The Stratford Reporter on September 15th had an interesting article about a guest speaker who spoke about the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Dominique Boulais, Deputy Secretary General of the War Graves Commission for Canada spoke about the work of this group. The Commission represents six Commonwealth countries whose soldiers gave their lives in the two world wars. There are over 1,700,000 war dead in 23,000 burial sites around the world. Canada alone has over 18,430 graves of our veterans that are cared for by the Commission.

Since his retirement, he has appeared at a number of functions where he educates young people about the importance of science and exploration and encourages them to strive for excellence.


Epp states that Hadfield is "in good com-



pany". Four American astronauts were honorary Rotarians (Neil Armstrong, Alan Shephard, L. Gordon Cooper and Frank Borman). Other aviators have a Rotary connection too. Orville Wright was a member

of Rotary and Charles Lindberg was another honorary Rotarian.

Hadfield graciously accepted the award and commented that "Rotary is about service above self. At all times we should strive to put others" interests ahead of our own or at least on par with our own."



Vocational Services Month

As you know, October is Vocational Services Month. We received this excellent letter from *Kevin Webb of the Rotary Club of London Hyde Park* and because it so well captures the essence of Rotary Vocational Service, we thought we would share it with you.

Dear Members and Friends of Rotary:

October is Rotary Vocational Month when we celebrate the second object of Rotary. Vocational Service calls every Rotarian to:

- * Aspire to high ethical standards in their occupation
- Recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations, and
- * Contribute their vocational talents to the problems and needs of society

Visit our website (www.hydeparkrotary.org) to view an 18 minute video called the "Boys of 1905" showing the founding fathers of Rotary. You will also find a 2003 speech by Past RI President Cliff Dochterman called: "Vocational Service: Rotary's First Concept".



In this speech, PRIP Cliff quoted T. A. Warren, a British Rotarian in 1935, who stated this opinion: "The only unique feature of Rotary is vocational service; everything else that we do is repeated by some other organization. If we are unique, if we have a special message or mission in the

world that is unique to ourselves, it lies only in the realm of vocational service."

In all of our earliest days, Vocational Service was clearly the primary focus of Rotary.

new language, to make new family and friends and to experience the world in a completely new and exciting way. Later, after four years of University Education I was able to reflect upon how important that experience truly was. It helped to shape my values and beliefs about the world in which I am a small but important part. My dream grew... I knew that I wanted to continue to educate myself, to learn new languages in order to glimpse into new cultures, to make connections with people and to live and experience new countries in a meaningful way, in order to change and better appreciate my own. I grew to firmly believe that living, studying and working abroad is an incredibly valuable experience and one that educates in a way that the classroom, a book, or a podcast never could.


Then, last year I received the Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship! What an incredible gift this was. This scholarship allowed me to make a dream come true, to continue to live out my goals and values and do it in a structured, safe and meaningful way. With the grant that I received, I moved to San Salvador, El Salvador and was able to attend the University, live with El Salvadorian families, get involved with local people and projects and experience a taste of Latin American culture. I am passionate about social justice and peace issues, specifically focusing on education for youth and how different forms of popular education can help, support and strengthen communities who have experienced violence, trauma and loss. I was able to connect with some inspiring individuals in my time and learn first-hand about how they worked with their communities to create art, music, safe spaces and a brighter future.

My goal, in living in El Salvador, was to watch, listen, participate and learn in a way that I could take home to my own country and communities. I received more in my time there than I ever could have imagined. Speaking Spanish was a great plus for me, as I was able to connect with families and individuals on a deeper level. I was also always in constant contact with Rotary members and although far away from my own family, I never felt like I was left alone. I am beyond grateful for this experience and wish that every young and passionate person could experience the same. I firmly believe that we are all one big family and we need to learn to break down the barriers that separate us and keep us from living in violence, anger and hate. We need to find ways to connect with people from across the world who are experiencing life in a contrasting way, in order to better learn and grow as a whole.

Indian philanthropist and businesswoman Rahashree Birla has announced a new gift of US \$1 million to Rotary to help eradicate polio. The gift brings her total contributions to the Rotary effort to more than \$7.2 million.

What's more, this gift will be matched twofor-one by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, resulting in \$3 million in new funding for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI). Through the <u>End Polio Now: Make History Today</u> fundraising campaign, the Gates Foundation is matching two-for-one every new dollar Rotary commits to polio eradication, up to \$35 million per year, from 2013 through 2018.

"Mrs. Birla's generous gift is deeply appreciated and could not have come at a more opportune time in our fight to end polio once and for all," says Ashok Mahajan, a former Rotary Foundation trutee and close friend of the Birla family. "Her generosity no doubt will inspire other private donoros to step up and help Rotary take full advantage of our innovative partnership with the Gates Foundation."

"Thanks to the efforts of Rotary and its partners, including India's Health Ministry, WHO (World Health Organization), UNICEF, CDC (U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention), the Gates Foundation, and other organizations, India continues to be free of polio," says Birla, whose son Kumar Mangalam Birla, has transformed the Aditya Birla Group into a Fortune 500 global conglomerate. "Now we owe it to humanity to see that Nigeria, Afghanistan, and Pakistan also become polio free in the near future."
