

District 6000 Recognition Points Offer

When District Governor Miller met with our Board during his recent visit, he described a new program in District 6000 to provide an additional incentive for members to begin contributing to the Rotary Foundation. It is that District 6000 will give 100 recognition points to any member that has not previously donated to the Foundation and makes a donation prior to June 30, 2016. If the initial donation is more than \$100, the District will match the donation with recognition points. In addition, the Rotary Club of Ankeny will continue to donate 200 recognition points to any member that agrees to donate at least \$25 per quarter. Plus the Club will match any cash contribution made until the member becomes a Paul Harris

The Club has a goal of becoming an "Every Rotarian, Every Year" club during the 2015-2016 year. To do this, each member must make a contribution to the Foundation. Preferably, this contribution is \$25 per quarter but we can qualify with a contribution of as little as \$5 from each member. President Miller and Foundation Chairman Steve SchraderBachar are planning to contact members who are not currently contributing to the Foundation to provide them with additional information and answer any questions they may have.

RAG4CLUBFOOT



Rotary Districts 6000 and 5970 are the home districts of the University of Iowa where Paul Harris earned his law degree and the birthplace of the Ponseti Method of treating clubfoot. These districts and others around the world are participating with Ponseti International to participate in the establishment of RAG4CLUBFOOT, a Rotarian Action Group for eliminating clubfoot disability. Worldwide, approximately 200,000

children each year are born with clubfoot. Hundreds of thousands of these children will live with a lifetime with this deformity that will limit their mobility, their ability to go to school or play with friends and eventually to work. Rotarians can help us change that!

District 6000 and Ponseti International Association (PIA) based at the University of Iowa are actively working together to form the Rotarian Action Group (RAG), RAG4CLUBFOOT. Their mission is: To assure timely treatment and appropriate care for children born with clubfoot deformity worldwide. The Ponseti treatment includes the use of a brace worn at night until age 4. These braces cost \$20 each. District Governor Miller has chosen RAG4CLUBFOOT as a fundraising project for his term as District Goveror. He would like to raise funds so each doctor performing the Ponseti Method of treating clubfoot has at least a box of 12 of these braces.

Rotary grant projects improve access to essential medical services for mothers and their children throughout the world. These efforts are aimed at protecting the estimated 7 million children under access.

According to another estimate, more than 80 percent of maternal deaths can be prevented with access to reproductive health services and trained health care workers. Rotary projects provide education, immunizations, birthing kits, and mobile health clinics to support these causes. Women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breast-feed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease.

We provide immunizations and antibiotics to babies, improve access to essential medical services, and support trained health care providers for mothers and their children. Our projects ensure sustainability by empowering the local community to take ownership of health care

training programs. Your contributions to the Rotary Foundation are vital to sustaining the improvement in living standards for these vulnerable people.

McKayla Sturtz in France



Gary Welch received the following note from McKayla Sturtz, our Rotary exchange student in France:

I arrived at the Luxembourg airport with three other girls who are in my district on August 25th and we were instantly surrounded once we claimed our bags. I had my first two host families greet me along with the youth exchange committee of District 1790 and I have to admit it was very overwhelming. Pictures were taken and greetings exchanged and then I was off for Nancy. The first few days were challenging-- I was super tired

from traveling and my French was not as good as I had hoped it would be. Everyone here speaks much faster than I was used to. But my family is super nice and understood since they have hosted before. As August ended, I went to Lac Madine for an integration camp where I met all the other exchange students in my district. There are 32 of us overall and only 8 of those are boys. During my three day stay there I used a lot of English but was also taught some French. We visited an American World War I monument, ate mirabelles, and biked through the country side. We also got to paddle boat on the lake and received sweatshirts. On the final day of the camp, us 32 students presented a talent show to the youth exchange committee and all of our host families. It was a really fun weekend and leaving was bittersweet. I was excited to start my day to day life in France but nervous for the challenges I knew were coming (like school). However school isn't too terrible yet. I've made some friends and understand the very basics of my philosophy class. (I didn't get to choose my classes). I've found that the majority of people in France that I've met are very nice and willing to help me. My host mom, Magali, is very helpful and offered to help me with my French when I don't have class. For which I'm very grateful. At the moment I believe my biggest challenge is registering with the OFII here in France, but only because I've never been a fan of paperwork. However I have a plan to get it done and I've gotten much better at asking for help when I don't understand. It's a very crucial part of being an exchange student I've found. (I'm sorry this is so late. I tried sending it multiple times and it would not work.)
