YMCA ACHIEVERS "All youth deserve the opportunity to thrive."



Today we heard from Mike Cribbs, Outreach Director at the YMCA of Iowa Mississippi Valley.

Mike is a 1997 graduate of Davenport Central High School. His mother was a teacher and his father was in landscaping.

Mike runs the important and sometimes daunting YMCA Achievers program. This effort strives to ensure kids are in the right position for success by educating and mentoring at-risk youth in everything from study habits to social skills.

According to Mike, the key objective of YMCA Achievers is to: "Ensure better outcomes by removing barriers and creating a nurturing environment.'



Mike says Middle School is the focal demographic. This is the age where the kids are most formative and susceptible.

Focal areas of concentration with the kids:

- Reduce truancy
- Improve grades
- Improve graduation rates
- Increase college enrollment

The biggest challenge is that kids are growing up in a very different America today... with a unique set of barriers. Social media and a highly sensitized society create a whole new level of stress not realized by previous generations.

YMCA Achievers by the numbers:

- 55% are Black
- 6% are Hispanic
- 72% are in middle school
- 40% feel they have enough support from adults
- 68% like to learn through physical activity (kids don't like to learn in the classroom these days)

Mike's Secret Sauce: Shut up and listen to the kids (i.e., dads like to preach too much).

ANYTHING IN HERE FOR THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER BASIN?

"At the end of a week-long Rotary International Assembly, (January 7 - 11, 2024) the United Nations and Rotary International signed an agreement on one of TRF's 7 Areas of Focus: The Environment. According to an online report, "the new partnership between the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) and one of the world's largest service organizations will work to conserve and restore freshwater bodies. The partnership with Rotary International will assist UNEP's global efforts to support countries in monitoring, protecting, restoring and better managing their freshwater ecosystems, such as lakes, rivers, wetlands and groundwater aquifers, to meet sustainable development, climate, biodiversity and other global commitments. "Great partnerships are key to accelerating water action," said Leticia Carvalho, Principal Coordinator of UNEP's Marine and Freshwater Branch. "We very much look forward to working with Rotary with its global reach, close connections to

communities and action-focused engagement.". With more than US\$23 million invested by Rotary International's foundation, Rotary clubs worldwide undertake impactful environmental projects ranging from local clean-ups and tree plantings to large-scale efforts like installing solar power, creating waste management systems and conserving ecosystems."
