Article II of the By-Laws for the Rotary Club of Clinton lowa Charitable Foundation Inc. provides in part "the term of each Director shall be two years. Directors may serve successive terms." The Nominating Committee contacted each of the Directors whose terms were expiring and each Director expressed a willingness to continue serving for another term. Several also expressed a willingness to step down in order to provide an opportunity for others who might be interested in serving on the Board.

Since the Foundation began in 2016 and fiscal year 20-21, beginning July 1, 2020, would mark the beginning of only the fifth year, the committee members agreed it was not necessary to by-pass Directors with Board experience in favor of searching for new candidates at this time. Therefore, the Nominating Committee recommends election of each of the above-listed Directors for an additional two-year term.

Voting will occur on the June 15th Rotary meeting.

MEXICAN RURAL FAMILY GREENHOUSE PROJECT

Brian attended the Zoom meeting of the Club Rotario Plateros Centro Histórico early on Wednesday morning with our partners from the Seattle Club, including Susan Sola, Brenda Dimond, Linda Harris, Marilee Fuller and Paula Laschober. Both of our clubs have donated funding to the Mexican Rural Family Greenhouse project.

The Mexican Rotarians were very happy with our presence and sent many thanks. It was wonderful for those of us who have collaborated with them to see all the



familiar faces, now trapped at home by COVID-19 just as we are. Brenda Dimond and Alejandro Flores, incoming club presidents for 2020-2021, were able to meet each other online—a great opportunity!

Roberto Vega, Plateros RC President, sent his warm wishes to Dave Spicer. During the meeting, many Rotarians from both the Plateros Club and the Bellavista Atizapán Club expressed their appreciation of how the Mexican Rural Family Greenhouse project has proven to be a model of sustainability, a benefit to very marginalized people, and its high value now in a time of crisis (drought complicated by isolation, as access to these rural communities is blocked to avoid contagion from outside).

Self-reliance and hard work have allowed these subsistence farmers to thrive and become examples for others. Rotary has just lent them a helping hand, but it has been a privilege to do so.

THE WEEKLY ROUND-UP



Dr. George Belitsos, Rotarian from Ames and Chair of the Iowa Network Against Human Trafficking and Slavery, Founder and CEO Emeritus of YSS out of Ames, and Vice-Chair, International Board for Rotary Action Group Against Slavery, spoke to our club on Monday and relayed a very serious and crucial topic -- Human Trafficking.

This topic is very near and dear to the heart of Rotary and around

the world. Dr. Belitsos stated, "The goal that we have...is to eradicate human trafficking from the face of the Earth. In this country, we call it human trafficking, but around the rest of the world, it's called slavery."

In this country, trafficking really got its start into trafficking through the Internet, where most sex traffickers advertise their victims. This has become even worse since COVID-19 changed our society. "There has been a 600% increase of child pornography on the Internet since COVID-19 began," stated Dr. Belitsos. Worldwide, there are 40+ million people trafficked in 167 countries. Here in lowa, we had our biggest number of convictions ever - with 14 people convicted of human trafficking, including five that had trafficked minors. Only **1** out of every 100 traffickers in the State of lowa are convicted each year.

Dr. Belitsos and the Ames Rotary Club enlisted the help of then-lowa Governor Terry Branstand to declare January "Human Trafficking and Awareness" Month. Current Governor Kim Reynolds has continued this for

the last two years and has assisted in launching a training campaign for ending human trafficking.

We have all been witnessing the ravages of COVID-19. Rotarians have continued to donate to local food pantries and with help of TRF's Disaster Response Grants, much good is being accomplished around the world.


The Rotary Club of Cincinnati-Eastside received a matching grant from TRF in the sum of \$5,000 to support the staff of Mercy Health-Anderson and Clermont Hospitals in recognition of their hard work. The \$10,000 grant supports employee accommodations, meals and team recognition events. Ken James, the president of Anderson-Hospitals, expressed his gratitude for the generosity, stating that the Rotary Club's donation "is providing meals for associates and covering the cost of hotel accommodation to reduce the risk of hospital workers exposing their families to Covid-19."

The Mason City Noon Club received a \$1000 Disaster Response Grant from TRF and donated it to Hawkeye Harvest Food Bank. According to Carol Clayton, Hawkeye Harvest Food Bank Director, the grant will be used to buy "close to 6,000 pounds of food for the Food Bank of Iowa."

Another grant totaling \$24,000 was matched by TRF to the Central Oregon Rotary Clubs to assist the homeless and homebound during the Covid-19 for food and hygiene. Each of the nine regional Rotary Clubs donated \$500 apiece.

POLIO ERADICATION UPDATE MAY 29

DEAR POLIO ERADICATION WARRIORS.

Two new Wild Polio cases reported this week.

All over the world, polio surveillance systems, built up over decades, track infection sources, evaluate symptoms and transport samples to the laboratory — despite distance, natural

disasters, and sometimes war. Now, disease surveillance network — reaching into the most far-flung corners of the globe — is being tapped to address the COVID-19 pandemic. "In Somalia, the polio program pivoted its workforce of thousands of frontline staff to support the effort as the cases of COVID-19 spread. Rapid response teams — made up of disease surveillance officers, community health care workers and volunteers — were trained to educate people about the virus and to test suspected cases.

By April 2020, the teams were deployed in the field," said Dr Mamunur Malik, WHO Representative in Somalia. "In Somalia's remote villages, they know us as their polio teams, and once they see us, what comes to their minds is that we're giving them information about polio," says Mohamed*, a surveillance officer. "So we also give them information about COVID-19. Social mobilizers tell them about COVID-19 symptoms, how to prevent getting infected, physical distancing, cleaning their hands very well with running water and soap."The careful procedures that the teams learned for polio surveillance have been adapted for COVID-19, where the required sample is a naso-pharyngeal swab. "We've trained our surveillance people on the case definition and how to collect the samples correctly, from people that meet the definition of a suspected case of COVID-19," says Dr Fatima. "It's the same infrastructure. After, when we collect the samples from the patient, we send it to the laboratory in Hargeisa." WHO has given the laboratory equipment and supplies to test samples for COVID-19."

As with polio samples, the samples of COVID-19 have to be refrigerated, the ice packs should be VERY cold," says Mohamed. Teams are used to monitoring the packs' temperature, even in Somalia's hot weather. Front line staff puts their own lives on the line. In April 2020, the polio team lost a colleague due to COVID-19-related infection. Ibrahim Elmi Mohamed, who joined WHO in 2001, was working as a district polio officer in Lower Shabelle. His tragic death, one of many front line staff around the world due to COVID-19, reminds us of the risks they face every day they go to work. "Despite overwhelming challenges, teams are committed to continuing their polio work in tandem with the COVID-19 response. It is critical that polio surveillance continues during the pandemic, as Somalia is also fighting outbreaks of vaccine-derived polio type 2 and 3. With polio vaccination campaigns temporarily paused, the teams must be able to track any resulting spread of poliovirus and get ready to respond as soon as it is safe to do so," says Dr Malik. "All of us are still doing polio surveillance at the same time as we do surveillance for COVID-19," says Dr Fatima. "I used to hear from my colleagues that the polio surveillance system is the strongest disease surveillance system.

Any polio surveillance team can work in the detection of COVID-19 cases because of the system's structure, the capacity and experience of the teams."
