

Governor Tom's Message



The clock is ticking Daylight savings time March 10!

I had been told that once I got past the Official visits and through December the DG's activities would slow down. Well, I believe times have changed. Clubs in District 6330 continue to

work hard to complete projects undertaken this year in order to meet year end completion dates. In addition, with the changes in the Foundation guidelines clubs have also started to firm up details of projects to be undertaken next year. We have started to receive names of Rotarians who have completed the DG Challenge and forms from clubs who have completed the Presidential Citation application. It is all good!

On February 23, District 6330 participated in and cosponsored (with District 5370) the Chartering of Canada's first E-Club, The Rotary E-club of Canada One. The Rotary club of Sarnia Bluewaterland was the sponsoring club from our District.

On March 5 a new Interact club with over 20 members was chartered in Fort Gratiot, Mi. In addition plans are well under way for a new Interact club in Owen Sound and a Rotaract club in Stratford Ont.

As I am sure you are aware **MARCH is – Literacy month** and our District Chair Sue Storie is diligently working with and visiting clubs in an effort to ensure that as many clubs as possible qualify for the District and Zone Literacy Awards.

Also March 22 is World Water Day and our District Chair Lynn Clayton is looking for a minimum of 22 clubs to recognize the day in some way. A number of examples were outlined in a recent letter to all club presidents. Let's make that 61 clubs!

March - Literacy month

I asked you to imagine that we could fit the entire population of the world into a village consisting of 100 people and maintaining the proportions of all the people living on Earth, what the composition of that village would look like. Eighty people out of the 100 would live in poverty, 70 people would be illiterate, 50 would suffer from hunger and malnutrition, and only one would have a university degree. There is a very strong correlation between the level of literacy one has and the state of one's economic and health status. We take literacy for granted. However, if you can read this you are extremely lucky, because you are not part of the more than two billion people who can't read anything at all. (continued on page 3)

Literacy is so important that in 1985, Rotary declared basic literacy to be a pre-condition to the development of peace. According to Rotary International, more than half of the world's 34,000 Rotary Clubs are working on some project to improve literacy for primary, vocational, and adult learners as well as teacher training. The Rotary Foundation's mission is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, good will, improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. To accomplish this mission, The Rotary Foundation has six areas of focus, one of which is basic education and literacy. The money we give to our Rotary Foundation helps to promote basic education and literacy by (1) insuring that children have access to quality basic education; (2) reducing gender disparity in education; (3) increasing adult literacy; (4) strengthening the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy; and (5) supporting studies related to basic education and literacy.

With such importance being placed on literacy, Rotary International has designated March as "Rotary Literacy Month". Some Rotary clubs raise funds for schools or libraries, or for other literacy-promoting organizations. Many clubs take part in a reading program called "Rotary Readers", in which a rotary member spends time in a classroom with a designated student and reads one-on-one with them. Other Rotary clubs participate in book donations, both locally and internationally.

What is your club doing to promote literacy, either locally or internationally? During the month of March, I'm asking every club to evaluate what it is doing to promote literacy. If your club is not already involved in some type of literacy project, I am encouraging you to explore the many options available to you to join Rotary's efforts to promote literacy. A more literate world will more likely be a more peaceful one. Give a child the gift of literacy and help give the world the gift of peace.

NEW GENERATIONS

New Generations is the 5th avenue of service and there are many exciting programs which can engage young people in Rotary, introducing them to Peace through Service as well as the rewards of community involvement and volunteering. One New Generation opportunity is the New Generations Exchange, which is for young people ages 21-30. This is a vocational exchange where young people can go to another country and develop their vocational skills in a volunteer work placement. In the summer of 2012, Goderich hosted an NGE student who was completing her 3rd year of Criminology in England. She worked as an intern at the Probation and Parole office and was able to learn about the criminal justice system here in Ontario. She went to court, interviewed probation clients and observed how probation officers worked for 8 weeks. She also got to camp in Algonquin Park, make Canadian friends and see Niagara Falls! There are many opportunities for vocational exposure in her district in England and it would be great if a club knew a young person who would like to go to England. There are also opportunities in many fields in Brazil, Mexico and Europe, as well as other countries.

The length of exchange is typically 8 to 12 weeks, but it can be longer if the hosting club is willing or if visa regulations for the country permit it. The New Generations Exchange is generally a reciprocal program. There is no fee to the sponsoring or hosting club and the young person is responsible for their transportation and health insurance.

I hope clubs will publicize this opportunity to the young people they know as it is a wonderful way to increase cultural awareness and build bridges between cultures, communities and Rotary Clubs. At the moment, I am looking for a club who would have a young person to send to Belo Horizonte, Brazil for a New Generations Exchange. That club would host the young woman from there.

Foundation News: FOUNDATION HUMANITARIAN GRANT PROGRAMS

Part 2 of 3

Effective July 1 2013 District 6330 clubs will have three types of humanitarian grants available to them. To participate in any TRF Grant clubs must be qualified each year by completing and filing with the district a Memorandum of Understanding.

DISTRICT GRANTS replace the previously named District Simplified Grants. For a full description and applications please go the district web site or contact DGSC Ken Wilmott kwilmott@uniserve.com

GLOBAL GRANTS replace the previously named Matching Grants.

PACKAGED GRANTS, a completely new type of grant format. For a full description and applications please go to the district web site or www.rotary.org

<u>GLOBAL GRANTS</u>: Clubs which have previously applied for Matching Grants are encouraged to continue their International Humanitarian efforts by applying for one of the new Global Grants. The following provides a brief summary of this new grant model, an important difference being the application is now a two-stage process. For full description of Global Grants and complete details of the application process please go to <u>www.rotary.org</u>

GLOBAL GRANTS: are intended to fund large scale International projects and activities that:

a) Align with an area of focus, b) Respond to a need the benefiting community has identified, c) Include active participation of the benefiting community, d) Are designed to enable the community to help itself after the Rotary club or district has concluded its work, e) Have measurable results

The minimum budget for a Global Grant is US\$30,000.

The application is a two-stage on-line process beginning with an outline proposal that briefly states the need the project will address, the activities planned to meet this need, a statement of how the project supports the areas of focus and a general budget (full details are not required until stage two of the process). Proposals can be submitted any time after January 15 2013. Following approval of the proposal by TRF the full application must be submitted within six-months. It is strongly recommended that clubs familiarize themselves with The Rotary Foundation Grant Terms and Conditions available at www.rotary.org before submitting a grant proposal.

District Grants were covered in the February issue and Packaged Grant details will be in the April issue.

Rotary Project Goes Canada-wide— Inspiring Students To Care

A New Generations Program is a district and zone-wide program sponsored by The Rotary Club of Wiarton in partnership with Spectrum Artistic and Educational Media, a non-profit, registered charity. The goals are to raise awareness about world issues and motivate students to action.

The program consists of two projects: "No More Turning Away": Inspiring Student to Care about Hunger and Poverty, and "Take It Back": Inspiring Students to Care about the Environment. Two DVDs, using classic rock music by Pink Floyd and John Mellencamp and music by high school students, have been produced and offered to school boards, first in Rotary District 6300, then across Ontario, and this year to school boards across Canada. So far 1,080 DVDs and Printed Guides have been placed in or purchased by 41 school boards in 6 provinces (Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, B.C. and Nova Scotia), with the participation of 37 Rotary clubs in 5 Rotary districts.

Rotarians serving on Spectrum's Board of Directors include Bev Garinger, Nick Torra, Past District Governor Michael Atkins, District Governor Tom Robitaille, and Keith Martin. Providing a support committee within the Rotary Club of Wiarton are Bev, Nick, Paul Shirley and Ann Iles.

The effort is getting close to ending Polio now with cases reported in only 3 remaining countries. The ongoing support of our government is crucial to finish the job that was started many years ago.





London Police Chief Brad Duncan shared with the Rotary Club of London South some of the new approaches to conflict resolution such as the involvement of mental health specialists to calls involving people needing that type of assistance instead of treating it as a police call. The people receive better assistance and it prevents engaging officers that could be used where they can be more effective. The Chief indicated that although many of the crime statistics are currently lower year over year, the guns and weapons issues are on the rise. The London Police Service has several new initiatives including a summer program for 8 students to work in the community with various ethnic communities. The London South club is currently considering how to best support the London Police in their work as a **peace program** in keeping with this year's Rotary theme "Peace Through Service".



The Rotary Club of Markdale Celebrates 75 Years of Service

Seventy-five years ago in January 1938, steps were taken for the organization of a Rotary Club in Markdale ON by a group of 15 business and professional men who met at Hamilton's restaurant with H. W. Solomon, special representative, and 14 other members of Meaford and Owen Sound Rotary Clubs. This action united Markdale with more than

4,300 Clubs all over the world where Rotary was playing a leading part in the progress and development of the life of these communities.

The new Markdale Club wasted no time in getting started. Almost immediately they appointed a committee to conduct a survey to look for ways to support underprivileged children. And by August, plans were well under way for a fund raiser, the first Street Frolic on September 1, an event which has continued every year since.

Celebrating its 75th year, the Rotary Club of Markdale will once again this year conduct the Street Frolic (July 12), as well as three other major events - Ski-A-Round, Golf Tournament and the Mountain Top Jamboree. Funds raised will support both local and international projects.



This update provides information on current surveys, and offers key research findings from previous survey initiatives.

Research Insights:

Tens of thousands participated in surveys in 2012. Key research findings from 2012 surveys include:

- Why do Rotarians and Rotaractors join Rotary? Why do they stay? According to the research, the top two reasons are (1) local community service and (2) friendship and fellowship. Further, these are the top two reasons cited by every age group.
- The vast majority (90%) of district leaders (governors, committee chairs, and so forth) from non pilot districts say they support the Future Vision Plan.
- Strategic plans make a difference. Compared with clubs that don't have strategic plans, clubs with strategic plans are more likely to report significant improvement in the past three years in recruiting and retaining members, using social media, and maintaining a positive public image.
- New Generations participants are very interested in joining Rotary in the future. They say so at a rate of 80%!

Clubs that are participating in the 2011-14 pilot programs (Associate Membership, Corporate Membership, Innovation and Flexibility, and Satellite Club) had greater overall membership growth in 2011-12 than they did the year before the pilot, 2010-11. Their growth was also far above RI's 2011-12 overall membership growth rate.

The following information was recently circulated to a number of Rotarians in the District and it is being reprinted in part here in an effort to ensure that all Rotarians are aware of and use the correct office box. The P.O. Box listed below is recorded in both the District Directory and Website.

Rotary is continually searching for ways to improve our service to you and friends of The Rotary Foundation. In May 2012, Rotary changed its lockbox vendor in Canada to speed up your contribution processing times, improve data collection, and lower administrative costs. Our new partnership resulted in The Rotary Foundation (Canada) lockbox using a <u>new address</u> that began in May 2012.

Rotary has been working to secure a swift and easy transition, including outreach before the change began, updating forms and working with the new bank to forward all contributions sent from the "old" lockbox address to the "new" lockbox address. Unfortunately, we are still seeing almost **one third** of all Canadian lockbox contributions being sent to the "old" address. This is a growing concern since over the next few weeks, the agreement to forward contributions from the old lockbox will cease, resulting in contributions being returned to the donor/club treasurer, etc.
