

<u>WATCH OUR</u> **MEETING HERE**

This week, we had the pleasure of hearing from fellow Rotarian, Gary Delacy, Superintendent of Clinton Community School District. Delacy focused his presentation on School Safety and big changes that have happened in recent years. Delacy stated that all students are trained on the "Run, Hide, Fight" philosophy for active

shooters. Delacy stated that middle and high school students are trained on this and they had an active shooter drill last April. DeLacy stated, "They're old enough to start making decisions. We did run a drill in April with the middle school and we put some decision-making in there."

Delacy transitioned into discussing the School Safety Infrastructure grant that gives \$50,000 per school building for the direct purpose of enhancing physical school safety features, such as security cameras, secured entrances, and two-way radios, but cannot be used for hiring additional school resource/safety officers (SROs). CCSD has increased from two officers to three (CMS, CHS, and EAC). They want to increase to five SROs. Some of the safety features coming are adding blinds to windows, and adding alarms to doors that stay open for an extended amount of time.

Finally, Delacy talked about true ways to help safety at school. He stumbled upon a system called "Evolv Express," a new technology that uses artificial intelligence to look for the shape of a weapon. "It's not a metal detector," Delacy stated. "It looks for the shape of a weapon and it has different sensitivity levels. Obviously, I'm most concerned about guns." If the machine goes off, they won't search the entire body, just the area that was targeted for a potential weapon. The school district approved this in May and it will be piloted out at the High School and the football games. To learn more about Evolv Express, click HERE.

Delacy summarized his amazing presentation with the simple statement --"We are trying to do everything possible to keep the Clinton Community School District kids as safe as possible... you know, it's unfortunate that we're kind of living in this world but I'm trying to stay ahead of it it's the best we can and like I said we're trying to keep Kids Safe."


