





Watch our meeting here



Nestle Purina is one of our areas top employees and this past Monday, we had the opportunity to learn about the company from three of its employees.

Kelley Laughlin started the presentation off by discussing some of the statistics about the Clinton Plant. To begin with, the plant is non-union with 575 total employees. Of this, 447 are hourly and 128 are salaried. Men make up 69% of their staffing, while women are at 31%. In 2022, they had a 17% turnover and have hired over 270 people since 2020. The physical plant is 110 acres (744,000 square feet) and includes 23 packing lines, 6 treat extruders, which are what cook the food, and 26 dry extruders. The Clinton plant is a dry pet food and treat-producing factory. They produce Beggin' Strips, Canisters, Sachets, Pro Plan Veterinary Diet (PPVD), Pro-Plan, and ONE.

In 2022, they produced 287,000 tons of dry pet food and in 2023, they are expected to produce over 308,000 tons. The Clinton plant is the primary producer of Beggin' Strips! In the factory, they have about 194 formulas, and 87 of what they produce is only produced in Clinton!

Justin Wilkinson continued the discussion and told us that the big thing they want to talk about is the people of Nestle Purina. "Our people are our key focus for developing and keeping our company safe so recordable injuries and making sure people are safe every day is a big focus for us. Last year, unfortunately, we had four recordables, so far this year we're at zero, which is a great trend for us and is really something our whole team takes very seriously...we're working really hard to make sure manufacturing isn't what you think of when you see 'I Love Lucy'," stated Wilkinson.

Some of the capital improvements for this plant consist of additional extruders, three new packing lines for the dry food, and automation for packing lines. Spot the Dog (pictured on the left) is a Robotic dog that helps with preventative maintenance. "Spot runs routes through the factory. He goes and looks for hot spots on dryers, and hot spots on different pieces of equipment and if he sees those he'll send a notification back to the maintenance team...he also is looking for air leaks so as we're being responsible in the environmental world."

Finally, Doug Peters took over and spoke to us about adding warehouse and storage space. They're working on adding storage space and creating a new storage system of a Racking Structure for their further growth. This system will significantly help operations and decrease how long it takes to load a truck.

The History of the Rotary Bell

In 1922, U.S. Rotarians organized an attendance contest; the challenge was that the losing clubs would join in giving the winning club a prize. The Rotary Club of New York City was declared the winner and to them was awarded as a prize a bell from a popular patrol boat, which was placed on wood that came from HMS "Victory", Admiral Nelson's vessel at the battle of Trafalgar. Since then, the bell used in Rotary meetings started to represent, as on the ships, order, discipline and the time to guide us through the weekly hour and a half meetings. The bell informs us with its sound the beginning of the Rotary meeting, at which time people present should stand, same as at the end, in order to salute the national and Rotary flags. The gavel symbolizes the authority invested in the Rotarian elected to the highest position in Rotary, and through him/her reminds those present of his/her authority. When presidents transmit their positions to their successors at the end of their mandate, they give the bell their last hit turning the gavel over to their successor, symbolizing the transfer of authority



FOUNDATION MINUTE

WELCOME TO WEEK 1 OF RI'S MONTH OF MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH

THE NEWS THIS WEEK IS FROM BELIZE, CENTRAL AMERICA, WHERE ZOILA PALMA GONZALEZ, A JOURNALIST AT BREAKING BELIZE NEWS, REPORTS ON A ROTARY INTERNATIONAL GLOBAL GRANT FOR A PROJECT AT THE KOLBE FOUNDATION, A NONPROFIT AGENCY DEDICATED TO HELPING INMATES AND THEIR FAMILY. VALUED AT \$174,000, THE ROTARY FOUNDATION GLOBAL GRANT WILL PROVIDE ACCESSORIES AIMED AT IMPROVING THE LITERACY STANDARDS OF INMATES AT THE BELIZE CENTRAL PRISON IN HATTIEVILLE. THROUGH A LEARNING SOFTWARE DUBBED RACHEL (REMOTE AREA COMMUNITY HOTSPOT EDUCATION AND LEARNING), THE PROGRAM WILL TEACH OVER 400 INMATES ENGLISH AND PHONICS, READING, WRITING, MATHEMATICS AND COMPUTER SKILLS. THE RF GLOBAL GRANT PROVIDES INMATES WITH 240 CHROMEBOOKS, HEADSETS, DESKS, PRINTERS, STATIONERY AND TRAINING.

THE PILOT PROJECT IS BEING OFFERED AT ST. MARTIN DE PORRES SCHOOL FOR STUDENTS TO HAVE ACCESS TO THE LITERACY ACCESSORIES. THE ROTARY CLUB OF PORT MOODY PARTNERED WITH TRF ON THE GRANT.
