<u>Watch our</u> <u>meeting here</u>

Angie Bloomfield, YWCA's Empowerment Center Director, joined us on Monday and discussed The YWCA Empowerment Center, which provides financial assistance and long-term case management services to the homeless in Clinton and Jackson counties through its rapid rehousing and homelessness prevention programs. Bloomfield earned her Master of Psychology Mediation and Conflict Resolution from

the University of the Rockies and earned her bachelor's degree in social and criminal justice from Ashford University. She is a certified functional family therapist and alcohol and drug counselor and has over 16 years of work experience in homelessness prevention, mental illness, and personality disorder treatment, and substance abuse treatment.

Bloomfield began with some statistics for us:

- 248: applications on the waiting list for the Empowerment Center
- 615: number of incoming calls received in January for the housing stability situations
- 207: number of open cases they have at the end of January
- 50: Number of successfully closed cases at the end of January
- 151: Number of homeless students in Clinton

Bloomfield then allowed for a "Question and Answer" type of program, where Rotarians could ask the questions they really wanted to know. The question was asked of what happens when someone calls the helpline and what their experience might be. Bloomfield explained that during the pandemic, they had set up a hotline. The hotline has one, part-time representative and she answers all of the calls. "There are 40 questions -- that's basically an interview and the client on the other end of the line has to answer the 40-ish questions. They're very personal, they're very intrusive, and not trauma-informed...at the end of the 40-ish questions you have a score...Some do not qualify and others do qualify for intensive care. It's all based on that number so then each person is assigned a case manager and is placed on a prioritization list that is solely based on your number, not your family dynamic and then we pull from the top of that list down."

The Empowerment Center is fortunate enough to have local funding, where they can help individuals and families a little bit more. "We use local funding to go from the bottom up so that we try to bridge that gap between services, so every person does receive some form of service. It's just that those receiving the highest score receive the longest and the most intensive form of case management. Then they go into housing and they continue to have a case manager. We provide wrap-around services so they get referred to all of the various locations or Support Services throughout town we help them with food assistance, we help them with WIC, we help them get into the proper education...we get them into mental health treatment, we get them into a primary care provider for their physical needs, a dentist even sometimes, because some of them haven't seen a dentist in years." Bloomfield continued to state they do this for as long as it takes and the goal is to get them to start paying their rent and be productive in the workforce and contribute back to the economy and society as a whole.

At the end of 2022, The Empowerment Center did their calculations and determined that they currently have a 76% success rate, which means "that they were able to maintain their housing, maintain their mental health treatment, and maintain some form of education or employment opportunity for greater than 12 months after case management stepped back from their care." Thank you, Angie, for the amazing work you do for Clinton County!



The History of the Rotary Bell

In 1922, U.S. Rotarians organized an attendance contest; the challenge was that the losing clubs would join in giving the winning club a prize. The Rotary Club of New York City was declared the winner and to them was awarded as a prize a bell from a popular patrol boat, which was placed on wood that came from HMS "Victory", Admiral Nelson's vessel at the battle of Trafalgar. Since then, the bell used in Rotary meetings started to represent, as on the ships, order, discipline and the time to guide us through the weekly hour and a half meetings. The bell informs us with its sound the beginning of the Rotary meeting, at which time people present should stand, same as at the end, in order to salute the national and Rotary flags. The gavel symbolizes the authority invested in the Rotarian elected to the highest position in Rotary, and through him/her reminds those present of his/her authority. When presidents transmit their positions to their successors at the end of their mandate, they give the bell their last hit turning the gavel over to their successor, symbolizing the transfer of authority.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

WELCOME TO THE LAST WEEK OF RI'S MONTH OF PEACE AND CONFLICT PREVENTION/RESOLUTION

THE HEBELS HAVE INCLUDED TRF IN THEIR CHARITABLE GIVING AND, IN A ROTARY MAGAZINE REPORT, THE COUPLE EXPLAINS WHY THEY FEEL HAPPY TO GIVE TO TRF. THEY ARE PROUD OF THE FACT THAT CHARITY NAVIGATOR HAS GIVEN THE FOUNDATION A FOUR-STAR RATING, FOR 14 YEARS IN A ROW.
