MEETING MINUTES



Brent Albretchtsen and Andy Fergurson

Fellow Rotarian Andy Fergurson and Brent Albretchtsen presented about the recent campaign to build a new high school. The building is nearly 100 years old and while there have been updates, the need for a new school, with proper safety measures, improved learning environments and ADA Compliance and Accessibility is urgent.

The High School Task Force is asking you to vote Yes on March 3, which will be approving a bond to allow the school to spend \$38.9 million to get a new high school. The cost of doing nothing severely impacts the community – in the next ten years, it will cost 25 million dollars. Additionally, waiting and extending this project will increase the cost 4% each year. By approving this, it will add \$0.325 to the tax levy. For a \$100,000 house, it will \$18.49 a year to your taxes – the cost of a pizza.

PLEASE don't forget to vote – you can vote NOW by going to the Administration Building or you can wait until March 3 and vote. Voting on March 3 will ONLY be done at the Church of the Open Door. We need 60% +1 of those who vote to pass the bond for a new high school. It's Time. FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to World Understanding Month in Rotary!

February is the Vocational Service Month when clubs highlight the importance of the business and professional life of each Rotarian.

Among opportunities that Rotarians can engage in is the reconciling of broken families and restoring relationships. In this vein, the **Rotary Club of San Diego** is presenting more than \$45,000 in grants toward in-service human trafficking prevention training. Representatives from San Diego Unified School District, San Marco Unified and Sweetwater Union High School District will share the grants. "We believe that human trafficking is greatly impacting our local youth, and we want to support the education of teachers to recognize the victims and take action to prevent ongoing abuse," said David Oates, president of San Diego Rotary. "Doing so is also in line with our mission to drive unmatched impact at home and around the world."

Still in the act of doing good for the good of all, the Rotary Club of Kent, Kent, Washington, has partnered with the city's recreation department to fund a new playground accessible to children of all ages and abilities. The new playground is equipped with accessible park furniture, swing sets and layouts structured for wheelchair users. Club president, Roger Sidoti emphasizes Rotary's impact on general wellness of the beneficiaries. According to him, "we wanted this signature public profile project to exemplify Rotary's motto of 'Service Above Self' and our Four-Way Test which we all ascribe to." The \$25,000 playground is funded with a \$10,000 pledge by **The Rotary Club of Kent, and a Matching Grant of \$2,800 by Rotary District 6630. The Kent Rotary Foundation is covering the remaining \$4,400.**

With a **Rotary International Matching Grant**, the Blind Foundation of India (BFI) has raised over \$5,000,000 (USD) to prevent and cure blindness as well as educate and permanently rehabilitate blind people in India. The Rotary Matching Grant has enabled BFI to complete 14 projects worth over \$500,000 (USD). At a cost of \$20 (USD) per cataract surgery, the funds will be used to examine the eyesight of over one million adults.

A Helpful Reminder: If your club is planning to apply for COMMUNITY SERVICE or GLOBAL GRANTS during the 2020-21 Rotary year:there MUST be a representative from your club at ONE of the upcoming GRANT MANAGEMENT SEMINARS (GMS)! It is important that the main contacts on a proposed grant are strongly encouraged to attend. Two documents must be signed by the President-elect and the President-nominee to participate in these grants.
