<u>Program Recap</u> Dan Moore--Local Author

Dan Moore has found inspiration for his writings mostly from traveling the world, but those moments of inspiration can come from anywhere, including a trip to Wallace's Garden Center. After serving as a Navy Commander for a nuclear submarine fleet and retiring from working with nuclear energy, he thought he'd try his hand at writing. Dan's writing takes readers to places they may not know, and he enjoys the journey of adventure and suspense.

The idea for Dan's most recently published book, "Escape on the Silk Road" was hatched during a 2005 trip to the Black Sea when he and his wife spent time in Istanbul. He was intrigued by the history of the Silk Road and began researching it. That experience and Dan's research led to the book and it's themes of people helping people when they're in trouble and the universality of human nature.

Dan took writing advice from several authors who wrote books about writing. He's also active with local groups, including the Midwest Writing Center and Writers on the Avenue. Dan credits his wonderful editor for giving him the feedback needed to produce the final work. She offered help with things like, "its too slow here", "this character wouldn't do that", and "a reaction is needed there".

Three more novels are in the works. One is titled, "The Tooth Time Forgot". (It was suggested Dr. Olson should appear in that story.) One is a sequel to "The Last Voyage of the Marigold", and one is a submarine novel set during the cold war.

Dan Moore's books are available online through Amazon or the Barnes and Noble website.

In closing, Dan noted that the Navy's newest fast-attack submarine will be commissioned for duty later this week and it will formally enter service as the USS Iowa, the third Navy vessel in history to be named after the Hawkeye State.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION FACTS: APRIL IS MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH MONTH

The Rotary Foundation reaches mothers and children in need by giving communities the help and training they need to take control of their own maternal and infant health care.

Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

Mobile prenatal clinics

Haiti has the highest maternal and infant mortality rate of any country in the western hemisphere. Rotary provided a fully equipped medical Jeep to volunteers and midwives to reach mothers and children in remote areas.

Cancer screening

Rotarians provided a mobile cancer screening unit and awareness trainings around Chennai, India, where there is a high mortality rate of women with breast and cervical cancer due to late diagnosis.

Preventing injuries and deaths

Rotary members launched a \$3 million, five-year pilot to save lives of mothers and children during home deliveries in Nigeria. Since 2005, they've also repaired 1,500 obstetric fistulas — 500 more than their initial goal — restoring dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers.
