





Rotary Youth Camp "Presqu'ile"

Celebrating its 84th year under the Rotary flag, Camp Presqu'ile is getting ready for another crazy fun summer. Presqu'ile is a residential summer camp for children ages 6-16yrs. Located on the west shore of Georgian Bay boasting over 1000 feet of shoreline/water front. Owned by the Owen Sound Rotary Club and facilitated by the Owen Sound Grey Bruce YMCA, Presqu'ile is a staple of youth development for over 500 youth a summer. Offering a low camper to staff ratio, beautiful modern cabins and enough activities to keep a toddler busy. Campers choose their activities daily and enjoy 3 well balanced meals plus two snacks each day.

Activities: Canoeing, Kayaking, Archery, Water Trampoline, Snorkeling, Swimming (Pool and Bay), Arts and Crafts, Camp Craft, Drama, Music, Dance, Ecology, Camp Fires, Paddle Making, Leadership Programs (14-16 yrs.)

Accommodations: Traditional Camps sleep in cabins (10 campers to 2 staff) Washrooms/showers are just a short walk from all cabins.

Leadership campers sleep in Tent City. 4 campers to a large canvas platform tent. Rest room (port a poti) just a short walk from Tents.

Safety: All staff are hand picked by the Director.

All Life guards are Nation Life Guards are certified.

Low camper staff ratios.

Exceeds Ontario Camps Association Standards.

Follows YMCA Camping Quality Recommended Practices (CQRP)

Campership Programs: We understand that the cost of residential camps is hard for many families, this is why we have kept the cost of camp as low as possible. If families need financial assistance we are proud to be able to help. Please contact us and we can help walk you through the process.

Thanks to Rotary, I had the opportunity of a lifetime this past February! Through The New Generations Exchange (NGE) program, I was able to spend one month in Cameroon, in Western Africa. The NGE program was perfect for me – as a midwifery student at McMaster University I was looking for a way to organize an international placement. The Rotary Club in Kumbo, Cameroon was able to

arrange an internship for me, and the YEO at my home club was able to arrange an internship for the medical student from Cameroon who will come to Canada this fall.

I had an absolutely amazing experience. I lived with a host family and worked with the midwives at the local hospital. Living with a host family was so great. I ate (and attempted to make) the local food, I learned bits of the local dialect, and I got to take part in the day-to-day family life. I cannot even begin to describe how much I learned at the hospital in Kumbo. My clinical skills definitely improved. However, I noticed the biggest improvement in my ability to provide culturally sensitive care and labour support with women who don't speak English – two skills that will be so important when I am a midwife!

I am really interested in working internationally once I have graduated, and having prior experience will be helpful when I am looking for a job! I am so thankful to Rotary for having allowed me to have this experience!
