



MEETING MINUTES



Mike Ottens, the Mayor of Fulton came to our Club on Monday and presented about the recent addition to Fulton...Marijuana Dispensaries. The controversial law was passed in June 2019 in the state of Illinois and allows for adults ages 21 and over to possess and use cannabis for recreational purposes.

The decision to say yes or no to marijuana in Fulton wasn't an easy road. By Illinois law, it's legal in Fulton until they create an ordinance and say no to the sale and consumption of it. In October 2019, a vote was sent out to the zoning boards and came back 4-4. Mike Ottens broke the tie and voted no. In December 2019, Whiteside County approved the selling and growing of Cannabis. On December 19, 2019, Council votes 5-3 to approve the sale and use of Cannabis in Fulton.

You can now get 15 grams of marijuana, 5 grams of concentrated or 500 mgs of infused product at the dispensary. The use of Cannabis is legal in private consumption and it becomes illegal once you take it into the public. If you have a medical marijuana license, you can grow up to 5 marijuana plants. Dispensaries must be at least 1500 feet away from each other. If you are under 21, it is a class A misdemeanor to possess Marijuana. While they are still working on the legality of this, you can be driving while high and get a "DUI" if you're over a certain limit. Fulton is getting 3% taxes on all marijuana sales, plus an additional 1% of regular sales tax. This should translate to roughly \$150,000-\$250,000 in revenue that Fulton will see.



FOUNDATION MINUTE

This year, members from some of the 33,000 clubs scattered among 535 districts in 34 zones in more than 200 countries, will be involved in special programs for their clubs. 2020 is the year that many Rotary Clubs will celebrate their century of "Doing Good In The World." In his latest message published in the March 2020 edition of the Rotarian, Foundation Trustee Chair, Gary C.K Huang implores Rotarians to "continue to cultivate virtue, examine and analyze what we learn, move toward righteousness based on our new knowledge, and keep improving everything we do."

With regards to TRF's core goals, several clubs are already harkening to the advice. At the Rotary India Centennial Summit which just concluded in Newtown, West Bengal, India, 4,000 members from 35 countries, along with government officials explored ideas and solutions for disease prevention and treatment, water sanitation, hygiene and education. Addressing the participants at the summit, RI President Mark Maloney said, "As we celebrate our impact over the last 100 years in India, I'm inspired by these creative solutions to some of our toughest challenges, from economic inequality to conflict resolution to fighting disease."

During the service year of 2018-19, The Rotary Foundation supported projects in India worth \$22.81 million (USD). The emphasis is always on the Six Areas of Focus. Recognizing India's role in the eradication of Polio, this March Rotary will join India in celebrating its 6th Polio-free year. Since 1995, Rotary has worked with the Indian government to institute a National Immunization Day each year to immunize 172 million children under 5 years-old.

Disease prevention was a top priority for Rotary District 7070 (Toronto) when it handed over a high-tech toilet complex to the Wandse Proper Primary School in Kundapura, India. The \$90,873 USD project was funded through a Global Grant. Rotary District 3182 Kundapura, India and the Rotary Club of Whitby-Sunrise, Whitby, Ontario, Canada, contributed to the project. Unveiling the plaque for the toilet complex, Past District 3182 Governor, Abhinandan Shetty Kundapura, expressed gratitude to TRF for the grant and disclosed that another Global Grant of \$39,145 USD has been approved for the Narayana Specia School, Kundapura, India. Finally, Global Grant Program Coordinator, G. Sridhar Shetty said that an additional Global Grant worth \$23, 068 USD has provided funds for a "smart class" school vehicle for the school's technical training staff.




