

Cindy Diehl Yang, President and CEO Putnam Museum & Science Center

The Mission

The Putnam brings to life a sense of place, time and purpose to ignite human potential and inspire our diverse community to learn about and care for our world and all its people.

The Putnam has been around since 1867, and it started with members of the community who wanted to share their experiences, travel, and knowledge with others in their community. A treasure trove of artifacts are at the ready to preserve, educate, and connect people to the wonders of science, history, and culture. Only 3% to 4% of the available materials are on display at any one time.

The Putnam brings history to life, connecting people with their past to better understand the present and the future. Visitors can experience this through "Common Ground", the "Innovation Gallery", and "Black Earth, Big River". The Putnam is also exploring the future of learning by engaging people with virtual reality and improved technology. Helping people understand why museums matter now more than ever is a goal.

Currently on display, "Mystery of the Mayan Medallion" is an immersive exhibit open until June, 2025. In conjunction with the exhibit, the "Raiders of the Lost Arc" movies will be shown on the big screen.

Thursdays at the Putnam often have more adult-themed activities, including the "History on Tap" lecture series. These nights include a local engaging speaker that can be enjoyed along with adult beverages that are available.

The "Putnam Reimagined" project will launch May 10, 2025 with newly updated spaces in many areas. Admission is free, so everyone should plan to attend. Among the many updated areas are "The Vault", South Lawn Pollinators, the Science Center, the Family Engagement Center, the Gateway, and the Orientation Space.

Putnam memberships are available for \$100/year for up to 6 family members. The membership also includes reciprocal agreements with many other facilities, like Chicago's Field Museum and Science and Industry Museum.
