

Thanksgiving Trivia



Did you know:

The date of the first Thanksgiving is not precisely known though it occurred

between September 21 and November 9, 1621.

The first Thanksgiving was observed in Plymouth. The Plymouth Pilgrims dined with the

Wampanoag Indians for the First Thanksgiving.

The First Thanksgiving lasted for three days.

It was not until 1941, that congress declared the fourth Thursday in November to be Thanksgiving

and a national holiday.

Although, Thanksgiving is widely considered an American holiday, it is also celebrated on the second Monday in October in Canada.

Black Friday is the Friday after Thanksgiving in the United States, where it is the beginning of the traditional Christmas shopping season. This tradition has held forth since at least the 1930s.

The different nicknames for Thanksgiving Day: "Turkey Day" "T-Day" "Macy's Day

"Yanksgiving" (Canadians sometimes call the Thanksgiving in the US as "Yanksgiving" to

distinguish it from the Canadian Thanksgiving holiday)

Turkey is the traditional dish for the Thanksgiving feast - 91% of Americans eat turkey on Thanksgiving Day.

In the US, about 280 million turkeys are sold for the Thanksgiving celebrations. Each year, the average American eats somewhere between 16 - 18 pounds of turkey.

The average weight of a turkey purchased at Thanksgiving is 15 pounds.

A turkey usually has about 70 percent white meat and 30 percent dark meat.

Turkey has more protein than chicken or beef. Turkeys will have 3,500 feathers at maturity.

Commercially raised turkeys cannot fly

Turkeys have poor night vision.

A 16-week-old turkey is called a fryer.

Turkeys were one of the first animals in the Americas to be domesticated.

Fossil evidence shows that turkeys roamed the Americas 10 million years ago.

The 'wishbone' of the turkey is used in a good luck ritual on Thanksgiving Day.

He said that Pakistan shares the international community's concerns on polio, but that the world should also understand the issues faced by Pakistan.

"We face challenges like inaccessibility, terrorism and misconceptions in tribal areas about the campaign." he said noting that "Health workers have been targeted by militants." His chief ministers assured him that extra security measures were being taken for the protection of the polio teams. They will report to Sharif every fifteen days. We are making progress! was able to purchase 286 warm coats to be distributed to needy families in Ankeny in conjunction with Project Fresh Start. In total Ankeny residents donated more than 2,300 winter clothing items to help students in need during the first ever F.E.W.D winter clothing drive. More than 300 students have already received coats, hats, mittens, and other winther wear, and more are expected to be helped throughout the course of the winter. F.E.W. D. distributed the clothing on November 2nd and 3rd and is supported by Project Fresh Start through the Ankeny Community Education Department. During their drive in late October, Ankeny students, staff, and parents collected nearly 1,500 items of winter clothing at their 16 schools to contribute to the project.

This was truly a community undertaking as members of Ankeny's churches also donated more than 600 items, and Ankeny citizens provided winter wear to TAKE,(The Ankeny Clothing Exchange) at the Neveln Center. The Ankeny Rotary Club received a grant in collaboration with the Ankeny Service Center to help purchase 286 new coats."

Understanding Rotary Foundation Recognition Points

Contributions to The Rotary Foundation are essential to securing and growing Rotary programs throughout the world. Foundation

points are awarded to donors who contribute to The Rotary Foundation through the Annual Program Fund or PolioPlus. Donors are recognized by being named "Paul Harris Fellows" or "Multiple Paul Harris Fellows" at increments of 1,000 Foundation points. In addition, a donor receives one Foundation "recognition" point for every U.S. dollar contributed.

Recognition points belong to the original donor until the donor's death, or until the donor uses the points. Donors can transfer these recognition points to other Rotarians or non Rotarinas, to help them become or to be named as a Paul Harris Fellow or Multiple Paul Harris Fellow. You can even recognize a deceased individual by requesting a Memorial Paul Harris Fellowship. A minimum of 100 Foundation recognition points must be transferred at one time and an authorized signature is required when completing the transfer form. The Rotary Club of Ankeny has several members with over 1,000 recognition points. *Have you considered making your spouse or*

Each Ankeny Rotarian has Option to Receive 200 Recognition Point Posted by Nate Burnham on Nov 17, 2014

The Rotary Club of Ankeny has received recognition points for the Polio Plus contributions made to the Rotary Foundation during the past several years and now has accumulated nearly 10,000 recognition points. The Board of Directors of the Club has approved a proposal to donate these recognition points to its members under the following terms:

- All members, both Active and Honorary, are eligible to receive 200 recognition points from the Club.
- If the member is currently not a Paul Harris Sustaining Member (committed to contributing at least \$100 per year to the Rotary Foundation), they must agree to become a Sustaining Member to receive the 200 points.
- All new members will be given 200 recognition points, at the time they join the club, if they agree to become Paul Harris Sustaining Members.
- The club will continue to match cash donations made by members until they become Paul Harris Fellows.

Each member will be asked complete a form to either agree to become a Paul Harris Sustaining member and receive the recognition points or to decline this offer. More information will be provided on November 25th following the presentation by Cal Litwiller, Past District Governor and current District 6000 Foundation Chairman.
