We were joined by quite a number of people this week, presenting on the Duke Slater Statue Initiate! Slater was born in Normal, Illinois but moved to Clinton when he was thirteen. Slater played three seasons of football for Clinton High School from 1913-1915. Every high school player needed to provide their own shoes and helmet. His father could not afford both, so he asked Duke to choose. Slater decided he needed shoes more, and he played every game at Clinton High School without a helmet. Despite playing primarily at tackle, Slater led Clinton in scoring as a senior in 1915, rushing for six touchdowns from the fullback position.

After dominating the field at CHS, Slater went on to the University of Iowa, where Slater earned unanimous first-team All-Big Ten honors as a sophomore. He was also chosen as a second-team All-American in 1919, becoming just the sixth black player ever to earn All-American honors in college football. In Slater's senior year in 1921, Iowa claimed a share of the 1921 national championship, posting a perfect 7-0 record. The 1921 Hawkeyes captured the school's first Big Ten title in 21 years. That season, Iowa upset Notre Dame, 10-7, handing them their first defeat in three years.

Back in 1972, when Iowa Stadium became Kinnick Stadium, in honor of 1939 Heisman Trophy winner Nile Kinnick, Slater's name was also considered. The Board of Regents went with Kinnick and Slater's consolation prize was a dorm named after him. During the North End Renovation at Kinnick Stadium, which was finalized in 2019, a bronze relief of Slater making a key block in Iowa's 1921 upset of Norte Dame was one of the improvements.

In addition to building a statue at the high school, the committee is determined to establish a scholarship in Slater's name. Their fundraising goal is set at \$175,000, and with the help of a gaming grant, Citizen's First, Clinton National Bank, and First Central, they are getting there. Ryan Veenstra stated, "We're hoping to have an event, maybe an annual event, but a fundraising kickoff event in the future." Veenstra said the goal is to have the statue unveiled in the Fall of 2024, to coincide with the football season.

Gary DeLacy gave his point of view, stating, "From an educator perspective, I always look at it as getting role models for our current students...I think you couldn't have a better role model for our kids in terms of someone that had to overcome barriers and achieve at a high level and that's why I'm really supportive of the project. This is a guy that went to Clinton High School and what a difference he made beyond Clinton High School and that's certainly an idea I want to get in every one of my student's Minds -- you can make a difference."



WELCOME TO WEEK 1 OF FEBRUARY WORLD UNDERSTANDING MONTH AND RI'S PEACE & CONFLICT PREVENTION/RESOLUTION MONTH.

IN ORDER TO FULFILL THEIR MISSION, SINCE 2002, THE ROTARY PEACE CENTERS HAVE TRAINED MORE THAN 1600 FELLOWS FROM DIFFERENT CORNERS OF THE WORLD. THEY ARE NOW WORKING ON PEACE AND DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES IN MORE THAN 140 COUNTRIES. WITH THE MOTTO "DOING GOOD IN THE WORLD", THE ROTARY FOUNDATION HAS PLANTED SEEDS FOR AN ERA THAT IS THE BASIS OF THE WORLD'S LEADING HUMANITARIAN ORGANIZATION, THE ROTARY FOUNDATION.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION FELLOWSHIP AWARDS ARE DIVIDED INTO TWO CATEGORIES IN ORDER TO ACCOMMODATE THE MOST DESERVING AND ELIGIBLE CANDIDATES WITHOUT ANY AMBIGUITIES. THE FIRST IS THE ROTARY SCHOLARSHIPS FOR MASTER'S STUDENTS. THE SECOND IS THE ROTARY FELLOWSHIPS FOR THE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM. IN BOTH PROGRAMS, THE FOCUS REMAINS ON PEACE AND DEVELOPMENT ISSUES. THIS INNOVATIVE PROGRAM MERGES A STRONG, ACADEMIC UNDERSTANDING OF THE ROOTS OF CONFLICT WITH PRACTICAL TACTICS FOR SOLVING REAL-WORLD PROBLEMS.

A 2019 GRADUATE OF SAN DIEGO STATE UNIVERSITY, HONORS COLLEGE, NANCY NGUYEN IS ONE OF 50 YOUNG LEADERS FROM AROUND THE WORLD WHO HAVE BEEN AWARDED A FELLOWSHIP BY THE ROTARY FOUNDATION. SHE WILL BE ATTENDING THE UNIVERSITY OF QUEENSLAND IN AUSTRALIA FOR THE MASTERS OF PEACE AND CONFLICT STUDIES, AN 18-MONTH FULLY-FUNDED PROGRAM. ACCORDING TO AN ONLINE ROTARY REPORT, NGUYEN WILL BE ONE OF 12 ROTARY PEACE FELLOWS STUDYING THERE. HER PRESENT ROLE IS AS A CIVIC ENGAGEMENT COMMUNITY ORGANIZER AT THE PARTNERSHIP FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF NEW AMERICANS (PANA) IN SAN DIEGO. SHE WAS RECOGNIZED AS A 2021 WOMEN OF DISTINCTION IN YOUTH EMPOWERMENT BY THE SAN DIEGO MAYOR'S OFFICE. NANCY'S LONGSTANDING COMMITMENT TO PEACE AND INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT IS REFLECTED IN HER YEARS OF INTERNATIONAL AND LOCAL POLICY, ADVOCACY, CIVIC ENGAGEMENT, AND DIRECT-SERVICE WORK.
