Jenna Sanders, co-owner of 392 Caffe, was our guest this past Monday. Sanders, who grew up in Camanche, and her husband, Jay, met while working at Gucci on Rodeo Drive. After studying different coffee environments, they decided to develop a concept for a coffee shop for Melrose Avenue in Los Angeles. Sander's dad had purchased a building in downtown Clinton and told her she could use it, so Jenna and Jay loaded up their car and came back to Clinton in October 2011.

When they opened the doors of 392 Caffe, no one could have prepared them for how busy they would be and the success they would see. "You're just not prepared for that, but fast forward nine years and

we have been incredibly blessed and humbled by the support of this community. Being around for almost a decade is something I take great pride in and I love being in this community and being a part of the community," Sanders remarked. The success of 392 Caffe has been so strong, Jenna and Jay have opened up a new location in Davenport, called 392Dport.

In March, when most of the world shut down due to COVID-19, 392 Caffe and staff quickly pivoted to an online and text ordering platform and slightly adjusted the way they did business. "Again, the community rose to the challenge also and supported us just ten fold. We feel so honored and proud that, not only did we make it through the last six months, we're actually going to end this year up from last year, which is amazing, but that's just a testament to all of the hard work that our team put together." In addition to the wonderful success they've seen, 392 Caffe didn't cut hours or any employees for either location during this time.

The 392 Caffe team has created a culture of inclusivity, kindness, love, and community within their coffee shop. Customers don't come for "just" a cup of coffee, but the kindness and love that is outpouring within 392. For the last six years, every November 1, they put a coat rack out and created a "Take a Coat, Leave a Coat" program, where people within the community can give and take a coat, no questions asked. Also starting on November 1, you can also become a "Coffee Angel." The Coffee Angel costs \$6 and is split between helping to pay for a random person's coffee and the other half goes into a jar until January 1. People can put a charity that is near and dear to their heart on a piece of paper and they will pull out of it at the end of the year and all of that money is donated to the charity that gets pulled out. 392 Caffe also has participated in **The Giving Tree**, which is connected with RSVP. Between the Clinton and Davenport locations, they gave out 250 gifts!

Finally, Sanders adequately stated, "We want to be a part of this community. Our roots are in this community, and we love to do whatever we can. So if any of you have ways that we can give back or partner with you in any sort of way we would love to be a part of it."

# FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 1 of October, the Economic & Community Development Month of Rotary International.

This month's theme used to be Vocational Service. TRF supports disaster relief and recovery efforts through grants from the <u>Rotary Disaster Response Fund</u>.

These District Grants (DG), termed a Community Service Grant, is a block grant from TRF to a Rotary International district. These grants are used to support short-term projects to help solve humanitarian concerns within a specific community initiated by clubs in that district.

Over two months ago, a Derecho pounded parts of the Midwest, leaving miles of overwhelming destruction across eastern Nebraska, across the middle of lowa from the Missouri to the Mississippi River. Some cities within District 6000 got help from their Rotarian neighbors when the District 6000 Disaster Response Committee allocated \$5,000 toward recovery efforts. TRF has added \$25,000 for Derecho relief, especially in Cedar Rapids, lowa City and Dubuque. Interested clubs should contact Troy Thompson, Chair of the District's Disaster Relief Committee for an application (Thompson.go@gmail.com).

As part of its goals to improve literacy, TRF matched a \$5,800 Rotary Club of Cleveland Noonday grant for the Raider Reader Program in the City of Cleveland Schools. The \$11,600 will provide every first and second grade student with a book to take home and keep before each of the five extended breaks (Fall, Thanksgiving, Winter, Spring and Summer). Carolyn Ingram, a member of the Noonday Rotary Club, said "This program is one of the best things that we have done to promote literacy in our schools. I am thrilled to be a part of it."

# **Dear Polio Eradication Warriors,**

#### One new Wild Polio case reported this week.

What is that Polio Picture? Combination Covid support & Polio immunization campaigns are underway in Afghanistan. This picture shows Nasrin Ahmadi who has been working with the Polio program since 2010. Starting as a volunteer, she has moved up the ranks to become a District Polio Officer. I chose to continue to do public health awareness during the COVID-19 pandemic. I wanted to help save people's lives and continue to serve my people," says Nasrin Ahmadi, a polio worker and volunteer for the COVID-19 response in Mazar, Balkh Province. Seven months since the first COVID-19 case was reported in Afghanistan, female polio program front line workers continue to support outbreak response. Often, they put concerns for their health to the side as they work in areas with many COVID-19 cases. Sometimes, their work brings them into conflict with the social norms of their community and society.

#### Let's Take Action! World Polio Day - October 24

A polio-free world is possible, but we can achieve it only by taking action together. With the challenges to vaccination programs posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, it's even more crucial that Rotary continues to build awareness and raise funds for polio eradication. Join the effort to vaccinate children and end polio by organizing a World Polio Day event for your community. In 2019, Rotary members held more than 5,900 events in 136 countries. This year, online events and activities will allow us to expand our reach even more and inspire others to join us.WHO would like to thank the Pakistan Assistance Program of the United Arab Emirates, who have released US\$ 17.9 million to support the resumption of immunization activities, including outbreak response, in high risk districts of Pakistan. Campaigns have resumed following a temporary pause during the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic.

**Now that we are down to the Final Two Polio Endemic Countries** - I will be listing Sixteen Reasons We need to End Polio in Pakistan (from Dawn.com): # 6. Polio can be completely eradicated from the world. Unlike most diseases, the crippling virus can be eliminated through vaccination. There are three strains of the virus and none of them can survive outside of a human body. It will die if it cannot find an unvaccinated person to infect.

#### The Final Two Polio Endemic Countries:

- Pakistan One new Polio case reported this week. Seventy-four Polio cases reported in 2020. The most recent case had an onset of paralysis on 09/01/20. Pakistan reported 147 Wild Polio cases in 2019. Nine Polio-Positive Environmental Samples were reported this week in Pakistan.
- Afghanistan No new Polio cases reported this past week. Forty-seven Polio cases reported in 2020. The most recent cases had an onset of paralysis on 8/22/20. Afghanistan reported twenty-nine Wild Polio cases in 2019. Two Polio-Positive Environmental Samples were reported this week in Afghanistan.
