FOUNDATION MINUTE

Last week throughout the world, Giving Tuesday was observed. People around the world individually or through coordinated efforts within organizations such as local Rotary clubs gave generously to a wide variety of charitable organizations. The Rotary Foundation featured most prominently among the top 100 of such charities in the United States. According to WalletHub's editors, more than 100 organizations were compared based on their financial performance, transparency and popularity and TRF was rated the best for Human Services with a score of 100% https://wallethub.com/edu/best-charities-to-donate-to/28658/

With its emphasis on the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty, The St. Joseph-Benton Harbor Rotary Club Foundation awarded a total of \$59,000 in grants to eight groups in the area, including the Boys and Girls Club. Using the clubs foundation monies, the club successfully applied for matching funding from its district's Designated Funds. The secretary of the organization, Bill Healy, reiterated that "...emphasis is given to entities that provide better opportunities for youth and special needs populations."

The improvement of opportunities for the youth of the city was on the mind of the Rotary Club of Yonkers-East Yonkers, Yonkers, New York, USA when it decided to transform the basketball court at the John Barton Memorial Park, Younkers, New York. This park, a notorious eyesore of buckled concrete and a mass of cracks, pebbles, broken glass and the littered of drug paraphernalia, has now become a source of civic pride. Developed as a Global Grant, the Rotary Club of Younkers donated \$5,750, The Rotary Club of Yeocheon, Korea contributed an additional \$16,000 and TRF supplied \$23,500 in Global Grant Funding to complete the project.

The Rotarians of The Rotary Club of Gig Harbor, Gig Harbor, Washington, USA use the funds of its foundation to match district designated funding grant requests. The club has completed multiple projects within its community. Because of the commitment of Gig Harbor Rotarians to community projects, two wealthy brothers recently donated \$850,000 increasing the ability of the club to give back to the community. "We are very very excited," said Scott Junge, president of the Gig Harbor Rotary Club Foundation.



... I just want you and your organization to know what a beautiful thing you are doing by providing our students with boots! I wish I could take a picture and show you the size of the smiles and the brightness in the eyes of these children when they see their boots for the first time! They are so incredibly thrilled with this gift it means so much more to them than just a pair of boots. It means connectedness. It means belonging. It means someone cared about them and did something they didn't have to do. They feel so special, and they should!

Our little girl with the leg braces beamed from ear to ear, literally, when we opened the box for her. We told her she was like a princess, as we tried the boots on with her, and we could see she felt like a princess, too! As she left, she asked to hold the big box of boots in her little 5 year old arms, and even though balance is an issue for her, she held onto those boots like they were china, guarding and protecting them, as she made her way back to her classroom.

Our boy with the big Men's size 11's had such a look of pride in his eyes when he opened the box and left off an approving, "Wow, nice." His world is coming apart at the seams and everything he knows is about to change. He's been holding back his tears in the name of being the "man of the house," at 10 tender years of age. I've been working for two years on building a relationship with this tough kid, who could go either way right now. I could tell he didn't want to leave my office because he felt such a sense of being cared about, his heart was swelling!
