Sergeant Richard Schmitz, who has been on the Camanche Police Department for sixteen years, joined us alongside fellow Rotarian and Camanche City Administrator, Andrew Kida.

In the last several years, the police department has been working on a change in culture and to do community outreach. Schmitz and Kida spoke extensively about the focus the police department has had on Camanche. For starters, they've developed a Senior Program, which is a program where the officers can do a daily check in. The

senior citizen can call or text in to the officers and let them know if they need anything during the day.

Camanche also has a "Ride Voucher" program. This was a need in the community, as they bus system that's in Clinton does not extend to Camanche. "We started less than a month ago range with a couple different taxi services in town...we started this voucher program and that allows us to hand out vouchers to people if they need rides somewhere. The taxi services bill us at the end of every month. We've been great at getting some grants from LyondellBasell. I think we've gotten two different grants from them and Clysar. That's all going into that program so we've been really able to benefit the elderly, which a lot of departments really don't have that ability to do."

The last thing that they added was our SRO (School Resource Officer) program. These changes have helped alter the perception and the overall culture of the police force in Camanche. "It's taken a really long time... realistically, just in the last three years, to try and change that model of policing to more of a community-based policing model, with mentorship inside and outside of the police department," stated Schmitz. "Really, all of this is just changing the image of our Police Department. There's so much required by the general public anymore by the Department... you know back in the 80s, 90s, and even early 2000s, our primary job was just to enforce the laws and that's not the case. There's so much more social media...you really have to stay ahead of that could be proactive in getting information but only teaching your officers but also teaching the community." FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of October, the Economic & Community Development Month of Rotary International

Kidney disease affects millions of people all over the world. Many of these patients suffer devastating consequences caused by lack of adequate care. Poor and developing countries generally do not have the necessary infrastructure to combat the disease in all its manifestations. Dialysis remains a hugely expensive, yet very necessary method of intervention. In most nations individuals are expected to fund their own treatment. In communities and hospitals where a patient cannot afford this extravagant cost, such a person faces a grim future. As part of its mission to improve world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, TRF recently came to the aid of patients with kidney disease in Kumbakonam, Tamil Nadu, India.

Through a Global Grant, a Rotary Dialysis Center with three dialysis machines was set up in Kumbakonam. Rotary District 2981 (India) hosted the (\$34,870 US) grant which was sponsored by Rotary District 9820 (Australia). S Piralyon, PDG (D2981) was influential in getting the Global Grant from TRF. "During the lock down, the new facility was useful for local patients to avoid unnecessary travel and related expenditure."



others to join us. **Pakistan** announced this week that 39 million children were vaccinated by 8,150 vaccination teams - including 699,762 zero dose children - in the five day Polio vaccination/Covid education campaign ending 10/25/20.

October 15 is Global Handwashing Day - Global Handwashing Day is a global advocacy day dedicated to increasing awareness and understanding about the importance of handwashing with soap as an easy, effective, and affordable way to prevent diseases. It is an opportunity to learn, design, test, replicate, and share creative ways to encourage people to wash their hands with soap at critical times.

Now that we are down to the Final Two Polio Endemic Countries - I will be listing Sixteen Reasons We need to End Polio in Pakistan (from Dawn.com): # 7. There are cheap and effective vaccines available for Polio. One of them, the Oral Polio Vaccine, can be administered by anyone - even volunteers. Another, the Inactivated Polio Vaccine, is given by intermuscular injection. Both vaccines are very safe and effective.

Vaccine Derived Polio Cases - 414 Vaccine Derived Polio Cases reported in 2020: Afghanistan - 87 (0 in 2019), Angola - 3 (129 in 2019), Benin - 1 (8 in 2019), Burkina Faso - 10 (1 in 2019), Cameroon - 5 (0 in 2019), CAR - 2 (21 in 2019), Chad 69 ((10 in 2019), China - 0 (1 In 2019), Cote d' Ivoire 24 (0 in 2019), DRC - 56 (86 in 2019), Ethiopia - 16 (11 in 2019), Ghana - 11 (18 in 2019), Guinea - 18 (0 in 2019), Malaysia - 1 (3 in 2019), Myanmar - 0 (6 in 2019), Niger - 4 (1 in 2019), Nigeria - 1 (18 in 2019), Pakistan - 64 (22 in 2019), Papua New Guinea - 0 (0 in 2019). Philippines - 1 (16 in 2019), Somalia - 19 (3 in 2019), South Sudan - 3 (0 in 2019), Sudan - 3, Togo - 9 (8 in 2019), Zambia - 0 (2 in 2019), 361 Vaccine Derived Polio cases were reported in 2019.

The Final Two Polio Endemic Countries:

- Pakistan No new Polio cases reported this week. Seventy-four Polio cases reported in 2020. The most recent case had an onset of paralysis on 09/01/20. Pakistan reported 147 Wild Polio cases in 2019. Fourteen Polio-Positive Environmental Samples were reported this week in Pakistan.
- **Afghanistan** Four new Polio cases reported this past week. Fifty-one Polio cases reported in 2020. The most recent cases had an onset of paralysis on 8/29/20. Afghanistan reported twenty-nine Wild Polio cases in 2019. No Polio-Positive Environmental Samples were reported this week in Afghanistan.
