Rotary Fellowships Month - Make New Friends Around the World

Rotary Fellowships Month - June is designated as "Rotary Fellowships Month" by the RI Board to recognize the importance of international fellowship and good will among Rotarians with similar recreational interests, vocations, and health and medical issue-oriented interests, to promote increased participation in fellowships and increase understanding of this program. The RI Board encourages fellowships groups to highlight activities through projects, activities, and events in celebration of "Rotary Fellowships Month" in June.

Rotary Fellowships History

Rotary Fellowships informally began in 1928 when a group of Rotarians with an interest in Esperanto joined together. In 1947, Rotarians organized a group of boating enthusiasts, which became the Yachting Fellowship.

These activities gained more attention and operated over the years as World Fellowship Activities, International Vocational Contact Groups, Rotary Recreational and Vocational Fellowships, and finally, Rotary Fellowships.

As of 16 April 2012, there are 62 Rotary Fellowships.

How Rotary Fellowships Operate

Each Fellowship is officially recognized by the RI Board of Directors, but operates independently of Rotary International, with its own rules, dues requirements, and administrative structure.

Membership in fellowships is open to Rotarians, spouses of Rotarians and Rotaractors.

Each fellowship must maintain a membership base representing at least three different countries.

Each fellowship elects at least three officers to oversee the group's operations.

Fellowships are expected to facilitate communication amongst their members and to maintain regular communication with Rotary International.

WHAT IS A ROTARY FELLOWSHIP?

Rotary Fellowships are independent groups of Rotarians, their spouses, and Rotaractors who share a common passion. Being part of a fellowship is a fun way to make friends from around the world.

WHAT FELLOWSHIPS ARE AVAILABLE?

Fellowship activities vary widely. Members come together around hobbies or interests such as cricket or jazz, or vocations such as writing or medicine. Some groups are purely social while others use their fellowship for service projects.

HOW DO I JOIN A FELLOWSHIP?



ROTARIAN GEORGE CAMP IS PROUD TO FIGHT POLIO IN THE US AND INTERNATIONALLY





I first took part in an immunization campaign when Rotary first promoted the program in 1987-1988 and I became president of the Rotary Club of Ossining, New York. I was so inspired to help end polio that I reached out to my club and raised over \$16,000 in support for the program. Such a successful fundraiser was unprecedented, when clubs typically only raised around \$3,000 per year.

The first of four National Immunization Days that I participated in took place in Bangladesh in 2007.

There, I immunized children in transit around Bangladesh. I worked in tandem with Rotarians and health care workers. The massive coordinated volunteer effort that day immunized around 40 million children in Bangladesh.

The experience of knowing that the children that I met and immunized are now safe from the ravages of polio was life changing for me. When I returned home, I wanted to help in every way possible and accepted the nomination of my club to become District Governor in 2010-11 in District 7230 in New York and Bermuda.

I saw first-hand how immunization campaigns in Bangladesh, India, Nigeria and Pakistan were so important in the worldwide polio eradication efforts. Rotary made this promise to the children of the world and we will keep that promise so that no more children will die or be disabled by this terrible disease.

I am proud to be a Rotarian and proud of all of the great work of our Rotary Foundation, not only on leading the way in ending polio, but also on all of the great humanitarian projects that I have visited in these developing countries.







ROTARY CLUB OF ST THOMAS-ELGIN FOUR STUDENTS HONORED FOR SERVICE ABOVE SELF



We have a saying in Oklahoma that you need to leave the woodpile just a little higher than you found it. To do that, I needed to ask you to get involved. Involvement is what our theme this year - Engage Rotary, Change Lives - is all about. And, as each of us has done that - as each of us has gotten up out of our chairs and truly engaged Rotary - we have changed lives. This year, I asked each one of you to bring in one new member. The Board has laid a foundation for strengthening membership around the globe: Sixteen regional membership plans are now in place. They are built around making sure that we give people a reason to be in Rotary. I believe that if we can get prospective members to help us with a project - it could be reading to kids, or working in a soup kitchen, or picking up trash along the highway – the rest will take care of itself. They will realize that they made a difference in someone's life. And they'll also realize that when you give through Rotary service, you get so much more

I also asked each one of you to make a gift of some amount to our Rotary Foundation. All of our governors did that and became the first class in the history of Rotary to make that commitment. Sometimes we get comfortable in going to our club and not having any responsibility. Maybe it's because we haven't been asked to be more engaged. And, of course, it's great to go to your meeting and see your friends. But if you want to get fired up, you need to be doing projects. Hands-on projects are great equalizers. When you're unloading boxes off a truck, you're just like the next person, and that person is just like you. When everyone's serving together, there's a camaraderie, and that's how you keep people engaged.

Rotarians sometimes don't realize all that Rotary is doing and is capable of doing. If they could witness the impact of the projects I have seen this year, it would change their lives. They would understand that they belong to an organization whose members have a common desire to do something good and who, working together, accomplish incredible things.

I continue to be in awe of the good I see Rotarians doing. I am firmly convinced that the woodpile is just a little higher because of your efforts. It is my hope that each one of you will continue to Engage Rotary, Change Lives.
