



FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 4 of Rotary International's Vocational Service Month!

It's the last week in the month when Rotarians worldwide focus on promoting, fostering and supporting the ideal of service in the pursuit of all vocations. Using the highest ethical standards and fair treatment of employers, employees, associates, competitors, and the public Rotarians should take every opportunity to promote vocational excellence by example and service to others.

The past few months have featured Rotary Clubs responding to the needs of their fellow beings through dedicated service in various areas. However, no disaster has challenged the determination of Rotarians like the on-going virulent Covid-19. Rotarians, through the support of TRF, have funded numerous projects aimed at helping frontline workers combat the debilitating coronavirus and help families devastated by the scourge. Certain situations too risky to involve human helpers in dangerously infectious environments, have not dampened the enthusiasm of Rotarians to be of help. A case in point is the recent event in India where TRF supported a Global Grant that funded robots used to deliver food, medicines and essential services to highly infectious Covid-19 patients in Assam Medical Hospital. The Tribune of India reports that the robots would be very useful in servicing patients with extremely contagious diseases inside the isolation chambers of the quarantine facilities. In his welcoming address at the occasion, the Past District Governor (D3240), Rotarian Kalpana Khound, reiterated the contribution of Rotary in fighting the pandemic. The Rotary Club of Dibrugarh (NE India) and the Rotary Club of Dhaka Royal in Bangladesh contributed to the Foundation's Global Grant.

To reduce the danger of toxic water consumption, the Rotary Club of Guwahati South engaged in a joint project with The Rotary Club of Tacoma (D5020) to purify water by removing arsenic through specially designed large arsenic-removal plants. TRF made the Global Grant of \$69,000 possible. The Rotary Foundation is not to build monuments of brick and stone. If we work upon marble, it will perish; if we work on brass, time will efface it; if we rear temples they will crumble into dust; but if we work upon immortal minds.... we are engraving on those tablets something that will brighten all eternity." No new Wild Polio cases reported this week!

A Win Against Polio is a Win for Global Health!

2020 Circulating Vaccine Derived Polio Cases - 926: Afghanistan - 255 (0 in 2019), Angola - 3 (129 in 2019), Benin - 1 (8 in 2019), Burkina Faso - 56 (1 in 2019), Cameroon - 7 (0 in 2019), CAR - 4 (21 in 2019), Chad - 98 ((10 in 2019), China - 0 (1 ln 2019), Congo - 1, Cote d' Ivoire - 71 (0 in 2019), DRC - 75 (86 in 2019), Ethiopia - 21 (11 in 2019), Ghana - 11 (18 in 2019), Guinea - 39 (0 in 2019), Mali - 28, Malaysia - 1 (3 in 2019), Myanmar - 0 (6 in 2019), Pakistan - 110 (22 in 2019), Papua New Guinea - 0 (0 in 2019). Niger - 8 (1 in 2019), Nigeria - 7 (18 in 2019) Philippines - 1 (16 in 2019), Sierra Leone - 3 (0 in 2019), Somalia - 13 (3 in 2019), South Sudan - 38 (0 in 2019), Sudan - 56, Yemen - 28, Togo - 9 (8 in 2019), Zambia - 0 (2 in 2019), 361 Vaccine Derived Polio cases were reported in 2019.

The Final Two Polio Endemic Countries:

- Pakistan No new Wild Polio cases reported this week. Eighty-four Polio cases reported in 2020. The
 most recent case had an onset of paralysis on 11/23/20. Pakistan reported 147 Wild Polio cases in
 2019. Ten Polio-Positive Environmental Samples were reported this week in Pakistan.
- Afghanistan No new Wild Polio cases reported this past week. Fifty-six Polio cases reported in 2020
 The most recent case had an onset of paralysis on 10/19/20. Afghanistan reported twenty-nine Wild Polio cases in 2019. No Polio-Positive Environmental Samples were reported this week in Afghanistan.
