

## **MEETING REVIEW**



- Marsy's Law is key in advocating for equal rights for Iowa's crime victims and treating Iowa's crime victims with dignity and respect.
- Marsy's Law is seeking to elevate key rights of crime victims into the state's Constitution to ensure that victims have rights that are equal, in stature, to the constitutional rights of the accused and convicted. These constitutional protections for crime victims would include the following rights:
  - the right to be treated with fairness, dignity and respect;
  - the right to be notified, be present and be heard at court proceedings;
  - the right to reasonable protection from the accused;
  - the right to notification of the release or escape of the accused;- the right to restitution;
  - and the right to enforce these rights in the criminal justice process.

## **FOUNDATION MINUTE**

He founded Panzi Hospital in 1999 with the singular aim of making life much better for mothers and their babies, then war broke out. Working among traumatized women and children of the Democratic Republic of Congo, Denis Mukweze has seen it all: between 100 and 500 women and children raped every day, ranging from 19-month-old babies to octogenarians; with their digestive and reproductive organs totally and brutally impacted. Frustrated by the relentless use of mass rape as a weapon of war and mass destruction of babies, women and entire communities, Mukweze sought for ways to improve medical equipment at the hospital to cope with the overwhelming demands. Speaking in January 2017, at a Rotary Foundation Seminar sponsored by District 1620 (Belgium), the OB/GYN surgeon detailed the atrocities going on in his native country. The Rotary Clubs in attendance donated \$120,000 immediately. This was augmented by \$40,000 in District Designated Funds and a grant of nearly \$100,000 from the Rotary Foundation. Forty-two clubs participated in the project, including the host club, Rotary Club of Bukavu Mwangaza in South Kivu, DRC. In 2018, through a Rotary Foundation Global Grant, the hospital was gifted with a state-of-the-art digital X-ray machine which allows doctors to view results electronically and share them with distant specialists when needed. Today, although rape as a weapon of war has yet to be obliterated from the region, with the help of the new Rotary donated machine, maternal and infant mortality have been drastically reduced with a 99.1% live birth rate. More than 85,000 rape or birth-related complications have been treated, and victims who cannot afford post-rape medical care continue to be treated free of charge at the Panzi Hospital. Your generous donations end up improving lives world-wide.

#### POLIO UPDATE FROM MARK RUTENBECK

October 24 is World Polio Day. The Rotary fight against Polio began in 1979 with the immunization of 6 million children in the Philippines. Rotary's commitment to eradicate polio worldwide was moved to the fore-front in 1986 by creating the PolioPlus campaign.

There are 3 types of wild poliovirus in the world and people need protection from all 3. Only 1 of the 3 strains has been eradicated. The second virus is in its 3rd year without a reported case in Nigeria. The geographic region of third strain is now down to just 2 countries; Pakistan & Afghanistan.

To complete the project, Rotary really needs to focus on the PLUS in PolioPLUS. The Plus takes new approaches to reaching the remaining people in the parts of the world that distrust outsiders and resist change.

To build the Plus, Rotary has become the spearheading partner of a Global Polio Eradication Initiative – the GPEI, which funds 91 percent of the World Health Organization's immunization staff. The GPEI includes many important organizations, arguably the most supportive being the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation that matches every Rotary donation 2 to 1.

The Plus in PolioPlus has made our immunizations made more useful by including vitamin A. It's estimated 1.25 million children are alive because of vitamin A's ability to resist infectious diseases. Saving 1.25 million children is definitely a Plus.

The Plus also expands our care. Worldwide, a child dies of Malaria every 2 minutes. This Plus approach also provides mosquito netting in areas where mosquito borne infection is common. To complete our goal of eradication, large scale communications efforts are needed to make people aware of the benefits of immunizations.

Another Plus program is Rotary's Program to provide access to clean water. Clean water helps Rotary workers build trust and relationships with community members. People who don't have water don't care about a drop of a vaccine. Polio victims often end up as street beggars.

The success of Rotary's Polio Plus program is so compelling that when you get your quarterly bill from our Club, there is a \$4 mandatory dues surcharge. That \$16/yr. immediately becomes \$48 with the Gates' match.

I want to strongly encourage you to contribute to the Rotary Foundation. Eliminating Disease is funded by Foundation giving. But it is only 1 of the 6 Rotary International Causes where we strive to save & improve peoples' lives. When you include our Club's request to be a contributing member to the Rotary Foundation (\$100 annually) your donation totals \$116 per year. That \$2.23 per week donation can be managed by most, if not all, of our members. It benefits more children & families-in-need than any other donation you make. Please help! Thank you.

#### **BOO BASH CHANGES**

#### Dear Rotarians.

After our last Spring Auction, a handful of Rotarians got together and started talking about our annual fundraising efforts. When Rotary first started having an annual auction - decades ago - we were the only ones in the market, so to speak. Through the years, the auction became THE THING to do in fundraising, which has caused an oversaturation in the market. As a committee, we decided to look into other fundraising options.

In the last five months, the Fundraising Committee has considered numerous options and as a whole, we decided on an "envelope" system. During the original idea, we realized that if we could fill envelopes 1-300, that would be over \$40,000 and it would be far less stressful and taxing on our members, who are frequently asked for financial and business contributions to our auctions, as well as others in town. During our planning, a few committee members brought up a potential issue -- are we hoping that members are altruistic and willing to donate what they can to the club and our projects? Or should we have "incentives," to encourage donations and multiple envelope purchases? As a committee, we decided incentives would be ideal, which would be a way that we could give back to our Rotarians, who would be giving to the club and our community.

That's where we got into a little bit of trouble. The act of putting "incentives" into the event turned our envelope fundraiser into a game of chance, which is also known as gambling. Additionally, we learned that it is against Iowa law to pay for an act of gambling by credit card. Since we were offering envelopes online, which was mainly done for Rotarians who wish to participate in our fundraiser event but were unable to make the physical party, we were in violation of Iowa law.

In the last week, John Frey and Jill O'Neill have spent many, many hours with the Department of Inspections and Appeals, discussing our event and getting this straightened out. We learned that for years, we probably should have had a gambling and gaming license for much of our fundraising efforts. We had an emergency committee meeting on Friday, October 18 and decided the most ethical and the right thing to do would be to return the money to the individuals that had purchased envelopes and change the premise of our fundraiser.

Thus, we have taken away the envelope fundraiser concept and changed to raffle tickets. Raffle tickets will be available for purchase from any committee member at \$25 apiece. The more raffle tickets you buy, the better chance you'll have to win some amazing prizes. And so, since you were planning on spending \$250 on envelopes, you can now purchase 10 raffle tickets and have an even better shot at the prizes! Additionally, Jill O'Neill went to Des Moines and received a Qualified Organization Raffle License. The Rotary Club of Clinton now has the ability to go crazy with raffles -- for a great cause!

The most important message is this - We were unknowingly in violation of Iowa law and we took the appropriate steps to correct this immediately. We understand that it is very frustrating to have our fundraising event changed, especially so close to the event. (Trust us - we are frustrated too!) However, it is crucial to us that we follow Iowa law and code and create the utmost ethical event possible.

We have raffle tickets available to be purchased at \$25 apiece, which can be purchased BY CASH OR CHECK from any Fundraising Committee member. We will have them available at the Rotary meeting on Monday and you can purchase any time between now and at the Boo Bash! Tickets will be drawn at the Boo Bash. You do not have to be present to win!!! This will be our annual fundraiser -- there is not a spring auction!
