

<u>Watch our meeting</u> here

Kip Simpson with Big River Packaging spoke to us on Monday and delighted us with the details of their primary product -- bakery boxes and other paper board products, aimed at the bakery market. All of these products are designed, manufactured, and shipped right from their plant, on Lincoln Way. Big River Packaging (BRP) was started by Bob

Simpson and John Huling. Kip Simpson became BRP's third employee. Simpson stated that the success of Big River Packaging stemmed from its marketing concept. "Bob and John's strategy for BRP was twofold. First, they're going to target smaller customers who were often ignored by the big packaging corporations and treat these people like they were a big deal like they were important. But this would mean setting up the business to handle short-order runs with a lot of changeovers in order to produce items of smaller value or volume. The second was from day one and based largely on the experience that they had had elsewhere Bob and John wanted Big River Packaging to be a great place for the people of the Clinton area to work." In 2005, they had eleven employees and now, they have sixty employees, which is still considered small for a converting plant!

"Those first years were tough. We had the factory looking good, machines were ready to go, our people were eager. But as it is with any start-ups, there were challenges," Simpson stated. Big River Packaging made boxes for a multitude of products, including high-end caffeinated lip balm, organic shampoo for treating lice, and even swag boxes. "We ran those jobs in accordance with our business plan -- we treated those people who put in those orders, those short runs, like our business depended on it because it did." When Co-Founder John Huling was at Krumpets, he asked if they needed boxes for the bakery, which led to a discussion about boxing needs for keeping cupcakes upright. From this point forward, Big River Packaging focused on bakery packaging.

Simpson got interested in e-Commerce and was able to design the website for Big River Packaging, which allowed them to ship to all over the U.S. and increase their sales drastically. "I remember the first week that we made \$500 from the Internet!," Simpson excitedly explained. Free Shipping and Same Day Shipping also helped Big River Packaging stand out and contributed to the company getting off the ground. In discussing Big River Packaging's continued success, Simpson discussed how they treat all of their customers, no matter what size of the company or what volume they do with BRP. "People like it when companies listen to them. I mean like really listen and act. And word of mouth is the best advertising." Big River Packaging serves over 300,000 customers internationally.

Just last week, Senator Joni Ernst presented Big River Packaging with a copy of a Congressional acknowledgment, recognizing the firm as one of her picks for Small Business of the Week. Big River Packaging is the eighth recipient.

The History of the Rotary Bell

In 1922, U.S. Rotarians organized an attendance contest; the challenge was that the losing clubs would join in giving the winning club a prize. The Rotary Club of New York City was declared the winner and to them was awarded as a prize a bell from a popular patrol boat, which was placed on wood that came from HMS "Victory", Admiral Nelson's vessel at the battle of Trafalgar. Since then, the bell used in Rotary meetings started to represent, as on the ships, order, discipline and the time to guide us through the weekly hour and a half meetings. The bell informs us with its sound the beginning of the Rotary meeting, at which time people present should stand, same as at the end, in order to salute the national and Rotary flags. The gavel symbolizes the authority invested in the Rotarian elected to the highest position in Rotary, and through him/her reminds those present of his/her authority. When presidents transmit their positions to their successors at the end of their mandate, they give the bell their last hit turning the gavel over to their successor, symbolizing the transfer of
